Community Standards is the department in Sun City that works with ARC to ensure all CC&R's and Development Standards are met

hy do we need an Architectural Review Committee? Why is it the only committee created by Sun City's CC&R's? All of the other Sun City Summerlin committees were approved by the Board of Directors and their authority granted by the bylaws of our community.

During the founding of our homeowners' association, Del Webb reasoned that control of the exterior of our residences and public buildings was important for the image of Sun City. As such, ARC was placed in charge of enforcing rules regarding all exterior projects. Nearly 30 years later, people still comment on our beautiful structures.

I joined ARC shortly after my move to Sun City in 1999. I have served as the committee's chairman and co-chairman for 12 years. BOD member Ken Caroccia has been chairman of ARC for the past four years. In July, I returned to ARC as its chairman.

One change that will ultimately apply to all

homes in Sun City is exterior painting. SCSCAI's Community Standards Office has an extensive, approved list of color combinations that you may use to pick the look for your house. Remember, when you want to change anything on the exterior of your residence, you must get an application from the Community Standards Office at Mountain Shadows. Submitting your request to that office with good backup to support your intended project will lead to a prompt decision by members of ARC within five days. If you are a member of a subassociation, you must have the signature of your sub-association president on the application form before ARC can act on your request.

By enforcing the Development Standards, ARC provides a basis for strong real estate values.

Thank you to all residents who continue to refresh the exterior of your homes. It has resulted in a community where seniors are still seeking home ownership and real estate value is good.

House Checks a Valuable Service to Homeowners un City Summerlin Security Patrol is pleased to provide residents who have a valid SCSCAI membership a service to inspect the exterior of their property while they are vacationing or away from their home for a short period.

Security Patrol volunteers will check the house by walking around the property as much as access allows and will follow up on anything unusual with the emergency contact or resident. House

checks will be made everyother day for a total period of 30 days. Security Patrol is unable to provide house checks for residents absent from their homes for extended periods of time (ie snowbirds), or for homes that are vacant while they are being marketed for sale, or pending rental occupancy. The service is free, but resi-

dents may make a donation to the Patrol if they wish.

Residents requesting this service must:

- Come into the Security Patrol office in person to make the request and sign the form authorizing the Patrol access to the property.
- Bring in and show their current SCSCAI membership card (owner or renter).
- Have current emergency contact information on file. If not, a form must be completed and submitted before a house check request can be accepted. Ideally, the emergency contact should have a key to the house.
- Ensure that all the doors are locked and all the window latches are closed prior to leaving the home.
- Stop mail and newspaper deliveries or have a neighbor collect them. Also arrange for parcels to be taken in.

Paul Henderson, SCSCAI executive director, reported:


He and Food and Beverage manager Barbi

Do You Know?

How to File a Community Complaint



Do you know how to file a complaint with the Community Standards Office? This office handles all complaints regarding violations of our Sun City Summerlin Development Standards and many of the CC&R's. The procedure is as simple as going to the office (located in the craft/patio area of Mountain Shadows) with your Sun City Summerlin identification card and completing a brief form. Complainants may choose to remain anonymous.

At various committee meetings, Coffee With the Board and the Board of Directors' meetings, residents often voice complaints to those assemblies only to be told they must first file a formal written complaint at the Office of Community Standards.

Frequent complaints reported to Community Standards include: unkept landscapes, neglecting to pick up pet waste, unauthorized garage sales and feeding pigeons, which, by doing so, can attract rodents and coyotes.

Once a complaint has been filed with Community Standards, it is investigated. If deemed necessary, a letter is sent to the owner of the residence stating the problem. With a swift correction of the problem, the procedure ends there. However, full hearing and appeals procedures can follow. This progression is clearly stated in our Sun City governing documents.

Of course, it is always much better if the situation can be resolved among residents themselves. But if that does not bring about a satisfactory solution, filing a complaint is the next step.

(Note: All other complaints, regarding issues not outlined in SCSCAI's governing documents, must be made through the office of the executive director.)

CPC—Your Neighborhood Watch Dog

orming a Neighborhood Watch group is a remarkably effective crime-fighting tool that's easy to set up. Typically, the group selects a resident block captain who hosts the initial meeting in the neighborhood. Most Neighborhood Watch groups involve 10 to 25 homes within easy walking distance of everyone. Starting a Neighborhood Watch should involve minimal effort of modest paperwork to gather members' contact information and a few initial meetings to get to know everyone. The concept is one of neighbors helping neighbors by noticing their routine habits.

Typically, meetings are held in the neighborhood and hosted by the appointed block captain. A free room also may be reserved for Neighborhood Watch meetings at Desert Vista Community Center. For information on reserving a room, call 363-3581.

A Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department crime prevention specialist will attend and lead the initial meeting, making sure that all prospective members introduce themselves and tell everyone where they live. The Police crime prevention specialist also will discuss the general purpose of the Neighborhood Watch program, while offering home security and crime prevention tips that have worked for estab-

lished groups. The material reviews techniques about recognizing suspicious activities and how to report them. After the initial group forms, instructional provisions, including a "Please Join" form, will be given to the block captain for distribution to all neighborhood residents. That information should include why you are starting a Neighborhood Watch.

After that, you'll need to decide how often you want to meet – one suggestion from a seasoned community block captain is "quarterly, or as often as needed to address security problems."

The last thing you'll need to do is prepare a neighbors' contact list, including the address, telephone number/s and email address of everyone in the Neighborhood Watch group. This is how the group will keep in touch with one another. Generally, an effective Neighborhood Watch creates a sense of awareness to help improve neighborhood safety.

How to Train Your Brain When Forgetfulness Occurs

ave you forgotten a lunch date with a friend? Can't find your keys or membership card? Forgetting is frustrating, but you don't have to resign yourself to it as a part of old age.

Although age may bring a decline in efficiency in learning new information, many parts of the brain generally remain untouched. These include areas associated with language, meaning, creativity and wisdom. In addition, age has little effect on habit-based (procedural) memory, which stores skills developed by repetition and practice – like riding a bike.

You can capitalize on procedural memory skills to sharpen everyday memory and speed up information processing. This allows you to take advantage of other invaluable skills, such as insight and experience, which can only be acquired over time. Here's how:

Keep a calendar. Every day you are bombarded with information coming from all directions – names, numbers, passwords, to-do lists. Trying to track too many tedious details can actually make you more prone to memory lapses. Instead, create a calendar and organization system to help you keep extraneous information readily available and free up brain space for more important tasks.

Organize the clutter. Keeping your environment clutter-free and relatively organized can help minimize distractions and improve memory. For example, make a habit of always returning your keys and handbag or wallet to a designated place. This makes it simple to find them next time. Putting mail in order can help you stay on top of the endless stream of mail and paper that enters the home.

Focus your attention. Attention is an important part of memory processing. It takes concentration to input information into your brain so that it can be stored and retrieved properly. Slow down and focus on the task at hand.

Cross-train your brain. Just as you might exercise your body to gain physical strength, you can also exercise your brain to increase working memory capacity. Early research suggests that

brain-training programs may improve aspects of memory, mental processing speed and ability to perform everyday activities. Brain-training programs can be found online or you can create your own. Engage in mentally stimulating games – such as bridge or chess, doing more complex crafts or reading. Challenge yourself and target a range of skills –working jigsaw puzzles to sharpen spatial relationship skills and playing fast-paced card games, such as speed or slapjack, with your grandchild to increase mental processing speed.

Try new things. Studies show that older adults learn new skills as well as younger adults do. While younger adults may mentally process faster, older adults can apply more wisdom and experience. Stay curious, take a class, explore a new city, try new foods or use technology.

Exercise. Studies show that people who are physically active are less likely to experience a decline in mental function and have a lowered risk of developing Alzheimer's disease.



Smith Machine for Your Shoulders The Upright Row

id you know that it is important to use different machines, equipment, weight and exercises when strengthening your muscles? When you do the same exercises three times a week for more than two to three months at a time your muscles will adapt and you will no longer see improvements in your strength and conditioning. The Smith Machine offers you an opportunity to challenge your muscles and create more strength for your body in a way your body may not be used to.

When using a new piece of equipment be careful with how much weight you use. Too much weight can lead to bad form, which can cause injury. Always start with no weight or light weight on the bar.

Here is how to do an upright row that will help you as you strengthen your shoulders.

- Set the bar on the Smith Machine to a height that is at the middle of your thighs. Grasp the bar with an over-hand grip shoulder width apart.
- 2. Lift the bar up and rotate it off the rack, then extend your arms with a slight bend in your elbow keeping your back straight. This is your starting position.
- 3. Use your shoulders to lift the bar until your elbows are level with your chest as you exhale.
- 4. As you bring the bar up, keep your body close to the bar and your elbows will drive the motion by keeping them higher than your forearms.
- 5. Lower the bar back down slowly to the starting position. Inhale as you perform this portion of the movement.
- 6. Repeat for 10 to 15 repetitions and two to three sets.

Caution: If you suffer from serious shoulder problems, using dumbbells may be a better option than the Smith Machine, or ask a fitness specialist for an alternative shoulder exercise.
