## September Fire Safety Class to Target Information for Seniors

Sun City's Neighborhood Watch/Community Preparedness Committee has engaged Timothy R. Szymanski, the Public Education & Information Officer (PEIO) for Las Vegas Fire & Rescue, to instruct a class on fire protection for seniors. The session is scheduled for Wednesday, September 5, 6:30 p.m., at Desert Vista. Tim has been in fire service for more than 40 years, working in positions from firefighter/paramedic to fire chief. He is a Nevada-certified fire service master instructor and holds national and state certifications in multiple areas of fire service. His notable awards include the Liberty Mutual National Fire-mark Award for Community Education and the Community Service Award from the Nevada Broadcasters Association. Tim's professional point of view will focus on senior fire safety-related issues while emphasizing the prudence of summoning fire emergency responders quickly, rather than attempting to extinguish even a small cooking fire that can quickly escalate into a possible life threatening situation. According to Tim, seniors may have mobility concerns that inhibit them from hurriedly escaping a fire,

> "It's wiser to get out of the house and let emergency responders deal with the fire," Tim said. Tim also will address the danger associated with cooking in a garage, which frequently takes place in Sun City. He'll also touch on the use of generators, faulty wiring

and keeping fire extinguishers and home smoke detectors in working condition. This will be important information for Sun City homeowners and Tim will welcome questions from residents in the audience. If you plan to attend, please leave a telephone message at 702-658-4486. Be sure to let the committee know how many guests will be in your party so that we can plan adequate seating and refreshments.

#### Grand Canyon Caverns & Kingman Railroad Museum

The Grand Canyon Caverns are the largest dry caverns in the United States, located 200 to 300 feet below the surface. Guests enter and leave the caverns by means of an exploration elevator, dropping 21 stories underground, making the caverns easily accessible. Because the caverns are so deep underground, the temperature is always constant, a mild 56 degrees and there is zero humidity. The caverns offer a number of unique geological formations that can be easily viewed from smoothly paved walking trails. The walking trails have handrails and there are a number of benches for resting along the way. With the cooperation of the City of Kingman and a mission to preserve the historical Railroad Depot, the Whistle Stop Railroad Club has created, operates and maintains the Kingman Railroad Museum. The club

is composed of volunteers who have a shared interest in finding and obtaining railroad memorabilia and in sharing these with the public. Their educational and attractive layouts are on display for you to enjoy.



Los Angeles Museum of the Holocaust (LAMOTH) is the oldest survivor-founded Holocaust museum in the United States. In 1961, at Hollywood High School, a group of survivors taking English as a Second Language classes found one another and shared their experiences. They discovered that each of them had a photograph, a concentration camp uniform, or other precious primary source objects from the Holocaust era. They decided that these artifacts needed a permanent home where they could be displayed safely and in perpetuity. They also wanted a place to memorialize their dead and help educate the world so that no one would ever forget. Some of these founding survivors remain active on the LAMOTH Board of Directors today.

## Always On Call

#### Security Patrol Volunteers Serve Sun City 24/7

Boards of Directors are concerned about budgets, assets and employees. In a volunteer organization that serves this community 24/7 morale and maintaining membership is key to its fulfilling its mandate. Strict adherence to the budget is key to its efficiency. Security Patrol Chief Darlene Vaturi and Treasurer Jim Strom both have backgrounds in finance. "It's about saving the community money," said Chief Vaturi. "Without the Patrol, the Association would have to increase the dues for private security."

"My concern, as treasurer, is fiscal integrity, and my goal is to reduce the workload by developing a system allowing the computer to do the computation for the

budget," added Jim. "With the assistance of Fred Bailey, we input the gas mileage of each car, fuel costs, checks for purchases and any other costs. All are inputted into the spreadsheet." Donations are used to purchase coffee, water and other items needed at the base.

Linda Engebretson, Assistant Chief,

supervises the watch commanders in addition to her duties assisting the chief. "My goal is to improve working as a team. We have people working in the background jobs – timekeepers, social committee, special events

in the community that require the presence of Patrol volunteers, pet officers – they need to be recognized."

Nan Stevenson, Head of Personnel, agreed. Nan, a retired psychotherapist, a board-certified hospital chaplain and an employee assistance program (EAP) representative, said "The back-office people need more recognition for the jobs they do. These volunteers also serve as drivers, dispatchers, watch commanders

We have about 218 members and at least 100 are involved in the back-office jobs." Stevenson continued, "Personnel is a huge job. I am fortunate to have an assistant, Carol Friedman, who is working on a handbook for the head of personnel. We need to continue with mentors in each discipline. Once a member is trained, there are many incidents that come up while on duty. Mentors can help there." Sometimes, there are issues that require Personnel intervention. "I try to communicate with kindness.

That includes communicating with the heads of disciplines to get to the heart of the problem," Nan said.

Barbara has served as a training officer and continues as a dispatcher. "I initially trained as a driver and served as a driver for over a year before I trained as a dispatcher. That, in addition to having been a training officer, has given me a great understanding of the functions and importance of all the disciplines and how they interact with others to accomplish our goals. It is easy for us to think someone else's job is easier or less important, but often when we actually do that job, we learn what is involved and appreciate it more."

Engebretson agreed. "Information officers need to know the responsibilities of the drivers; drivers need to know what the dispatcher responsibilities are in order to assist them; dispatchers need to understand the responsibilities of the watch commanders in order to assist them, and watch commanders must be familiar with all the disciplines in order to solve any problems that come up. "As assistant chief, the more I understand the disciplines, the better I can keep the chief informed, and that helps us operate smoothly."

As for the goals of the chief: "My goals are increasing membership with the tools we have – the recruiting team and our members - and improved changes in training.

Teamwork is top priority at Security Patrol agree Jim Strom, Barbara Aimone and Nan Stevenson.



Summing up Security Patrol's place in this community, Barbara said "Security Patrol is an important and integral part of our community, and it provides residents with assistance they do not have in other communities. In addition to the crime deterrent, we provide 24/7 presence on the streets. Residents are more likely to call Security Patrol than Metro with a concern about another resident or other issues. We can also respond faster than Metro to those non-emergency situations."

Residents can see the new trash cans and sizes that will be delivered to their homes in September as part of Republic Services' new collection program. The cans will be on display throughout the month in the lobby areas of each community center.

### New Trash Service Coming to Sun City

Republic Services held three meetings in June to offer residents information on the new trash program set to start in Sun City in September. The program consists of a new pickup schedule, as well as new trash cans that will be required for residents to use. Two weeks before the program begins,

homeowners will receive a start-up letter from Republic Services that will include the start date, the pickup schedule and other important information. DO NOT throw this letter away. Next, two trash cans will be delivered to each home in Sun City. The 35-gallon containers are free to residents and will be designated for trash (with a black lid) and recyclables (with a light blue lid). Republic Services asks that residents use the initial trash cans for at least a month before requesting a larger size. Trash cans are available in 35-gallon, 65-gallon and 95-gallon capacities. If, after a month you require a larger trash can, or do not wish to participate in recycling, you may call to request a larger trash can, as well as to have the recyclable container picked up.

The second part of the program involves a change in the pickup schedule. Currently, Sun City has its trash picked up twice a week. The new program will reduce the service to once-a-week pickup with Tuesday designated as trash day. In addition, Republic Services will pick up bulk trash, such as landscape debris and other items too large to fit inside the trash can, every other week.

Perhaps the biggest question raised by residents at the meeting concerned residents who are not able to maneuver the trash cans to the street due to physical limitations. That question was answered in this way: "Republic Services offers a disability service if you are unable to roll your container to the street. You do have to place your container on your driveway up against your closed garage door. The driver will roll the container to the truck, dump the container and place it back at your garage door. In order to request this service, a resident must fill out a form and provide information about their disability. Residents may pick up the form at the Administration Office at Mountain Shadows, or call Republic Services (702-735-5151) to have the form mailed to them.

Other questions asked by residents included the storage of the trash cans. The reply from the Association stated

that the Architectural Review Committee is working on a solution for outside storage. That information will be published when it is available. Republic Services also has offered to host another meeting in September to answer additional questions to help make the transition as easy as possible. 
#### Residents' Forum Planning a September Double-header

## THE PRACTICE OF MEDITATION

(Part two of our three-part series)

In the July Link, I shared the many benefits of meditation. Now, it's time to learn how to do it. While there are many different types of meditation, in this series I will focus on three methods to help get you started.

#### **GUIDED MEDITATION**

Guided meditation is a great way to start if you have never meditated before. Guided meditation makes use of your imagination and visualization, as well as affirmations that help to create a more positive mind-set. When you get the hang of guided meditation and wish to take your practice to the next level, try a CD, podcast, video or YouTube. Remember to sit in your meditation posture and turn on the audio. Listen and visualize. What you'll need: A chair that you can sit upright in.(NO, a recliner won't work). You should be able to place your feet flat on the floor. If you are short, like I am, be sure to place a pillow under your feet. Your back will be straight and your head in a neutral position when looking to the front. Your hands should be resting in your lap with your palms up and thumbs and pointer finger touching.

#### LOVING KINDNESS MEDITATION

Boost your ability to empathize with others, help create positive emotions through compassion and a loving attitude for yourself and others.

How to do it: Sit in your meditation position, close your eyes and generate in your mind and heart feelings of kindness, goodwill and compassion for yourself, a good friend, a neutral friend, a difficult person or all of the above, and then, gradually, for the entire universe. Finally, the feelings to be set in motion are ones of wishing happiness and wellness for all. The more you practice this meditation the more joy you will experience.

Remember, you can't feel loving kindness and depression at the same time. So choose to feel good!

#### MINDFULNESS MEDITATION

This practice focuses on the present moment, and accepting and paying attention to the sensations, thoughts and emotions that arise.

How to do it: Focus on your breath. Breathe in and notice how it feels; do the same when you breathe out. When your mind wanders, bring it back to your breath. At first this will feel very annoying but it won't take long before you notice your mind isn't wandering as often. This exercise is about being consistent and practicing bringing your focus back, which will make it easier for you to focus and pay attention in other areas of your life.

Now is the time to use your brain to help you get stronger mentally and physically by meditating. Look for my next article on how to create your own meditation practice, and mark your calendar for the Mindfulness Meditation Workshop scheduled for September 28 at Desert Vista.

## Palm Valley Irrigation Project Rolling Along



The irrigation project for the front 9 at Palm Valley Golf Course has begun. The contractor is installing the new mainline. The

construction.



ground is rocky and hard to dig, so things are moving a little slower than originally anticipated. The contractor has brought in a different type of trencher to speed things along. There have been several questions from residents about the different sizes and colors of pipe being used in this project, so I thought I'd try and provide a simple answer: The large, light blue pipe is the mainline. This pipe will provide the main supply of water throughout the course. The smaller purple-colored pipe will be the new lateral lines that supply water to the sprinkler heads. The black pipe is called HDPE, and it is the pipe that will go underneath the road crossings. The contractor is going to install the entire mainline first and then install the lateral lines for each hole after that. Thank you for your patience while we are under

## Further Review Required of Proposed Golf Course Projects

After some further


money on the patio expansion and driveway projects until a final plan for eliminating

Before the project was approved, complete plans, including the appearance of the entrance, would be required by the committee, along with estimated costs. Brandon Black, Director of Building Maintenance, reported on the installation of the shade cover at the bocce ball court at Sun Shadows, as well as the resurfacing of the shuffle board courts at Mountain Shadows and the Pickle Ball courts at Desert Vista.

## Harry (Mac) Hinman

## Distinguished Service, Medals, Memories Part of Naval Aviator's 26-year Career

According to Professor Morris Massey, "What you are is where you were when." More simply put, the major events of your adult formation (teenage) years shape your life and outlook forever. For example, if you were a male baby boomer, the draft and the Vietnam war were major events of your teenage years. It was true for many men; it was true for future Sun City resident Harry (Mac) Hinman.

"I received my draft notice in March, 1968. I was a senior at Cal State Chico. I had already set my sights on being a Navy pilot and had been accepted to attend Aviation Officer Candidate School after graduation. With the help of my on-campus Navy recruiting officer, I obtained permission from the draft board to complete the school year. In September 1968 I joined the inactive reserves. I went on active duty on December 30, 1968, and immediately started Aviation Officer Candidate School. I graduated and was commissioned in May, 1969," Mac recalled.

Thus started what would be a varied, 26-year career in naval aviation. For a boy that grew up in the small town of Redding, Calif., it was to be a life of worldwide travel.

"I was carrier qualified on board the USS Intrepid in January 1970. I received my Naval Aviator designation in April of that year," he said. That kicked off a series of schools: Survival, Evasion, Resistance and Escape in Norfolk, Va., and Gunnery, Tactics and Coordination/ Employment school at Ft. Rucker, Ala.

By that time, it was 1970 and the Vietnam War was still raging. In September, Mac was assigned to Helicopter Attack (Light) Squadron 3, the Seawolves, in Vietnam. They were based on the USS Hunterdon County, a converted WW2 LST, and onshore near the Mekong Delta rivers. (The Light designation referred to the size of the helicopter, not its armament. They were heavily armed.) It was to be a busy year.

"Our job was to provide attack services for anybody that needed it. We supported the 'Brown Water Navy,' the PBRs (Patrol Boat River) that patrolled the delta rivers. At that point, I was a helicopter aircraft commander and fire team leader. In that year in Nam, I flew some 600 combat missions."

After his Nam tour, Mac was assigned to HS-10 for training and then HS-4 on the USS Ticonderoga. These squadrons were carrier-based anti-submarine SH-3D-type helicopters. During this rotation, Mac found time to get married. He and Ruth married in October 1972. In September 1973, Mac was ordered to Iran to serve a technical assistance field team chief, an advisor for the Shah's aviation arm.

"I was on my way to Iran, flying over the Atlantic on October 6 when the Yom Kippur war between Israel and Egypt and Syria started. We diverted to Beirut. As we landed, I noticed that the Lebanese army was bivouacked right next to the landing strip. Suddenly, I saw a sleeping bag sucked into the No. 1 engine. I called the flight attendant and pointed that out. The pilot came out to talk to me and basically asked, 'Do you want to stay here for possible repairs?' I thought about that for a second and answered, 'No. Let's rev the engine and if it sounds good,

let's get out of here.' The pilot agreed and we took off ASAP."

Ruth joined him in Iran in December. She got a job teaching at the Iranian Naval Academy in order to get resident alien status.

U.S. Navy Captain Harry (Mac) Hinman has received The Legion of Merit, the Meritorious Service Medal with Gold Star, the Air Medal with 18 strike flights, the Vietnam Service Medal and so many other honors for his military service. He and his wife, Ruth, moved to Sun City in 2003.



Later, Mac was relocated to Bushehr on the Persian Gulf. At that point he was traveling frequently. So when the assignment was over, and the Hinmans relocated to Pensacola, Fla., no one was unhappy. Mac was a pilot instructor and Ruth was a mom; their first son was born there.

But you don't get to stay in one place very long if you are in the Navy. The next assignment was to HSL-35 (Helicopter Antisubmarine Light) based in San Diego.

It was spring of 1978. Mac was assigned as the OIC (officer in charge) of a LAMPS (Light Airborne Multi-Purpose System) detachment aboard the USS Kincaid. The mission: Over the horizon surveillance and anti-submarine patrols. That assignment lasted until the summer of '79 at which point he was assigned to wing staff as the safety and standards officer.

In the spring of 1982, he was on the move again, this time to Norfolk Va. He was assigned as XO (executive officer) of HSL-30, the East Coast RAG (Replacement Air Group) for LAMPS.

In the spring of '84, he was off to El Salvador and Panama onboard the USS Deyo. The mission: training Army pilots in tactics developed by the Navy. (This was somewhat ironic since, in the early days of Vietnam, the Seawolves were trained by Army pilots.) He was then promoted to CO (commanding officer) of HSL-36 in Jacksonville Fla. In July 1987, HSL-36 was back at sea with a mission to provide air assets to the Atlantic fleet's cruisers, destroyers and frigates.

Another series of schools followed before Mac was assigned to the USS Guadalcanal in ... Norfolk Va. as

operations officer from January 1988 to January 1990. During this time period, ...

Then driving west along Cheyenne Avenue, between Rampart Boulevard and the I-215, you have most certainly noticed the beautiful stained glass window at the Mountain View Lutheran Church. But did you know that this magnificent work is the inspiration and creation of one of our Sun City Summerlin neighbors, Roger Hall?

Roger says his artistic interests and talents are most certainly inherited. His great grandmother Hall was an artist of acclaim in Europe. Growing up, Roger and his artist brother often painted side by side, using watercolors and oils. For Roger, this work with color was, then, only a hobby.

Roger received his education in California schools after his family migrated to California from Iowa. He served in the United States Air Force Reserve. With his degree in electrical engineering and membership in the Reserve, Roger traveled the world. It was during these travels, especially in Europe, that he became fascinated with the stained glass windows he saw there.

Roger and his wife, Sarah, moved to Sun City Summerlin 18 years ago. He said they researched many adult retirement communities and found Sun City Summerlin to be the place they wished to settle. It was only then that he transferred his love of color to the medium of stained

glass. For several years Roger worked on his new hobby in his garage.

When his church's congregation relocated from the downtown area of Las Vegas to its present location on Cheyenne Avenue, Roger asked if he might create some windows for the first structure that was erected. These 6-foot windows now honor members of his family. The church then built a dedicated sanctuary building that is most visible from Cheyenne Avenue. Having witnessed Roger's talents while working with stained glass, several members of the congregation approached him to determine his interest in designing a stained glass work for the 70-foot-by-40-foot space fronting Cheyenne Avenue. Roger was interested.

He presented a paper pattern to the committee that was accepted. The biblical theme Roger chose to depict was, "The world's end of time taken from the book of Matthew," he explained.

With the design in place, the next step of fundraising began. The amount needed for the window was



significant. Members of the church held many events to raise the money.

After a few years, the funds were available and construction began. The actual creation and installation of the window was a monumental effort of cooperation among architects, engineers and craftsmen. One serious consideration was the sheer weight of the glass itself. Once the window was installed and services began to be held in the sanctuary, some adjustments were needed. One consideration was the strength of our Nevada sunlight coming through the window and shining on the worshipers. For a while shades had to be installed. The effect of the exterior lights that illuminate the window at night had to be fine-tuned for evening services. Today, Roger's creation is enjoyed by those within the sanctuary and passersby.

Roger is now an active member of our Sun City Stained Glass Club. He enjoys working in the Club's facilities, but even more enjoys the camaraderie with fellow Club members.

Asked if he sells any of his stained glass works, Roger said, "I never sell anything." Presently, he is enjoying making sun catchers and mobiles for his grandchildren and great grandchildren.

In answer to the question if he ever instructs on stained glass techniques, Roger related a story of teaching fifth-graders at the Mountain View Lutheran School. "First of all, I learned I had to separate the boys and the girls," he said. Each child got to choose what he/she wanted to make. Asked if he would teach again, Roger indicated that the experience would be his one foray into stained glass instruction.

# Executive Director's Report for the August Link Magazine

In the June issue of the Link Bob Cohen wrote an article on what a Conceptual Idea (CI) is and the process used by staff to investigate it. In a nutshell, a CI is a procedure I use to properly research items requested by the Board, clubs, committees and individual homeowners, and to evaluate and quantify the need, the impact on the community as a whole and the impact short and long term on the Association finances. As homeowners at Sun City Summerlin Community Association, Inc. (SCSCAI) each of you is a stakeholder when the Board, club, committee or individual homeowner asks for the addition of an amenity for the community. Presently, there are 22 CIs that the staff is or will be working on. I thought this month would be a good month to tell you a little about each one, and to share with you how you can provide input and monitor the CI as it moves through the process for review and consideration by committees and the Board.

There are three primary goals (1) To give any interested homeowner a voice on improvements and additions to amenities. (2) To allow candid input from stakeholders on the proposal before it is considered by the Board and (3) To create a funding mechanism that is not first-come first-served, but evaluates all requests and allows the committees and Board to determine if and where funds should be spent based on merit, wants and needs. Each CI is listed by its reference number.
