PRESIDEN President's Message

Pay Attention to Where Your Mail Is Deposited

We strongly recommend that residents deposit all outgoing mail inside a branch office of the U.S. Post Office.

uring the past 12 months or so, we have noticed an increase in stolen mail. What can you do to lower the possibility of crooks stealing your checks, cash, money orders or gift cards from your mail?

As a member of the Security Patrol for the past 15 years, I have witnessed various crimes in our community. There are methods you can practice to help lower the potential of this federal crime touching your life.

While on Patrol on Sunday, December 20. I noted several holiday cards torn open lying near the sidewalk on the eastbound side of Sun City Boulevard (just east of the intersection of Billy Casper Drive). I collected all of the evidence and called the resident whose name appeared on all of the envelopes. After contacting the person, they advised me that they had deposited their mail in the U.S. postal service box at the Desert Vista community center.

Now we are aware of residents who place outgoing mail in their individual post box in front of their homes and lift the red flag to advise the mail carrier of the presence of mail. By the way, this is a practice that Sun City has been advising residents against for a long time.

However, the crime of sticking a hand into the postal box to steal mail is new to

City (within the past 12 months).

To combat both methods outlined lined above, we strongly recommend that residents deposit all outgoing mail inside a U.S. Post Office branch office. Please take the time to drop your mail into the slots pro vided in the lobby areas.

Although we cannot ever guarantee 100 percent security, we believe the latter method is probably the most secure way of mailing your letters. We would also advise you to remove inbound mail to your residence as soon as possible after the postman has visited your mailbox.

Black and White Is Not Back

Thank you for your positive response to the article on painting your mailboxes. We still have some residents who have not taken a hard look at their mailboxes to see if they need painting or replacement. Further, almost all posts that support the mailboxes need painting after five years, and many of these have been sorely neglected. Please take a look before you get a violation letter. For assistance with the maintenance of your mailbox, take a look through the Link where you will find advertisers who offer services that can help.

Now I would like to talk about black and white rocks.



They are not allowed in front or back yards. Black and white rocks are not allowed for any decorated trim around trees, bushes or anything else. Black and white rocks have not been allowed for over six years now. They look very outdated and make our community look tired and outdated as well. Also, when they get other colored rocks mixed in with them, they look unruly and overall disheveled.

If your house has black and white rocks, you do not have to remove them, but if you are thinking about redoing your yards you will not be able to use black or white rocks in your land-scape plan. Using them would be an expensive mistake, as you would most likely receive a letter from Community Standards advising you to replace them.

The Architectural Review Committee is always trying to keep our community refreshed and up to date to improve our real estate values. This was the case when the committee updated the community's house paint colors, which were changed over six years ago to darker colors. ARC also changed the colors of the theme walls seven years ago.

We thank all our residents who join us in the spirit of positive cooperation and willingness to help keep our community looking as outstanding as we know it to be.

Conserving Water at Top of Department's List

The responsible use of water is an issue facing all of us.

ope all is well with everyone. This month I'd like to talk about what's going on in the Landscape Department. As I have mentioned before, the responsible use of water is an issue facing all of us. For that reason, you may have noticed that we removed some turf around the community. The decision was based on saving water and costs. We also have been working to reduce the amount of plants we have. This also helps us to save on water. Once plants and trees are removed, we cap the irrigation. Plants that are growing close together or that

require more water use are at the top of the list to be removed. After we take out the plants, we add decorative rock when we are ready.

We will continue to look for ways to save on water and still keep the landscape looking nice and clean.

We are watering during the day; turf on Tuesdays; drip on Wednesdays. As before, if you notice any ice in the common areas, please contact us as soon as you can at 254-4092 or 363-7655.


Dan L. Eisenberg, M.D.

Volunteers Work Hard to Keep Sun City Safe

he Sun City Security Patrol is your volunteer service that provides the eyes and ears for the Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department (Metro) for our area. Our service has kept our community the safest area in the Las Vegas Valley. As the eyes and ears of Metro, we do not have any law enforcement authority. That means we cannot cite anyone for traffic violations (the streets belong to the city), we can for towing, or some other need, or offering car or roof repairs. Continue to practice safety by always answering your front door, but DO NOT open it; this will let the person at the door know you are at home. Simply tell the visitor that "I don't open my door to strangers." Be cautious about opening your front door to anyone you don't know or were not expecting.

not arrest or detain anyone, we do not interfere in disputes between neighbors, nor are we empowered to respond to violations of the CC&Rs or Association rules and regulations. We also do not respond to coyote sightings (but the dispatchers do record them on our logs). If you have been affected by coyotes, please call 229-6444, ext. 2 to reach Las Vegas Animal Control.

The December Link had a great article on coyotes and how to protect yourself and your pets from them. A few ideas included: Feed pets indoors, tightly cover garbage cans, don't leave pets unattended in your yards, walk your pet on leash and carry a protective stick, and make loud noises. Coyotes rarely, if ever, attack humans.

Scammers are still active in Sun City. They are claiming to be new neighbors needing cash

Scammers get your name from your mailbox! During the holiday season, many mailboxes were raided and mail was stolen. We have said this before, but will say it again, always deposit your mail at the post office or in the large blues boxes located at the community centers. The best time to drop off your mail is between the 9 and 11 a.m. pickup time. DO NOT drop your mail off in the late afternoon, to let it sit in the boxes overnight.

As you may know, the Patrol checks for open garage doors between 8 p.m. and 4 a.m.

When we see a door open (more than 6 inches) we notify the resident by knocking on the door or by giving you a call. If we cannot reach you by either method, we will call your emergency contact. It is really important that your emergency contact is current, and that the contact is a Las Vegas resident. We call them when we can't reach you about open garage doors, flashing 911 lights, checks, discrepancies noted on house checks and water leaks emanating from the house or landscaping. The emergency contact form can be picked up at the Association Administration office at Mountain Shadows or at the Patrol office located at the back of the Desert Vista parking lot.

We are here to help you as much as we can. If you have questions or are interested in serving as a Patrol member, call 254-2303.


ou see them every time you drive through the community – walkers. Depending on the time of year, they hit the sidewalks before sunrise or catch the celestial orb before it heads to bed. Any way you look at it, walking in Sun City is a popular activity – it's free, relatively safe and offers a simple way to stay fit or begin a fitness routine.

Thanks to recent popular events, those who enjoy walking have exercised their voices to SCSCAI Fitness Director Kristie McWhorter, who has worked with her staff of Charli Douglass and Heather Senn to develop a walking program that made its debut last month. While designed for all fitness levels, the walks and boot camps should be considered fitness events and not leisurely strolls.

"Residents can expect to participate in a warm-up and stretching after the walk," said Kristie. "The goal will be to teach participants proper walking mechanics that will help them improve leg, back and core strength, heart health and balance issues."

According to Kristie, the walking group will be a fun social and fitness event that offers a great way for new residents to meet people and get to know their community.

"We know residents love to walk. We see them out walking all the time," said Kristie. "Some don't like to work out in fitness centers, so we wanted to provide opportunities for social involvement with other residents while getting healthy. People enjoy exercising in groups where they can build friendships and motivate

with strength or resistance exercises thrown in at different times. Participants will utilize body weight and tubing of varying intensities, so they can work out at their own level or push themselves a little harder. They will complete a total body workout in every boot camp class. All equipment will be provided.

"Residents will continually be challenged to step it up and work harder," said Charli, who will lead many of the events. "Over time, walking routes will become more challenging by adding hills and boot camps will be harder if you push yourself harder."

From start to finish, the program is expected to last from 45 to 60 minutes, with walks ranging from 2 to 4 miles. No registration is required. All residents need to do is show up – at Desert Vista on Tuesdays and Mountain Shadows on Thursdays for the walks and at Desert Vista on the

second Tuesday of the month (February 9); Mountain Shadows on the fourth Thursday of the month (February 26) for the boot camps. All events start promptly at 8 a.m.

As the events grow, the Fitness Department may collect email addresses of participants so it will be able to remind residents of upcoming classes. As with any new event, participation is crucial. So, if you enjoy the idea of the walks, be sure to support them, attend and spread

The ballot format is the same as used last year and is designed for electronic counting. The ballot has two halves and a pre-posted return envelope. Instructions are printed on the ballot. A household has five votes. After marking the ballot, remove the instructions side to remove

tion Committee will cut off the bar code before removing your secret ballot. Optical scanners will be used to count the ballots and tabulate the votes electronically.

If you make a mistake marking your ballot, do not correct it. Exchange the old ballot for a new one at the Administration office at Mountain Shadows. Before requesting a replacement ballot and envelope, be certain that another member of the household has not voted. Should two ballots be received from the same home, both will be voided. Casting more than five votes also will void the ballot. Your votes may be cast for one candidate or divided among two or more candidates.

If you have questions about how to properly fill out your ballot, or if you need a replacement ballot, call the SCSCAI Administration office at 966-1401.

No candidate information will be available from this source.

Validation and counting of the ballots will occur at an official SCSCAI Association meeting on Wednesday, February 24, starting at 8 a.m., in the Mint and Sahara rooms at Mountain Shadows. Following the count, election results will be announced by the secretary of the Association. All those who wish to witness the ballot tabulation are invited to attend the meeting on February 24.

PURSUANT TO NRS 116.31034 SECTION 12

A candidate may request that the secretary or other officer specified in the bylaws of the association send, 30 days before the date of the election and at the association's expense, to the mailing address of each unit within the common-interest community or to any other mailing address designated in writing by the unit's owner a candidate informational statement. The candidate information statement: (a) must be no longer than a single, typed page; (b) must not contain any defamatory, libelous or profane information; and (c) may be sent with the secret ballot mailed pursuant to subsection 8 or in a separate mailing. The association and its directors, officers, employees and agents are immune from criminal or civil liability for any act or omission which arises out of the publication or disclosure of any information related to any person and which occurs in the course of carrying out any duties required pursuant to this subsection.

The service will be offered in the Mint room at Mountain Shadows on Thursdays and Fridays. Appointments are necessary and must be made in person with the Social Monitor at Mountain Shadows. Taxpayers need to bring in a copy of last year's return and Social Security cards along with all W2s, 1099-R, INT, DIV, MISC, Social Security SSA-1099, W2Gs and broker statements with purchase date and cost of any stocks or bonds sold. Add 1095-A if health insurance was purchased through Nevada Health Link and 1095-B if provided by employer. You also will need receipts for itemized deductions for medical expenses, mortgage interest, real estate taxes paid, gifts to charity and any other miscellaneous deductions. Please note that we can prepare returns only for electronic filing with the Internal Revenue Service. Paper returns are not permitted. Also note that we cannot prepare state returns or returns with rental, business or partnership (K-1) income, other than simple interest, dividends and capital gains.

DO YOU KNOW?

Where Your Golf Cart Is Welcome



Do you know where golf carts can and cannot go within our Sun City Summerlin? Sun City is designated as a golf cart permissible community. As such, golf carts are permitted on city streets within the community. It is illegal, not to mention dangerous, for golf carts to cross Lake Mead Boulevard other than via the tunnels beneath the thoroughfare. Tunnel entrances are at Lake Mead on either side of Thomas Ryan Boulevard. Signs indicate the entrances to the tunnels. Golf carts also can be driven in commercial areas within Sun City Summerlin and those adjacent to it. Smith's supermarket gate at the corner of Smokey and Prairie Hill drives provides access to the Smith's Shopping Center at the northwest corner of Rampart and Lake Mead boulevards. An access code, posted at the Sun City side entrance, is required to operate the gate. Golf cart parking is available on the south side of Smith's. It is not advisable to take your golf cart into the larger parking lot in front of Smith's.

Special Note: Unless equipped with a handicap parking pass, golf carts are not allowed to park in handicap spaces.



Building Better Balance

One-third of people over the age of 65 fall at least once each year

any of us are looking for balance in our lives. Balance in both the social and physical sense is indispensable to healthy living, particularly as people live longer. If we are going to live long and well, a good sense of balance is essential.

Research shows that one-third of people over the age of 65 fall at least once each year, and these falls can have devastating consequences. But bruises and broken bones are not the only unfortunate results from a loss of balance. People prone to falling can end up limiting their activities; many experience unhappiness, anxiety, loss of independence and even life-threatening complications.

A fall can result in decreased activity, which reduces stability, increasing the chance of falling again. Studies show that if you take care of yourself by improving your posture, strength, flexibility and endurance, you are much less likely to fall.

Your Fitness Department staff is dedicated to creating programs and classes that will improve your quality of life. We will discuss "Building Better Balance" this month on Thursday,

¼ cup Unsweetened coconut milk

½ tsp. Favorite liquor or vanilla extract

1/4 cup Coating (unsweetened cocoa powder, chopped nuts or toasted coconut)

Instructions

Heat coconut milk to simmer and not boil. Remove from heat and add chocolate. Cover and DO NOT TOUCH for 5 minutes. Uncover and use a mixing spoon to gently stir, trying not to incorpotate air. Continue to stir off heat until creamy and smooth. Stir in vanilla or liquor. Set in refrigerator uncovered for 2 to 3 hours until firm. 

CLUB SPOTLIGHT: Bridge Club Three Bridge Clubs Meet Players' Needs

ridge is a game people of all ages and all degrees of skill can enjoy. It is an active blend of skill, luck, psychology, friends and far-out fascination!" said resident Peg Cundiff.

Did you know that we have almost 400 residents who belong to three bridge clubs who meet and play the game every week in the card rooms at Mountain Shadows?

One of these clubs is Duplicate Bridge, whose president is Dick Colwell. Duplicate Bridge is the largest of the three groups and the most complex. Dewy Cundiff and his wife, Peg, are the directors of the Club, who have set up a system that records the percent, score and rank of each hand played. That data is then made available to each player.

When the session opens, cards are dealt to a "board" and then the players must play the hands in the board. Bidding is done with cards and there is very little talking during the hand. When a table finishes its first "board" it is passed on to another table (in a specific order), and that table plays the same cards. Players receive points for their bidding and efficiency in playing the same cards. After all 27 hands have been completed, a score sheet is submitted to Peg, who inputs all the data into a computer before a winner is selected by how they played the "board."

Peg and Dewy assure each player that the joy of the game of bridge is not only the challenge of cards, but the friends one makes while enjoying the game.

The other two bridge clubs in Sun City are Rubber Bridge and Friday Night Bridge, which is also referred to as "party bridge."

The groups meet Monday through Thursday (president is Renee Simon) and Fridays (president is George Horvat). Rubber Bridge has about 100 members, while Friday Night Bridge has 70 members.

With these last two bridge clubs, fun is the focus, and as with most clubs in Sun City, there is coffee and various kinds of refreshments are served, along with lots of hugs, well-wishes and, sometimes, even some gossip. Most of our clubs have a large social component and these clubs are no different. As long as people come out smiling, the clubs are successful.




