

# 2018 Board of Directors Election

he Election Committee is preparing to conduct the annual election of Sun City Summerlin's Board of Directors. This year, Tuesday, February 27, is designated as Election Day and will be the last day to cast your ballot. Counting of the ballots will be on Wednesday, February 28. Five positions will be filled. Each home has five (5) votes that may be cast for one candidate or divided among all in any manner desired. It is critical that not more than five (5) votes are marked.

Ballots (part of the Link mailing label) and a return envelope will be included in your February Link. The ballot instructions appear on the back of the address portion of the mailer. The ballot portion is perforated so the name and address can be removed by tearing it off at the perforations. After you mark your votes on this ballot, remove the address portion and insert the ballot into the envelope so that the Bar Code shows through the window in the envelope. It may then be mailed to the Administration Office, Mountain Shadows Community Center, 9107 Del Webb Boulevard, Las Vegas, NV 89134, or save Sun City the cost of postage by personally depositing your ballot in the ballot box at Mountain Shadows. If you mail your ballot, it must arrive no later than 5 p.m., Tuesday, February 27, at which time voting will be closed.

Should you lose or accidentally destroy your ballot, another ballot can be obtained at the Administration Office. Before requesting a

replacement ballot, be certain that another member of your household has not already voted. If two ballots are received from the same household, BOTH ballots will be voided. Also, if more than five (5) votes are marked on a ballot, all votes will be voided.

One "MEET THE CANDIDATES" event will be held. It will take place during the Residents' Forum on Wednesday, January 10, 6:30 p.m. The location will be at the Desert Vista Community Center. Each candidate will make a presentation. This will be followed by a question and answer period. After this formal meeting, candidates will be available to answer your additional questions.

Each candidate may provide a photo and a statement, which will be published in the February Link.

### NOTICE of Election - 2018

The SCSCSAI Administrative offices at Mountain Shadows Community Center will be open for voting until 5 p.m., Tuesday, February 27. This is the last day to cast your ballot in the election for Sun City Summerlin's Board of Directors.

The staff will be available to supply replacement ballots and tend the ballot box. The ballots will be secured in the Association office until the following day.

The ballots will be validated, opened and counted starting at 8 a.m. on Wednesday, February 28, during an OFFICIAL ASSOCIATION MEETING – OPEN TO ALL RESIDENTS. There is only one agenda item for this meeting, that being the counting of the election ballots.

The results will be announced by the Association Secretary and reported to the Board of Directors.

# A MUSIC NOTE



Jazz is the great American art form. With roots in blues and ragtime, jazz is clearly our country's gift to the world. Today, jazz musicians borrow

from popular music of all kinds along with the Great American Songbook, bebop and swing to create a uniquely American experience. They create a musical conversation not unlike a casual conversation you might have with a group of friends. You might start a conversation about a specific topic, but I doubt you come prepared with a script. You improvise what you talk about based on the direction the conversation takes, as well as your friend's feedback. Musicians do the same thing. They know the subject matter (or the tune), and are prepared to play it in a particular key, but improvise when it comes time to take a solo (like you do when you share your opinion among friends). This improv within the parameters of the song gives live

performances a certain excitement, since no one knows exactly where the soloist will go in terms of music notes.

Cabaret Jazz got its name because we wanted to celebrate two great art forms: jazz, and the group of songs known as the Great American Songbook. Cabaret performers (many of whom have successful careers on Broadway and in the recording studio) use a variety of tunes to create great musical programs. Therefore, you will find a great range of artists performing on this stage. Still thinking this is not for you? I'd say, pick something that looks interesting and give it a try. The room has been called the best sounding jazz club in America, and with a full-service bar and delicious lite bites, I think you'll have a great time. I look forward to seeing you there.







# The Joy of Stretch

ack pain. Arthritis. Muscle tightness. Joint stiffness. These are just a few of the conditions we increasingly face as we age. If you suffer from any of these, stretching might just be the answer. If you do not suffer from any of the above, count your blessings, but don't get too comfortable.

Stretching is one of the most misunderstood and underappreciated forms of exercise. It helps keep muscles flexible and allows joints to maintain their range of motion when going about daily activities, i.e. reaching, lifting, standing, bending and turning.

Some of the major benefits of stretching are:

- Reduced muscle tension and soreness
- Improved posture
- Better flexibility and range of motion
- Decreased risk of falling
- Reduced low back pain and arthritis
- Stress relief and improved mood
- Increased circulation

There are many classes offered in Sun City by the Fitness Department and other activityand fitness-related clubs. Check out the following clubs for their offerings: Tai Chi, Fitness, Yoga and several of the water exercise clubs. Beginning this month, the Fitness Department will offer a new, weekly 30-minute Active Stretching class on Thursday evenings at 6:30 in the Desert Vista Fitness Center.

### A proper stretching routine includes the following:

- Warm Up. Stretching cold muscles can lead to pulled muscles. A light stretch after your warm-up and then a deeper, more thorough stretch after your workout is recommended. This is when your muscles are warmer and more pliable.
- **Don't Bounce.** Move slowly into your stretch position and hold. Bouncing back and forth or up and down can cause injury to the muscles, tendons and joints.
- **Breathe.** Relax and breathe deeply during your stretches. This helps increase the blood and oxygen flow to your muscles.
- 30-second Rule. It takes time for muscles to respond and lengthen. Hold each stretch for at least 30 seconds and up to 60 seconds for a really tight muscle.



Thar She Blows! Classes to Review Water, Gas Shut-off Valves he call came at 10:30 on a sweltering
Friday night. Angela, a Sun City resident,
was frantic. A geyser of water had erupted
through a bathroom wall that was common with
her neighbors. Angela's residence was rapidly
flooding. The initial assessment was that her
neighbors had a broken water main. No one was
home on that side of the wall.

The shut-off for each residence is located in the sidewalk and approximately lined up with the front door. I grabbed a flashlight and a screwdriver to lift the vault cover. I had bad news for Angela, the water meter for her neighbor's service showed no movement. I opened the vault to Angela's service and observed the meter dial spinning like a top. The broken line belonged to Angela. A water district technician arrived soon to turn off the line.

In Sun City, the primary water line for a residence is under the concrete slab. In Angela's case, it burst. The point where the water escaped from the slab was under the bathroom wall. The damage was extensive, the repairs costly.

Since that night I have learned a great deal about how to stop water leaks, and the tools one should use. I also have learned there are significant responsibilities and dangers associated with turning off either water or gas service to a home. When a gas odor is detected in a home, the gas

that occupants call 911 and get out of the home until responders arrive.

These lessons have been incorporated into the first of a series of Community Preparedness classes that are written specifically for Sun City residents. We are not athletes capable of impressive physical feats if there is an emergency, however, there are practical emergency responses we can take until designated responders arrive.

The first classes on responding to either a water or gas leak will be offered this month. The session will last around an hour, and offer hands-on experience in shutting off a water valve to your home and the precautions you must take when doing so.

The class size will be capped at 25 so that we can answer questions and provide the hands-on experience to interested class participants.

For residents' convenience, two classes will be held on Monday, January 8 at Desert Vista.

The first class will start at 10 a.m. in Room 1; a second one will repeat at 7 p.m.



he CCOC meeting on December 7 did not have a quorum of committee members and therefore was not able to vote on any agenda items, however, there was discussion on a variety of topics, which will, in all likelihood, be addressed in future meetings.

### **CCOC Procedures Manual Review**

- Household membership dues structure to be decided by the club. The BOD did not pass this revision.
- Club meeting notifications printed in the Link Magazine. The motion to change from 60 days to 30 days was withdrawn by the BOD.
- Co-presidents for clubs. The BOD did not pass this.

### Non-Resident Guest Passes

A survey will be constructed to query the clubs

that have made a change in allowable non-resident guest passes to determine the efficacy of this change.

### Fitness Pool Usage by Classes

Kristie McWhorter, SCSCAI fitness manager, sought guidance on aqua club classes that do not meet the 10-person-per class requirement to conduct the class. After discussion and the presentation of data regarding actual attendance, the CCOC recommended that the fitness manager is authorized to enforce the 10-person minimum requirement to conduct a class.

### Performing Club Members Selling Tickets

There was discussion on the ability of club members to sell tickets to their club events.

### **Credit Card Payment**

There was discussion on allowing credit card payment for event tickets.






# NEGHBOR Meet Dennis Ortwein

Since moving to Sun City Summerlin in 2005, he has blended his talents at our Starbright Theatre with service in Las Vegas classrooms and even shared his skills beyond our shores. In addition to being recognized for his performance on stage, Dennis has been cited by the Clark County School District (CCSD) for his proficiency in the classroom. His latest accolade is recognition by the CCSD for his contributions to the schools and the community.

A committee of seven school district and community representatives were given the task of choosing names for four new schools in the area to be completed next year. They have recently completed their task by selecting four honorees from a field of 61 distinguished candidates. # STANDAR D Community Standards

### Helpful Hints/ Reminders for Homeowners

### Trash and Recyclable Pickup

The Community Standards office has had several reports recently regarding residents putting their trash cans and bags out one to two days before the scheduled pickup time. This is not only unacceptable, but it is dangerous in light of the increase the community is experiencing with coyotes. SCSCAI's Development Standards state that trash should not be at the curb prior to 3 p.m. the day before pickup.

On windy days, please make sure the lid to your trash container is securely fastened. If you use trash bags, please make sure they are tied closed. Always secure your trash and recyclables to keep them from taking flight around the community.

### Mailbox Maintenance/Replacement

The maintenance of mailboxes and their posts is the responsibility of the residents of single-family homes; for attached units, the responsibility for maintenance falls to the sub association. Replacements should be metal boxes that match the developer shape as closely as possible. Recently, residents have been requesting locking mailboxes. The Architectural Review Committee has ap-

proved two styles – Mail Boss/Mail Manager model No. 7506 black or model No. 7507 white and Gibraltar/Wingate model No. WM16KB01 black and model No. WM16KW01 white. Mailboxes and posts must be the same color and finish that matches the original developer color.

### Moving/Estate/Garage Sales

It has been reported that some residents are having multiple, unauthorized garage sales. Garage sales are only permitted during the two weekends in the spring and the two weekends in the fall designated by the Board of Directors. If you are moving or have had a death in the household, a one-time, two-day sale is permitted. A sale permit must be obtained from the Community Standards office and displayed on the residence on the day/s of the sale.

As part of this agenda, improvements have been budgeted for upgrades to the three fitness centers.

Kristie McWhorter, SCSCAI fitness manager, reported that four new fitness equipment pieces, totaling \$16,835, have been installed and are available to residents. A NuStep was installed at the Pinnacle Fitness Center and SciFit arm ergometers (arm bikes) were installed at the Pinnacle, Mountain Shadows and Desert Vista fitness centers.

Kristie also described plans for upgrading the monitor stations at the three fitness centers. The work will be done during the first quarter of 2018, at which time the carpets will be replaced as part of the project. At the Pinnacle Fitness Center, the existing monitor station will be moved into the lobby, thus allowing for an expanded

and cupboards will be updated to match.

Finally, Kristie recommended the purchase of five new table tennis units (or tables) – four for the Pinnacle and one for Sun Shadows for a total cost of \$7,500. The existing units (tables) appear to be original to the centers, meaning that they are more than 20 years old. The committee approved recommending the purchase and the item was forwarded to the December 5 Board of Directors' agenda where it passed unanimously.

Before adjourning, the committee recommended the creation of approximately six golf cart parking stations outside of the Mountain Shadows Fitness Center. The item will be revisited at a later date.

#### Join the Navy, See the World

"I was born in Missouri and raised in Oklahoma, and I wanted to see the world. So I joined the Navy and asked to be assigned to an East Coast station. Naturally, I was sent to Pearl Harbor," Rick Cornstuble said in response to the question: Why did a Midwest boy join the Navy? "Join the Navy and See the World is what the recruiting poster said," and Rick got to see much of the Asian world during his four-year hitch.


While based in Pearl Harbor, Rick was destined to serve on three different destroyers. Initially, he was assigned to the USS Benjamin Stoddert DDG-22, an Adam's-class guided missile destroyer launched in 1963. The year was 1967. That tour lasted about a year and Rick was assigned to fire control for the ship's main battery of 5-inch guns. In 1968, the Stoddert was scheduled for an extensive overhaul. The ship went into dry dock in March of that year and most of the crew, including Rick, were assigned to other ships. Rick drew a WWII-era Fletcher-class destroyer, the USS Jenkins, DD-447.

The Jenkins was older, but it had been updated with some of the latest gunnery features, including RAPs rocket-assisted projectiles - which dramatically extended the range of the main battery guns. It was 1968 and the Viet Nam War was in full bloom and the Jenkins was given opportunities to use the upgraded arsenal.

"We had a number of assignments, including shadowing an aircraft carrier during aircraft launch should any of the planes have to abort and crash land," Rick said. "It was necessary but not very exciting. One engagement that was exciting was providing fire support for a 1st Cavalry Division helicopter assault on a village. I was in fire control and we were raking a ridge that overlooked the village. Suddenly, there was a large secondary explosion. In a situation such as this, you never see your enemy; the explosion was confirmation that we hit a vital spot."

On occasion, the Jenkins' marksmanship elicited a response from enemy artillery. That didn't last long as the big guns of the cruisers lying over the horizon, and out of sight of the enemy, quickly silenced them.

At the end of the Viet Nam tour, the Jenkins was

decommissioned and Rick was assigned to yet another ship, a Gearing-class destroyer, the USS Carpenter DD-825. In July 1969, she was assigned as a secondary recovery station in support of the historic Apollo 11 capsule recovery mission. (The Apollo 11 mission put the first humans on the moon.) The capsule had a safe splash down only 12 miles from the primary recovery ship, the aircraft carrier Hornet.

During his three-plus years based in Pearl Harbor, Rick got to fulfill his dream of world travel. He had the opportunity to visit such notable places as Australia, New Zealand, the Philippines, Guam, Japan, American Samoa and Manus island in Papua New Guinea.

His tour completed, Rick returned home and used the GI Bill to earn a degree in education. During his working career, he taught middle school in Oklahoma and worked for the Indiana State Teachers Association before retiring and moving to Sun City in May 2013.

#### Fitness Security Cameras

he safety of our facilities is a high priority for the SCSCAI Board and staff. That goal is a challenge since our facilities have many common doors providing easy entry points. Criminals often watch a potential target building for a considerable time before breaking in, taking note of the ebb and flow of traffic, residents' schedules and possible points of entry.

Multi-use facilities can be even more vulnerable since there is high foot traffic from residents and their guests, and strangers can pose as guests or even residents to gain access. The larger the facility, the more susceptible it is to unauthorized entry.

So, how do we improve the safety of our facilities? One project approved by the Board and recently completed was the installation of video cameras with recording capabilities at many of our facilities. A video surveillance sys-

tem can record thieves and vandals, protect families, deter crime, and monitor building activity for safety problems. The presence of obvious video surveillance, along with video disclosure signage in common areas inside and outside a facility will, by itself, discourage criminal activity. The recorded video also can be very helpful in identifying and prosecuting criminals if needed.

The next phase of the video camera project is to install cameras at the entrances and exit points of the four fitness centers, as well as the pool areas. The fitness monitors will have access to the video so they can keep track of activities in these areas.

Installation of the fitness center cameras should be completed by the time you read this.

#### December 5, 2017

- The Board of Directors unanimously approved a motion to accept the December 5, 2017, Board of Directors agenda as amended.
- ◆ The Board of Directors unanimously approved the minutes of November 7, 2017, with corrections.
- ◆ The Board of Directors unanimously passed a motion to approve DP Chairs Estimate #11212017DPC1 dated November 21, 2017, for new tables and chairs for Tavern at the Falls restaurant in an amount not to exceed \$37,000.
- The Board of Directors unanimously passed a motion to approve the purchase of 5 Donic Delhi 25 table tennis tables (4 at the Pinnacle, 1 at Sun Shadows) for no more than \$7,120 from Paddle Palace.
- The Board of Directors approved a motion to allow the formation of chartered clubs by petition of 25 residents requesting formation of the club and commitment to become members, with six Board members voting in favor. Mr. O'Connell, Mr. Gluch and Mr. Crawford each cast a vote against the motion.
- The Board of Directors denied a motion to allow a chartered club to make its own determination regarding whether or not to allow a single household family membership in an amount that is less than double the single membership, with Ms. Holden, Ms. Bachman and Mr. Wiedemann voting in favor. Mr. O'Connell, Mr. Akers, Mr. Gluch, Mr. Crawford and Mr. Resnik cast a vote against the motion.
- Ms. Holden withdrew a motion as written to approve chartered clubs be required to provide notices for club meetings, including officer elections in the Link at least 30 days in

- advance of the meeting date as recommended by the CCOC Committee. The matter will be reviewed again by the CCOC Committee, with input from appropriate staff.
- The Board of Directors denied a motion to allow chartered clubs to elect co-presidents to perform the duties of a club president as recommended by the CCOC Committee, with Ms. Bachman and Ms. Holden voting in favor. Mr. Wiedemann, Mr. O'Connell, Mr. Akers, Mr. Gluch, Mr. Crawford and Mr. Resnik cast a vote against the motion.
- The Board of Directors unanimously passed a motion to approve foreclosure for past due assessments/collection fees of \$2,380.97 on one account.
- Mr. Crawford withdrew a motion that committee reports published in the Link must have the expressed approval of the Board elected committee chairperson before the Link editor can accept the note for inclusion into the ink, and to have this recommendation discussed at the next Link Committee meeting.
- The Board of Directors unanimously passed a motion to ratify the transfer of the NORA embezzlement insurance payment in the amount of \$52,440 from Operating to Reserve.
- The Board of Directors unanimously passed a motion to approve Change Order #3 submitted by Jet Development, authorizing the addition of one (1) 3-ton HVAC unit with metal ductwork at a cost not to exceed \$12,300 for Highland Falls' patio enclosure project reserving all rights and this motion waves no rights.
- The Board of Directors unanimously passed a motion to adjourn the December 5, 2017, Board of Directors meeting at 11:05 a.m.
