DREC From the Executive Director

The Hot Topic is Golf

Improving the practice area will increase revenue through higher green fees and additional outside play.



If you attended the February 2 Board of Directors' meeting you know that golf is a "hot" topic in Sun City Summerlin. The golf course consultant had a long list of recommendations regarding our golf operations, and following his presentations your Association staff has been evaluating those recommendations. Staff felt that immediate action was warranted on a few of the recommendations, those being: 1. The development of a new Golf Summerlin Website; 2. Implementation of a dynamic pricing tool; 3. Renovation and removal of sand bunkers on Highland Falls Golf Course; and 4. Reconstruction and refurbishment of the Highland Falls Golf Course practice facilities.

New Golf Summerlin Website on Its Way. The Board approved the development and maintenance of a golf website by contract with 1-2-1-Marketing, a very experienced golf course website developer. The cost for the creation and maintenance of the site is very reasonable – \$219 per month. For that fee, 1-2-1-Marketing will develop a new website, provide easy tee-time booking, assist with email marketing; collect statistical details; and assist with online pro-shop sales and event registration. An improved website will help solve one of our current challenges–not enough outside play on our golf courses.

Dynamic Pricing. Dynamic pricing or demand pricing for our golf courses is similar to the tool used by the airline, rental car and hotel industries that adjusts the price structure taking into account seasonal demand, tourist traffic, market conditions, weather and other factors that affect the value of each individual tee time. Dynamic Pricing is supposed to maximize revenue hour by hour, and thereby maximize revenue.

The Board directed staff to research dynamic pricing tools and bring back a cost-effective solution for implementation at our three golf courses.

Bunker Removal and Refurbishment. Recurring complaints from Golf Summerlin golfers is the poor quality of our sand bunkers. To confirm this sentiment, the golf consultant recommended that we remove some bunkers and rebuild others. By doing this, the general feeling is that we will improve the playability of the courses and gain more repeat rounds from golfers.

Reconstruction of Highland Falls Golf Course Practice Area. At the gateway to the Highland Falls Golf Course, the practice area is not as attractive as it needs to be and is not functional for larger events, training, maintenance and quality practice. Improving the practice area will increase revenue through higher green fees, additional outside play, improved playing conditions and reduced maintenance expenses.

These improvements will enable us to better fill our tee sheets, while reducing the amount of revenue required from SCSCAI to pay operating costs at all three golf courses.

Association to Review Proposed Budgets, March 14-16

he formal budgeting process began on January 25 with budget preplanning meetings between our executive director and the department heads. The next step in the process will take place on February 25 at the Finance Committee meeting, I p.m., Desert Vista. It will deal with the result of the preplanning meetings and assist in developing the proposed budget.

Hearings on the details (line items) of the proposed budget will be held over three days, March 14-16, from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m., in the Committee Room at Desert Vista.

The Finance Committee will meet on March 24 at 2 p.m. to review the result of the hearings and make its recommendations concerning the budget to the Board of Directors

On April 5 the proposed budget will be presented to the Board for approval. Since the Board will have participated in the budget and Finance Committee hearings, there is every likelihood that the budget will pass on April 5 or very shortly thereafter. All members will receive a summary of the proposed budget and notification of the Board's approval before April 30.

On June 28, the Board will meet to obtain member ratification of the new budget for the fiscal year of July 1, 2016, to June 30, 2017.

TECHNOLOG Information Technology

Behind-the-Scenes Projects Boost Service, Cut Costs

he Information Technology Committee recommends to the SCSCAI Board of Directors new projects that will improve the operations of Sun City. One of the great things about advances in IT is that new technologies often can be cheaper, better and faster, and that is what the IT Committee does when it looks for ways to use IT to improve services to our staff and residents.

Many IT projects are very technical in nature and not readily seen by our residents. Examples include projects for improving our computer backups and making better use of our servers. Other projects directly benefit our residents – for instance, buying Starbright tickets online with reserved seating. No more standing in line before each performance hoping to get a good seat! The most recent IT project that the Board approved was the replacement of the SCSCAI telephone system that will save about \$30,000 per year while providing a more feature-rich telephone system.

And there are more projects being looked at. To name just two, the IT Committee is exploring implementing WI-FI at SCSCAI facilities and installing electronic message boards.



Eat Right for a Long & Healthy Life

Food is about 25-30 percent of the reason why certain people live longer.

ver wonder why some people live longer? Research shows that food is about 25-30 percent of the reason why certain people live longer. Eating a plant-based diet with minimal processed foods and eating less is the key to good nutrition and living longer. The Japanese, for example, follow a principle called hari hachi bu, which means eat until you're 80 percent full. By the time your brain catches up with your stomach, you will be full!

Here are some tips, from people who live the longest:

Eat from a smaller plate or bowl. A standard 3-ounce serving of protein (the size of a deck of cards) is dwarfed by our 12-inch plates. A halfcup of pasta (the size of a billiard ball) barely covers the bottom of our oversized pasta bowls. Use a small bowl and a salad plate for your meals, and you won't feel deprived.

Eat less meat. You don't have to swear off meat completely. Just forgo the beef, chicken or pork one or two nights a week. You'll save money and consume less fat and cholesterol.



Keep healthy food around and ready to eat. Wash and chop up veggies, display fruit on the counter in a bowl, and cook healthy whole grains in batches so they're ready to eat. Keep dips and salsas on hand for guilt-free dipping. Veggies and low-fat dip or hummus are suddenly more appealing when you can just grab them and go.

Eat whole food. The closer a food is to its original state, the better it will be for you. You can make pasta with a fresh tomato sauce in the time it takes to make a box of macaroni and cheese, but you'll feel much better after you eat it.

It's never too late! With a few small changes, we can all add years to our lives.

Charli's Corner

The One Exercise That Will Save Your Dignity



quats are one of the most effective exercises you can do in your daily life. Doing a proper squat helps to strengthen your entire body – joints, bones and muscles – increases your flexibility and helps you to stay independent and strong.

How to do a Proper Sit to Stand Squat:

- Stand with your back to a sturdy chair, about 12 inches in front of the chair. Your feet should be slightly wider than your hips, toes turned outward 5 to 15 degrees. Look straight ahead, put your arms straight out in front of you, keeping your back straight.
- 2. Bend at your hips, pushing your butt back toward the chair. Keep sending your hips backward as your knees begin to bend. It's important to start with your hips, followed by your back and knees. Stay centered over the middle of your feet. (I call this position the PPP, "porta-potty position.") If you lead



your squat with your knees, you will end up making a mess on your shoes!

3. Touch the chair with your butt without sitting. Keep everything tight and push yourself back up off the chair by pushing through the heels and balls of your feet, keeping your knees over the center of your feet. Stand and repeat.

If you can't quite reach the chair, go as far as you can and make touching the chair your goal. Practicing your squat will make you stronger and may keep you from having to call someone to help lift you off the potty, saving your dignity. Happy squatting!

Appointments Available for Free AARP Tax Help

AARP volunteers provide free income tax preparation for Sun City residents through April 15. The service is offered in the Mint room at Mountain Shadows on Thursdays and Fridays. Appointments are necessary and must be made in person with the Social Monitor at Mountain Shadows. Taxpayers need to bring a copy of last year's return and Social Security cards along with all W2s, 1099 R, INT, DIV, MISC, Social Security SSA-1099, W2Gs and broker statements with purchase date and cost of any stocks or bonds sold. Add 1095-A if health insurance was purchased through Nevada Health Link and 1095-B if provided by employer. You also will need receipts for itemized deductions for medical expenses, mortgage interest, real estate taxes paid, gifts to charity and any other miscellaneous deductions. Note we can prepare returns only for electronic filing with the Internal Revenue Service. Paper returns are not permitted. We cannot prepare state returns or returns with rental, business or partnership (K-1) income, other than simple interest, dividends and capital gains.

Make Sure Medications Do Not Impair Your Driving


hen we read about motorists who are stopped by police because they appear to be driving while under the influence (DUI), most readers assume that the driver has had too much alcohol to drink. In

fact, under the influence also may be someone who is taking illegal drugs or driving after taking legally prescribed medications.

Many older drivers are taking legally prescribed medications ranging from a simple low-dose aspirin to stronger meds that treat blood pressure, cardiac illnesses or other major medical problems. While taking these medications, whether over the counter or by prescription, it is vital that instructions on the medicine vial are heeded.

Most state laws do not differentiate between alcohol and other drugs when it comes to impaired driving. A driver impaired by prescription or over-the-counter medications could just as easily be arrested and charged with a DUI as someone impaired by alcohol. Penalties of impaired driving while using alcohol or any other drug, elicit heavy fines, possible jail sentences and revocation of license. Drug Recognition Experts (DREs) are specially trained police officers who follow specific guidelines to determine drug impairment in motorists. DREs closely evaluate a driver's eye movements, behavior and other clues pointing to drug impairment before measuring for the presence of drugs. Sedatives, antidepressants, decongestants and pain relievers are among common medications that can impair drivers.

If a medication you are taking is labeled, "Do not use while operating heavy machinery," that warning includes a 4,000-pound automobile, as well as a golf cart. Remember, while you have a responsibility to maintain your own health, it is important to understand cautious use of your medicines, so as not to endanger yourself or others.

A resident has the privilege of joining as many or as few of our clubs and organizations as they wish





s a member of the Sun City Summerlin Community Association, a resident has the privilege of joining as many or as few of our clubs and organizations as they wish. The rules and regulations of these clubs and organizations fall under the purview of the Charted Clubs and Community Organizations Committee (CCOC).

Inasmuch as my term as a director on the Association's Board expires and I am not seeking re-election, I will no longer be chairwoman of this committee. However, I do hope to remain on the committee. Residents are invited to attend all meetings of the CCOC, which are generally held on the first Thursday of each month in the Committee Room at Desert Vista.

The CCOC is composed of residents interested in being appointed to serve on this committee. The CCOC approves charters for new clubs and organizations, mediates problems a club may have as to rules and regulations, assures that all the necessary financial documents are filed, and it can revoke a charter with the Board's approval. If you wish to form a new club, you need only to obtain 50 signatures of residents interested in forming such a club. Once that is accomplished the club must file an application with CCOC. If CCOC approves the club, it makes a recommendation to the Board of Directors, as the BOD also must approve the charter. With the approval of Sun City's Board, the club becomes an official community club.

Melissa Spina is the Director of Community Services. Melissa sets the agenda of the CCOC with the approval of the committee. She also answers questions concerning the documents a club or organization must file. She holds an annual meeting for all new officers of the various clubs and provides each club with a copy of the Chartered Clubs and Community Organizations Procedures manual. Keeping Hungry Rabbits at Bay

Choose plants that are stinky and gooey to rabbits . . . even plants we might think smell good may be icky to rabbits



hey can be our furry, cute little friends that make wonderful pets and sometimes even deliver colorful, sweet-tasting eggs, but they also can be very bad for the landscape. Most plants are edible and very tasty to rabbits. As they eat their way through our landscape and as the areas outside Sun City dry out, those fuzzy little friends will be looking at your garden as a smorgasbord with no cover charge.

Rabbits have very sensitive noses so chemical barriers work very well, but you have to apply them frequently. Of course, physical barriers work, too, but most barriers are not allowed in the community unless you are very artistic, and they tend to take away the beauty from your garden. The last option is to choose plants that are stinky and gooey to rabbits. Even plants we might think smell good may be icky to rabbits. I have included a list of plants here that rab-

bits usually pass up; however, please remember that hungry rabbits will eat just about anything. If it's a plant that they usually do not like, they may still be attracted to it when the plant is young. In general, rabbits will stay away from cactus and yucca. The plant's genus, Euphorbia, has more than 200 varieties known to repel rabbits. Some of the varieties around Sun City include the gopher plant, fire stick and Turk's caps. You also might want to search the Internet for rabbit-resistant plants of the Southwest.

Keep in mind the word "resistant" does not mean it's guaranteed that rabbits will not eat it.

I hope this helps as you plan your spring gardens, and that the season is a wonderful time for everyone.

Being a Leader Means Making No Excuses

Are there born leaders, or can one learn to be a great leader?

Il of us are a leader of one sort or other in our current life. We may be a leader in our church or synagogue, the head of a family, a civic leader, a leader on the Patrol board or in a lead staff position, a club president or just leading by the example we set wherever we may be.

So what are the principles and tactics of leadership? Are there born leaders, or can one learn to be a great leader?

Jocko Willink and Leif Babin, two U.S. Navy SEAL officers, present four principles and eight tactics in their book "Extreme Ownership (How U.S. Navy SEALS Lead and Win)." Both were

> combat veterans tasked with bringing Ramadi, Iraq, under control. Chris Kyle, America's best sniper, was on their team. After their combat duty was completed, Willink and Babin became instructors in leadership at the West Coast SEAL training center in California. They now consult with large and small business leaders that want to be better.

> The first principle is in the title of the book – Extreme Ownership. One bad day in Ramadi the team experienced friendly fire, where a friendly Iraqi soldier was killed by a member of the SEAL team. Upon hearing about the incident, a meeting with all concerned personnel was called. Team leader Willink gathered the facts from the team

members and prepared a PowerPoint presentation. After reviewing what he had prepared, he stewed about it for several days as he thought something was missing. It finally dawned on him that he was missing. When the meeting started several days later he asked the group, "Whose fault was this?" Interestingly, each member claimed the incident was his fault (taking extreme ownership), and stated why. Each time Willink said, "No, it wasn't your fault, and he again asked, "Whose fault was it?"

After all members had responded, Willink said, "There is only one person to blame for this: Me. I am the commander. I am responsible for the entire operation. As the senior man, I am responsible for every action that takes place on the battlefield. There is no one to blame but me. And I will tell you right now: I will make sure that nothing like this will ever happen again."

The top leader took full (extreme) ownership of the event, as did the subordinate leaders. No excuses, no blaming others, no pointing fingers at anyone else. The team leader also indicated he was going to fix the problem.

None of us are perfect; we are human beings very subject to making mistakes. No leader expects perfect performance, he/she only expects the best effort and a willingness to learn from the mistake or error, and then improve our performance.

Do you know there are 73 miles of Las Vegas city streets within our Sun City Summerlin? These streets are controlled and maintained by the city of Las Vegas. He was born in Michigan and lived in Flint, Traverse City and Petoskey, and worked in the public schools. His choir at Petoskey High School (about 900 students) grew from a six-member group to the Outstanding Public High School Choir in the State in 1980!

Dennis then went on to teach music in some private schools, and he and his wife, Shelle, finally decided to go west in 1994. They used Las Vegas as their entry point to Southern California, and after four interviews there decided to come back to Vegas where he found a music job and they became permanent residents.

In 1996, Dennis started work at Cheyenne High School and was offered the job of both choir and orchestral director at the new Centennial High School in 1999. He worked there until 2002 when he retired from teaching due to the development of hyperacusis, a condition he said, causes "a collapsed tolerance to normal environmental sounds and the ears lose most of their dynamic range." It was painful and quite distressing for a man, who, so dearly loved the sound of perfect music.


