
s we leave the 2015 holiday season and celebrate the coming of a New Year, we anticipate some changes for Sun City Summerlin.



Tuesday, February 23, is Election Day in Sun City

Richard Gluch he Election Committee is preparing to conduct the annual election of Sun City directors. This year, Tuesday, February 23, is designated as Election Day and will be the last day to cast your ballot. Counting of the ballots will take place on Wednesday, February 24. Five positions will be filled. Each home has five (5) votes that may be cast for one candidate or divided among all in any manner desired. It is critical that not more than five (5) votes are marked.

Ballots (part of the Link mailing label) and a return envelope will be included in your February Link. The ballot instructions are on the back of the address portion of the mailer. The ballot portion is perforated so the name and address can be removed by tearing it off at the perforations. After you mark your votes on this ballot, remove the address portion and insert the ballot into the envelope so that the bar code shows through the window in the envelope. It may then be mailed to the Administration Office, Mountain Shadows, 9107 Del Webb Boulevard,

Las Vegas, NV 89134; or save Sun City the cost of postage by personally depositing your ballot in the ballot box at Mountain Shadows. If you mail your ballot, it must be received no later than 5 p.m. on February 23. Voting will close at 5 p.m. on February 23.

Should you lose or accidentally destroy your ballot, another can be obtained at the Administration Office. Before requesting a replacement ballot, be certain that another member of your household has not already voted. If two ballots are received from the same household BOTH will be voided. Also, if more than five (5) votes are marked on a ballot, all votes will be voided.

One "Meet the Candidates" event will be held. It will take place during the Residents' Forum on Wednesday, January 13, 7 p.m., Desert Vista. Each candidate will make a presentation, which will be followed by a question-and-answer period moderated by Las Vegas City Councilman Stavros Anthony. After this formal meeting, candidates will be available to answer your additional questions.

A Few Tidbits

If you park in the street, please do not park any part of the vehicle on the sidewalk. If you park your vehicle in your driveway, make sure it does not block the sidewalk.

t is not unusual for us to receive the same questions over and over from residents. This month, we are providing some of the information that is frequently requested.

Mailboxes. Many of the mailboxes and posts in the community are in need of repainting. This is the responsibility of the individual homeowner or the sub-association of which the duplex or villa is a member.

If the box is rusted, faded or discolored, it is time to repaint. Boxes must be painted the color they were originally painted by Del Webb. Since this is considered maintenance, it does not require prior ARC approval. If you need to replace the mailbox you probably will not be able to find an exact model. Replace it with one as close as possible to the original. Similar styles can be found at Lowe's or Home Depot.

Tree Limbs. Are your trees encroaching on your neighbor's property or the sidewalk? If so, be a good neighbor and trim the limbs back. If





the limbs are encroaching on a sidewalk, it can be reported to the city of Las Vegas Code Enforcement department 229-6615. The City's requirement is that the limbs must be higher than 8 feet from the sidewalk.

Parking. Since Sun City does not own its streets, Nevada law prohibits the Association from forbidding street parking. If you park in the street, please do not park any part of the vehicle on the sidewalk. If you park your vehicle in your driveway, make sure it does not block the sidewalk. Parking on landscape rock is not permitted.

Trash pickup. Our pickup days are Tuesday and Friday. Trash may not be placed outside of the house for collection prior to noon on the day preceding the scheduled collection. Containers must be removed by 7 p.m. on pickup day. On windy days, please be sure the container lid is securely fastened. If you use trash bags, be sure they are tied closed.

Neighbor to Neighbor Issues. A complaint is deemed a neighbor-to-neighbor issue when a "considerable number of persons" are not affected by the problem. Neighbor-to-neighbor complaints can involve a broad range of issues, including property line disputes, party walls, water seeping walls, views, trees, shrubs, blowing leaves, parking, pet and bird issues, noise, odors and blowing trash.

When the Community Standards Office receives a neighbor-to-neighbor complaint, a courtesy notice is sent advising the resident of the issue. If the issue is not resolved, the complainant can contact the appropriate city agency (Animal Control, 229-6444, #2; parking enforcement, 229-6432; Clark County Neighborhood Justice Center, 455-3898). The NJC helps resolve conflicts at no cost through mediation services. Mediation is a process that assists disputing parties to resolve their differences confidentially and reach a mutually satisfactory agreement with the help of a trained, neutral third party mediator.

There is an adage, "The more things change, the more they stay the same." This is something to consider when discussing the newest (yet one of the oldest) chartered clubs in Sun City Summerlin.

The Tennis Club celebrated its new charter in November to which you may ask, "But hasn't there always been a Tennis Club in Sun City?" The answer to that question would be, yes, however, it has had a capricious existence in its near-25-year life.

The Tennis Club was formed in 1992 and immediately went into a dual-sided mode. There were very skilled players who wanted to follow United States Tennis Association rules, and there were recreational players who just wanted to play for fun. Those who found themselves

always have played against friends regardless of which team they belonged to. Sixteen years following the charter of Team Tennis, the sport has seen other changes, as well. Last year, the formation of a new club for Pickleball players prompted the Association to revisit the allocation of court times at Desert Vista. The popularity of Pickleball, paired with declining tennis memberships, helped to facilitate the court changeovers.

For Ellen Crawford, who was elected president of the newly merged Tennis Club, the group is all about having fun.

"The goal of the new club is to help anyone who has an interest in tennis have the opportunity to meet people of their skill level and have a good time," she said.


USTA Tennis Alive and Well in Sun City

"But not deflated," Rady said, as he's currently working on fielding another team to compete in USTA in 2016.

in the middle were skilled players who moved to Sun City to retire and enjoy the good life, but who wanted to play against people of their own skill set.

This schism existed for about seven years until, one day, both sides made demands of the Association for court times and the desire to host outside tennis tournaments. The increased requests for court time on SCSCAI's 14 tennis courts, as well as differences in opinion among members about how the club should move forward, prompted the chartering of a second club. In 1999, Team Tennis became Sun City's 71st club.





Coffee Notes:

Last month, SCSCAI BOD Treasurer Ken Resnik invited Sun City resident Madelyn Clark to the January Board of Directors meeting scheduled for Tuesday, January 5, following a charged discussion regarding the viability of a community dog park during the November 20 Coffee With the Board.

Madelyn and several residents brought the topic to the monthly meeting, requesting that the Board take another look at finding a location in Sun City for a dog park. The discussion stemmed directly from an earlier comment made about the need for a "Renaissance" of community amenities that will help ensure Sun City remain a popular choice for the next generation of retired homebuyers.

"The community has been here for 25 years and it hasn't changed," said BOD Vice President Leo Crawford. The BOD has spent the last three to four years cutting costs. Now we need to focus on, 'Let's make it better.' That's what we're talking about."

The statement was all the opening Madelyn needed to respond.

"There are many dog owners here who are responsible. We have a lot of handicapped people here who need help with their animals. A dog park in Sun City would be an option and part of this Renaissance that you speak of. All we ask is that you listen. We just want you to come in with an open attitude," she said.

From there, both sides weighed in. History was presented and then Board member Ken Caroccia spoke. "I have spent more time on this issue than any other since I've been on the Board. This has been going on for 12 to 14 years. You're not talking about finding one dog park, we'll have to find three depending on where you live in this community. But the bottom line is that no one wants a dog park in their back yard."

AARP Tax Aide Assistance; Signups Begin January 2

AARP volunteers will again be providing free income tax preparation for Sun City residents, beginning Friday, February 4, through April 15. The service will be offered in the Mint room at Mountain Shadows on Thursdays and Fridays. Appointments are necessary and must be made in person with the Social Monitor at Mountain Shadows. Taxpayers need to bring in a copy of last year's return and Social Security cards along with all W2s, 1099 R, INT, DIV, MISC, Social Security SSA-1099, W2Gs and broker statements with purchase date and cost of any stocks or bonds sold. Add 1095-A if health insurance was purchased through Nevada Health Link and 1095-B if provided

by employer. You also will need receipts for itemized deductions for medical expenses, mortgage interest, real estate taxes paid, gifts to charity and any other miscellaneous deductions. Please note that we can prepare returns only for electronic filing with the Internal Revenue Service. Paper returns are not permitted. Also note that we cannot prepare state returns or returns with rental, business or partnership (K-1) income, other than simple interest, dividends and capital gains. Overcharged Golf Cart Batteries Could be Cause for Concern By Ellen Greenspan/Link

un City Summerlin residents Arlene and Dan Kopycienski were watching television in their home when their carbon monoxide detector sounded an alarm that something was wrong in the house. After checking the device to determine that it was in working order, they called emergency responders who were quick to arrive. Using their more sophisticated CO monitor, firefighters from Las Vegas Fire Station 107 determined that hydrogen gas levels, and not carbon monoxide, were elevated throughout the home, particularly in a smaller confined room and in the garage. According to Las Vegas Fire & Rescue Captain Mike Spurling, "A high level of hydrogen gas can fool a CO monitor," causing it to sound an alert.

Discovering that a golf cart was attached to its charger in the garage, a firefighter lifted the seat to the battery compartment, and when he placed his detector near the batteries its meter skyrocketed. They moved Arlene and Dan, as well as their golf cart outside and opened windows and doors to ventilate the house.

Hydrogen is a potentially explosive, odorless gas. It's a hidden danger inside golf carts if batteries are mistakenly overcharged. Normally, a battery charger shuts off after about a half-hour when batteries become fully charged. However, if just one cell in any one of a golf cart's multiple batteries is defective, it could prevent the charger from turning off, thus creating the problem. According to Captain Spurling, who commands one of three daily shifts at Fire Station 107, "Just on my shift, I've responded to at least six of these calls during the past year," he said.

Arlene and Dan have had golf carts since moving to Sun City in 1998; they never hesitated about plugging in their cart's batteries to charge in their unventilated garage.

"Normally, the charger shuts itself off after 20 minutes or so, but this time it wasn't shutting off and we didn't realize that. It had been on for hours in the garage and was overcharging the batteries," Arlene said.

As the batteries were overcharging, they were emitting odorless hydrogen gas. With the garage door closed, the gas was being

drawn through the air conditioning unit, which is in the garage. According to Arlene, "We did not know that it was coming through our vents and into our home."

Because a defective battery is a potential problem for a battery charger, Captain Spurling suggested that golf cart batteries be charged in an adequately ventilated area and batteries should be maintained by holding water at the proper level. It's also a good idea to monitor the battery charger when it is being used. If it doesn't shut off routinely that's an indication of a problem. Unplug it and have the unit serviced.

The Kopycienskis now charge their batteries with the garage door open, and they keep working CO detectors in their home.

alking is one of the easiest, safest and least expensive types of physical activity. It's also relaxing and at the same time invigorating, requires little athletic skill and does not require special equipment other than sturdy, comfortable shoes. And it is fun and natural – good for your mind and self-esteem.

For those with a history of inactivity, problems with obesity, or who just don't like strenuous activity, walking is an excellent way to begin an exercise program. You can start slowly then increase your speed and maintain a steady pace.

Walking will improve your cardiovascular fitness, muscle strength, balance, coordination and metabolism. Walking gets the heart beating faster to transport oxygen-rich blood from the lungs to the muscles. The heart and lungs grow more efficient with a regular walking regimen, reducing blood pressure. Walking is also a central element of medical rehabilitation. Recovery from many ailments, including a heart attack, is facilitated by a regular walking regimen. Walking also improves your lower body muscle strength and balance.

The best way to start is walking 10-20 uninterrupted minutes at least three times a week. Walk at a comfortable pace, slowing down if you find yourself breathing too heavily. Don't tire yourself. If 20 minutes is too much, cut back to 10 or 15 minutes. You can gradually increase your time and pace as your body adapts to the exercise.

Don't forget to drink lots of water. Cool down after exercise by slowing your pace and stretching your muscles. You are now ready to begin a walking program.

A great way to start is to join us on Tuesday and Thursday mornings at 8 a.m. to walk as a group around our community. Walks will vary in length between 2 to 4 miles, and will begin with a dynamic warm-up followed by stretching with one of our fitness specialists.

To shake it up a bit, we will offer a **Walking Bootcamp twice a month.** A fitness specialist or two will lead the group on the walk and add in fun strength exercises.

So kick off 2016 by walking with us on Tuesday and Thursday mornings!

Give Your Metabolism A Boost!

Going hungry lowers your metabolism as your body prepares for starvation.

etabolism is the amount of energy — in the form of calories — that you burn during the day. Technically, it is the chemical processes that occurs within your body in order to maintain your life. It includes the function of your organs, repair of your cells, the digestion of food and breathing. Your age, gender and weight are factors that also determine your metabolic rate, as well as proper nutrition and exercise.

As you begin to age and your metabolism decreases, losing weight or maintaining your weight becomes more difficult and you have less energy to do simple tasks. There are some tried and true ways to maintain a healthy metabolism or to even give it a boost.

Eat Regularly. Consuming regular meals and healthy snacks can support your metabolism throughout the day. Going hungry lowers your metabolism as your body prepares for starvation.

Exercise. Aerobic exercise (walking, running, biking, swimming, dancing, stair climbing) is one of the safest and most effective ways to boost your metabolism. It raises your metabolic rate, and

as you exercise, it also keeps your resting energy high during the recovery period. Start with 5 to 10 minutes and build your time to 30 minutes of moderate to vigorous exercise, 3 to 5 times per week.

Bracing for Harsh Weather

CPC Encourages Residents to Practice Safety

- If it becomes advisable for you to stay inside your home, are you prepared to remain there for up to three days?
- Will you have non-perishable food available in flip-top cans?
- Do you have a battery-operated radio, flashlights and extra batteries?
- Do you have an adequate supply of prescription medicines on hand?
- Which possessions will you want to take with you if you must leave your home?
- If the electric garage door opener isn't working can you manually open the door? Do you know how to do this?
- If a power disruption affects Sun City, are you prepared to cope without heat, lights, television, radio, telephone, refrigerator, microwave and your computer?
- What will you do if your water supply is disrupted?
- If you turn on your water faucet and nothing runs out, do you have emergency water stored in your home?

During the first months of the year when temperatures are coldest, wear layers of clothing to conserve warmth. Wearing gloves and a hat will help prevent losing body heat. Bring pets indoors. If they can't come inside, make sure they have enough shelter to keep them warm and that they can get to unfrozen water. If you are using a space heater, place it on a level, hard surface and keep anything flammable, such as paper, curtains, bedding or rugs at least 3 feet away. Turn off space heaters and make sure fireplace embers are out before leaving the room or going to bed. If you use a fireplace, apply a glass or metal fire screen large enough to catch sparks or rolling logs. Run water, even at a trickle, to help prevent your pipes from freezing. Keep the garage doors closed if there are water lines in the garage. Keep the thermostat at the same temperature day and night. Your heating bill may be a little higher, but you could avoid a more costly repair job if your pipes freeze and burst. Your kitchen is for cooking. Never use the stove or oven to heat your home, and do not operate a generator inside your home or garage.

District. So be mindful that the sprinklers in your favorite park will come on during the day on Tuesday. Most watering begins around 10 a.m. and stops stops around 2 p.m., depending on the size of the park. FYI, the Landscape

Department does not control the two parks on Sundial Drive east of Del Webb Boulevard (Sundial east park and Sundial central park), so be aware that sometime on Tuesday the irrigation will come on.

I temporarily put signs on the entry to the other parks as a reminder to residents of the watering schedule.

Also with cold weather comes the chance of ice, so be careful at all times. If you see ice please, report it ASAP to me at 254-4092 or Lydia at 363-7655. If the grass has frost or is frozen, try not to walk on it as it will cause damage to the grass. (If need be, to pick up after your dog, please try to walk straight from the sidewalk and then back. Thank you.)

If you have roses and need to move, prune or want to plant more at this time, now is the time to do it. Most nurseries will start to stock roses now. I hope everyone had a wonderful holiday.




