



Jimmie Ray and Cyndi Cantrell, All-around Entertainers

She's a 5-foot-tall dynamo with a huge voice and a wicked sense of humor. Together, the Sun City residents, who have been married for 23 years, summon their musical talents to re-create the sights and sounds of Johnny and June Carter Cash for audiences around the country. In September, the two had the unique privilege of paying tribute to the Man in Black and his famous concert event when they took to the stage at San Quentin Prison to play before thousands of inmates. The concert was organized to celebrate the 50th anniversary of Cash's prison concerts, which were recorded live in 1968 and marked a career comeback for him.

"The stage is being built as we speak. We'll be performing with our Black Train Band on an outdoor stage," said Jimmie Ray Cantrell about the concert when this interview took place in September. Jimmie Ray and his wife, Cyndi, got the gig through a full-circle experience that started some 14 years ago.

Little did the couple know that the daughter of one of their friends who lived in California would someday become the assistant to the warden at San Quentin Prison. And that so many years later that little girl would recall how her mom and dad knew a man who put on one heck of a Johnny Cash show.

While it may seem like a small world, it is gigantic in the way of opportunities Jimmie says the couple has been blessed to have.

"I am an exhorter by nature," Jimmie said.

"I exhort people. I like to bring out the talent I see in them."

Either that or "He's just a nut," Cyndi said.

"When I first heard her sing it was in a choir," Jimmie said of the then-Louisiana preacher's daughter.

"When I heard her voice I just flipped. But when she finished, you could see that she was very timid; very shy. I thought, 'If only she could see what I see.' And within a couple of months I had her in the studio recording." Today, while the shyness remains, Cyndi's creativity and comedic timing has morphed into a force. Such is the case with her impressions, of which the beloved Mini Pearl is one.

"I don't rehearse Mini Pearl," Cyndi said.

"Bands love to rehearse and they do for hours. But when I've got it, I've got it and they just have to trust me. And when I get the audience and I know I've got them I come in even harder," she said.

Music, comedy, songwriting and production is only a part of the Cantrells' story. One of Jimmie's current projects has him shopping a story that's based loosely on his mother's life called "Mittie's Song." The story, full of Appalachian music and life lessons, was originally written as a screenplay. It's been performed as a play and is also a book.

"Blessed" really is the operative word when looking on the lives and achievements of this Sun City duo; all the talents they love to share with their audiences.





Overseeding 101



T's overseed season in Sun City and no doubt residents have noticed the change to the front nine fairway at Palm Valley Golf Course. And because we in the golf shops get so many questions about the process of overseeding, I thought I'd share a recent article I found on the subject. I hope it helps explain the Golf/Golf Course Maintenance Departments' decision to move away from overseeding the Palm Valley Golf Course.

"For the uninitiated, overseeding is when golf courses grow a cool-season grass on top of the regular warm-season grass. In the Southwest, the most common example is overseeding ryegrass on top of bermudagrass. Primarily, this is done to provide a green turf during the winter when bermudagrass goes dormant with a gold color.

Two reasons courses move away from overseeding:

One – It weakens the bermuda turf due to extensive scalping in the autumn that literally removes most of the bermuda plant material so the ryegrass seed can germinate and grow. The bermuda also suffers in the spring from competition by the ryegrass when the bermuda wakes up and wants to grow again. After a few years of overseeding, the bermuda turf becomes thinner and more susceptible to disease and pests.

Two – It is no longer cost-effective. At the Champions Club, it was determined that overseeding cost an additional \$90,000 to provide a 4½-month cosmetic benefit:

Seed – 9 to 10 tons; chemicals, growth regulators in autumn and ryegrass removal in the spring; fertilizer; water for irrigation; electricity, pumping irrigation water; fuel, mowing, spraying chemicals, applying fertilizer and clippings removal; labor; and equipment repairs and maintenance.

The golf course had to generate an additional \$20,000 per month just to recover the cosmetic expenses. At an average green fee of \$50 per round, that's an extra 400 rounds per month, or 100 rounds per week. Not an easy task during the cold holiday season when the number of daylight hours is lower than the rest of the year. ... We did not (and still do not) have any evidence that the cosmetic improvement generates anything close to the number of extra rounds needed to recover the \$90,000 expense. If we raised green fees to cover the expense, the result would probably be fewer rounds and less revenue. Golfers benefit in several ways from not overseeding. Dormant bermuda is a great playing surface. The ball sits up very nicely on the more rigid grass, and players get considerably more roll, especially on their tee shots. Fairways do not have to be watered extensively for two to three weeks in October to germinate the ryegrass seed, so players avoid cart-path-only and don't have to slog around in wet, muddy fairways.

With fewer hours in the day, and daylight starting as late as 6:30 a.m., players aren't disturbed by mowers two to three days a week. Dormant bermuda must be mowed only a few times during the four-month winter season. Golf can remain affordable since green fees do not have to be raised to pay for overseeding.

Golf courses can preserve the environment by using the winter season as an environmental time out – consuming less water, chemicals, fertilizer, gasoline, etc.

For some golfers who watch golf on TV, this is not going to be an easy sell. Most of them don't understand the huge amounts of money from sponsors, advertising and tour organizations that are poured into the TV courses to make them look perfect. ... then the money is gone and things are back to normal.

To help players understand what is really at stake, course managers need to educate their staff so they can intelligently answer questions from customers."

A New Direction for Sun City

Here in Sun City Summerlin, our golf courses have made great efforts to conserve water and improve the turf conditions. Thirteen years ago we stopped overseeding the roughs. At first, there were many dirt spots where we didn't have turf coverage. The following year, most areas were filled in with Bermuda grass. Later, we went to not overseeding the par 3 short holes.

Sun City also has been recognized by the Water Conservation Coalition and the Southern Nevada Water Authority, and in 2015 received the Water Hero Award. The three courses combined have converted 3.1 million square feet of turf to water-efficient landscaping, saving 172 million gallons of water annually.

Sun City Summerlin golf courses were originally planted with Bermuda grass but overseeded each winter with perennial rye grass to give it a green color throughout the winter. Perennial rye grass is a hardy cool-season grass that can withstand golf play and still look good. If the humidity isn't too high, it also can live year after year. The problem with rye grass is when it gets hot and humid. This past summer was a hot one but, more importantly, it was humid early in July. We typically don't see this much humidity until August. So, with weather that hot and added humidity, rye grass and other cool-season grasses get diseases and die. That is what we experienced here.

Bermuda grass thrives in the heat and especially in the humidity. It also is drought resistant.

Not knowing what the future brings with water restrictions and drought, and because Sun City is proactive in conserving water, the decision to convert to Bermuda grass gives us an advantage in water savings. It also provides good playing conditions throughout the year and in the growing season.

Preserving the Luster of Concrete Coatings and Stains

For the past several months, the Architectural Review Committee has noticed many driveways and walkways in the community that have been colored without

ARC review or approval. The result has been many residents have coated their concrete with improper products, causing premature wear, fading and chipping. In many cases, the resident used a color that would not have been approved if it had been submitted for review. In an effort to mitigate this problem, the ARC is

in the process of establishing an approved color palette for concrete epoxy coatings and concrete stains.

Just recently, several of the ARC members were able to gather some helpful information from a professional contractor that specializes in epoxy coatings and stains. The following are his suggestions for proper application of each of the processes:

Architecture Review Committee

For epoxy application on concrete:

The concrete must be cleaned of all grease, oil, mold and dirt. A power washer is perfect for this.

- Apply 2-part epoxy primer
- Apply 2-part solvent-based epoxy paint
- Apply polyurethane 250
- Apply polyurethane 100

For concrete stain applications:

The concrete must be cleaned of all grease, oil, mold and dirt. A power washer is perfect for this.

- Apply a skim coat of polymer and white cement
- Apply the color stain
- Apply polyurethane 250
- Apply polyurethane 100

Although these processes seem excessive, in the long run it will benefit the resident by less maintenance and upkeep costs over the years. Epoxy paints can be mixed to match any of SCSCAI's approved house colors. There are also a few local companies that sell pre-colored epoxy or stains.

All modifications must be applied for and approved by the ARC prior to commencement of any exterior

Common Area Properties

Committee OKs Plan to Add a Dozen Golf Cart Spaces to Mountain Shadows Parking Lot

The Common Area Properties Committee met on August 14 at Desert Vista to wrap up its portion of the golf cart parking project scheduled at Mountain Shadows. The plan, reported to cost \$12,764, includes adding 12 parking spaces for golf carts near the outdoor kitchen entrance located on the west side of the building. The project returned to CAP after the design was recommended by the Architectural Review Committee. The presence of the item on the CAP agenda was intended as an update to the committee, as well as to have members sign off on the item and forward it to the Finance Committee.



The addition of 12 golf cart spaces adjacent to the kitchen area is expected to cost \$12,764.



If recommended by the Finance Committee, the plan will be sent to the Board of Directors for final approval.


According to SCSCAI Facility Maintenance Director Brandon Balek, if approved by the Board, the construction will be performed by American Pavement Preservation, with the landscape part of the job being done in-house. The cost to grade the surface area, remove plants and bushes and cap irrigation lines, he said, should not exceed an additional \$2,000. SCSCAI Landscape Director Louis Darling reported that he will work with Executive Director Mitzi Mills to secure funds for his department to accomplish the work.

1940-1946: Where There Was Action, Tony Was There

rowing up during the Great Depression in America was difficult for most, but considerably more so for others. For future Sun City resident Tony Giuffrida, living as part of a large family in south Philadelphia wasn't all that bad until 1931 when his father lost his job and his mother died. Faced with the prospect of raising six children without a wife or a steady job, Tony's dad did what he could and made the hard decisions every day necessary to make his family survive. On one of those days, that hard decision was that the family would have to get smaller. Tony and his brother John were sent to live on a church-operated farm just outside of Philadelphia.

"It was OK, but it wasn't a fun place to live. We had our chores like mowing the grass and digging holes for the outhouses. Not too bad but not exactly fun, either. In fact, there was very little to do that you could consider fun," Tony said. "We did have a radio but, of course, there was no TV then. For the most part, free time was spent reading. That lasted for about 2½ years. Then Dad got a job and brought us home."

Once back in Philadelphia, Tony enrolled in junior high school and got a part-time job working at a local fruit store. He earned \$6 a week working 6½ days. Half of that went into the household budget. His brother got a steady job at the Philadelphia Mint; good pay. His eldest sister Sarah (now 102) filled the role of mother for the clan. It was 1937 and life was good again.

Tony was a student at Philadelphia High School when the war broke out in Europe. There was a lot of excitement among his friends and contemporaries. The U.S. may still have been isolationist, but not those guys. They wanted in on the action. A number of them volunteered to fly for the RAF but that option wasn't open to Tony because of medical issues. He thought about joining the U.S. military and broached the subject with this father. "Dad wasn't happy, but he didn't say no," Tony said. "A few days later, I saw a sailor on the streets of our neighborhood, a rare sight at that time. I approached him, told him that I was thinking of joining either the

Army or Navy and which did he think was a better choice. He laughed and said, 'Kid, would you prefer to sleep in the mud and bathe once a week or so out of your helmet, or sleep in a clean cot and shower every day?' Of course I preferred the latter and said so. 'OK', the sailor said, 'Then join the Navy.'

"That night I told my Dad my decision. On the following day, I went to the Navy recruiting office."

In the spring of 1940, neither the Army nor Navy were really hiring. Candidates for the few openings they had were carefully screened. One day, Tony saw a Navy officer knocking on doors in his neighborhood, but not his house. Later, he learned that the Navy was doing a background check on him. Finally, the officer came to Tony's house and spoke to his dad. Tony was still a minor and needed his dad's approval. He got it.

On April 17, 1940, Tony took the oath to join the peacetime Navy for a six-year hitch. It was to be an eventful six years.

"They sent me to Connecticut for an eight-week basic training school," Tony recalled. "After graduation, I was sent to the Boston Navy yard to join my first ship, the Destroyer USS Hatfield. The Hatfield went south along the Atlantic Coast with a stop in Puerto Rico and then through the Panama Canal to San Diego. In San Diego, I transferred to the USS Dent DD-116, which was to be my home through the entire war." It was now winter 1940. America and its Navy were still at peace.

The Dent, a Wickes-class destroyer, was a WW I veteran that had seen service for most of the intervening years. She was fast, maneuverable and well-armed with cannon, machine guns and torpedoes. In the winter of 1940-1941, she sailed to Bremerton, Wash., for updating with the newest anti-submarine weapon, sonar. Fully updated and combat ready, the Dent returned to her home port, San Diego, and over the rest of 1941 patrolled the waters between San Diego, Honolulu and Bremerton. She was in San Diego on December 7, 1941, after just having returned from Hawaii. The Dent and two other sonar-equipped destroyers got underway the very next

day to screen (provide anti-submarine and anti-aircraft protection for) the aircraft carrier Saratoga during her high speed run to Pearl Harbor.

"Once we got to Pearl, and it took about five days to get there, our skipper wanted to tour the island and see the damage for himself," Tony said. "We lowered the captain's gig and I was assigned as her engineer. At this point, it was about a week after the attack, but the damage was still fresh. It was horrific."

In 1942, as newer destroyers came into service, the Navy converted a number of WW I destroyers to service as APDs (high speed transport and destroyers). The Dent was redesignated as APD-9 in March 1943. The conversion was extensive. Two of the four boilers were removed and the space configured to hold 200 troops. As an APD, the primary mission was to deliver small

units such as Marine Raiders, Underwater Demolition Teams and Army Rangers to enemy shores. It also could provide gunfire support for those troops if needed. In that role, the Dent was deployed to Noumea on New Caledonia on April 20, 1943. She took part in Operation Toenails (the invasion of New Georgia and Rendova), the invasion of Vella Lavella (October 1943), and supported the landings at Cape Torokina on Bougainville (Operation Cherry Blossom). During this time, Tony's primary role was

operating and maintaining the port side engine. But he had two other standing assignments. When General Quarters was called, Tony manned a 50-caliber machine gun. Whenever the Higgins boats were deployed, Tony was assigned as the engineer for one of them. In short, whenever there was action, Tony was there.

"One incident that I will never forget happened while we were in Espiritu Santo, which was supposed to be a quiet, rear area. One morning I was reading an old newspaper while using the head (toilet) when suddenly a piece of shrapnel burst through the bulkhead (wall), cut through the space between my head and outstretched arm and penetrated the opposite bulkhead. Seconds later, General Quarters was sounded. Without hesitation (or doing anything else), I ran to my machine gun station. A Marine was already there, trying to operate the gun, but it was jammed. He turned to me and said 'You operate the bolt and I'll shoot' and that is what we did," Tony said.

On July 6 1943, during the battle of Kula Gulf in the central Solomon Islands, the Navy suffered a horrendous loss when the light cruiser USS Helena was struck by three torpedoes and sank. Most of her crew were able to abandon ship but were adrift in oil-covered waters while several destroyers attempted rescue simultaneously fighting off attacking Japanese warships. When daylight came, the destroyers had to leave the scene only to return at dark to continue search and rescue.

One group of 104 survivors made landfall at nearby Vella Lavella Island, still occupied by Japanese forces, where they were befriended by the natives. A missionary on the island made radio contact with an Australian Coast Watcher and from there with the Navy. Once contact was made with the Navy, The Dent and five other ships were sent to rescue the Helena survivors. In the early morning hours, the Dent lowered its Higgins boats, Tony aboard one of them, which silently moved closer to shore eventually making contact with the waiting survivors. The Dent had gotten there first and had picked up most of the survivors by the time the other APDs arrived. The survivors rescued, the task force headed to friendlier

> waters. At dawn, a protective air patrol appeared overhead. Seven hours later, the task force and the survivors arrived at Tulagi Harbor.

At this point (November 1943), the Dent went to Sydney, Australia, for an overhaul. In 1944, the Dent took part in the invasion of Emirau Island (March 20), where she landed part of the 4th Marines. On April 22, she landed troops at Aitape and then moved to the Solomons to train with underwater demolition teams (UDTs), which were to

be used during the Mariana invasion. She then carried a UDT to Roi, where they transferred to the ships that were to take them to Guam. The Dent then escorted the Mazama (AE-9) to Saipan to carry ammunition to the bombardment ships. Between then and early July 1944 she carried out patrols off Saipan and Tinian. Subsequent to that, the Dent returned to San Diego for another overhaul, after which she was assigned to the Amphibious Training Force, Pacific Fleet, where she remained for the rest of the war. In 1946, the war won, Tony was discharged and the Dent, which had earned five battle stars, was sold for scrap. That chapter in the Dent's life was over, but Tony's was just beginning. He returned to Philadelphia, began a career in professional photography and met and married his wife, Dorothy. In 2000, they moved to Sun City. Sadly, Dorothy passed away in 2016. Tony has been building model airplanes since he was 10 years old. So, it was a natural move for him to join the Model Builders Club, where he is still a member. But Tony has broadened his field. When he was 88 years old, a visitor to Sun City introduced him to wood carving, and he has been doing it ever since. Often he works from two-dimensional photos. His next milestone is his 100th birthday, but he sees no reason to stop there.

Recruiting a Mix of Generations



ecurity Patrol has been on the job for more than 25 years. It is sustained by a continuous flow of new members signed up by the recruiting team. Mary Jo Richards shares the responsibilities with Nan Stevenson (who was on vacation at the time of this interview.) As co-leaders of recruiting – the two work with a team of about 22 members – they have added significantly to Security Patrol's membership.

"We are looking for a mix of generations," said Mary Jo, who also works as an Information Center volunteer. Mary Jo is a retired school teacher. "I worked as a recruiter when John Breed (Watch Commander) was head recruiter. Then I was convinced to take on the job of head recruiter by Judy Hunt (driver, dispatcher, watch commander and former chief) and Sandy Weiser (watch commander and Information Center volunteer). This team is a group of fantastic people. When a member comes up with an idea but isn't sure how to implement it, another team member will offer to help. We are a caring and cohesive group."

Every recruiting member serves in at least one discipline in Security Patrol. Some serve as drivers, dispatchers and Information Center volunteers. Three members are watch commanders, and the co-leader, Stevenson, is the Patrol's personnel officer. "We have a marketing committee of three members – Miriam Block, Cathy Lytle, and Carol Friedman. They are reviewing and upgrading our handouts and advertisements to promote Patrol membership to new 55+ residents, as well as older

residents who have an interest in Security Patrol focusing on the mixed generations idea," Mary Jo said. "Sun City Summerlin is experiencing an influx of younger (55+) residents. This generation of residents can bring new ideas that will sustain our evolving Security Patrol, thereby continuing our tradition of Neighbors helping Neighbors and being the eyes and ears for Metro. Our community has the lowest crime rate of all surrounding communities, and to maintain that status, new and younger members are vital," she added. "We have our 20-second grab-on pitch that recruiters use at all social events. They talk about the four-hour commitment, opportunities in other sectors of Security Patrol, great people who volunteer, meeting new people, and how that individual would make a great member. We also correct any misconceptions that residents may have about Security Patrol."

Recruiters attend Association events and club activities when invited.

Mary Jo Richards, co-leader of Security Patrol's recruiting team, said volunteers attend Association and club events to answer questions about the Patrol and hopefully get residents involved in keeping Sun City one of the valley's safest neighborhoods.



"We are present at the new resident orientations, health forums, craft shows and other expos," Mary Jo said. "And we will have an active presence at the National Night Out in October. In the past, we had a table with information and a recruiter or two sat behind it waiting for residents to come by. Now, recruiters are out from behind the table, mingling with residents giving their 20-second pitch." Security Patrol is always in need of new members. 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



he Model Builders Club is involved in a total renovation of its HO Railroad. The old layout was removed in March. The new layout is a completely new structure, which occupies the same physical space but has been redesigned and rebuilt for structural integrity. The new design also incorporates the latest computer-controlled technology. The new layout corrects some major structural and component defects of the previous layout, which grew gradually over a number of years. Under the leadership of Train Director Howard Kardonsky, a new track layout was designed and installed to allow the trains to run without the accidental derailing. Cars no longer get lost inside the mountain. Today's trains are longer, all digital, run faster, and incorporate a complete range of realistic sound features. There are two main lines, at 100 feet each, and two siding areas. A gigantic chemical refinery has been installed. Currently, Club members are working on creating the physical characteristics (mountains, lakes, rivers and roads). It is wonderful to see the entire Club coming together to plan the layout of the commercial, industrial and municipal buildings, churches, houses and farms. The layout changes every day! FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Dear Sun City Summerlin Residents,

It is hard to believe that October 3, 2018, marks my oneyear anniversary at Sun City Summerlin. I can honestly say I am just as happy and excited to come to work now as I was back on my very first day. It has been a year of getting to know Sun City and the wonderful people who live and work here. In my very first article to you I asked you to share your first impression of Sun City Summerlin and why you decided to make this your home. The stories I received were all wonderful and gave me a foundation to start building on as to not only what attracted you to Sun City, but what made Sun City stand out from other communities. I was also blessed early on with a small group of residents who were interested in finding out what the residents of Sun City wanted now and in the future. With the approval of the Sun City Board of Directors, a questionnaire was launched that gathered feedback and organized the information to provide a valuable tool into what people who live here love, what services, events and amenities they use or would like to see expanded or even added. Some of the information guided me to increase the budget to include better maintenance and cleaning, some of the information guided me to initiate customer service training and to increase communication regarding "All Things Sun City Summerlin" not only with the homeowners but with the staff. It was interesting to see how trends have possibly changed since Sun City Summerlin was built. While many were attracted because of golf and the chartered clubs, a growing trend per the responses are fitness activities, and fitness and technology classes. While many still enjoy golf or belonging to chartered clubs, they expressed they no longer wanted to spend six to eight hours each day on a single activity. Instead, they were looking for ways to mix the activities they love. Many said they moved here for the social events, to exercise and learn. In other words, expanding their lifestyle was as

important as doing the things they had dreamed of doing in their retirement. These responses will help to guide the Board of Directors and the staff as we work hard to preserve and enhance the community.

As many of you know I pride myself on making sure you know what I know about the community you have chosen to call your home. I have introduced several email communications that many of you have signed up to receive. If you have not signed up yet all you have to do is send me an email (from the email address you want to use to receive emails from me) and write "Sign Me up to Receive Your Emails."

In addition to the email communications, I provide updates in the Link magazine on what items staff is working on. Starting in January, I will be introducing "Chat with Mitzi." These will be informal meetings where we will talk about "All Things Sun City Summerlin" with you introducing the topics. The meetings will be held at The Summit and will be on either a Saturday midmorning or weekday evening. I love these meetings as it gives all who attend an opportunity to get to know each other better, and I can hear firsthand what topics are important to those who live here. Meeting at The Summit will allow you to purchase something to eat or drink if you want and enjoy the view and the room, which are both gorgeous. I will be publishing the schedule for 2019 in the November Link. I hope to see many of you there. Often I am told by people they appreciate the work I do and they have noticed a change since I arrived here. While I love the compliment I have to be honest, no one person can make a positive difference in a community. I added the word positive for a reason. In my career, I have seen communities where a disrespectful executive director or an obnoxious or uncaring Board or Board member have resonated a negative "feeling" throughout the staff and throughout the community. However, it takes many working together to bring a positive atmosphere. I can say without hesitation that from the day I interviewed I was impressed with the men and women on the Sun City Summerlin Board of Directors. I have been in community building and community management for over 30 years (I joke that I was 12 when I started) and during that time I have worked with more than 50 men and women serving their communities as Board members. I have seen the good, the bad and, yes, even the ugly.

I recently participated in a large-scale community event with the executive directors of the best large-scale communities in the country, or should I say the world as Dubai was well represented. In our round-table discussion, the agenda consisted of what was referred to as the Big Four. (1) Unprofessional Board members, (2) Unmotivated and Unpleasant Staff, (3) Security Costs and

(4) Homeowner Apathy. I want to share with you my take on Sun City Summerlin after being here for one year. I know the makeup of a Board can change in one election and that can be scary for the homeowners and the staff. Whether you like or dislike your Sun City Summerlin Board, I can tell you without hesitation that your Board members (listed alphabetically by last name, and including past Board members from 2017 who I worked with) Jim Akers, Bruce Alitt, Ellen Bachman, Ken Caroccia, Leo Crawford, Dick Gluch, Joe O'Connell, Barbara Holden, David Putney, Ken Resnik and Karl Wiedemann are not only hard working but truly exemplify what every community should look for in a Board member. Every one of them seek input from homeowners, votes for what is best for the community as a whole, exercises common sense, puts aside personal interests and understands the difference between the Board's role and the executive director's role. I truly feel blessed to be working with members of the community who have been elected to the Board and take their Board duties seriously and exercise their authority as spelled out in the community governing documents for the benefit of the community and the people who live here. I want to thank each of them for their faith in me on the day they hired me, for their guidance, for their support and for letting me introduce my management style to the residents and the staff without any restrictions. The Sun City Summerlin staff has experienced the management style of several different executive directors in the last 10 years. Listening to other executive directors speak about their "style of management" I recognize that I am very different. First of all, I hate the phrase micromanage. In fact, I not only hate it, I don't understand it. Each and every homeowner trusts that I am looking out for one of the biggest investments of their life, their home and not just any home, the home and lifestyle they dreamed and talked about for years and years while they worked toward retirement. Knowing this, I believe I have an obligation to know as much about every department that I possibly can. This does not mean I do not trust those who are assigned to those departments, it means that I respect they have a job to do. I respect their knowledge of what they do. I understand they are professionals, and before I judge them or their department or try to change how they operate or even publically support the department I am going to understand what it takes to do their job and what reasonable expectations of their department are. I live by the saying "you cannot expect what you do not inspect." The staff here is dedicated and hardworking. They truly will do anything asked of them. They put their hearts and souls into their jobs. Ninety-eight percent of the people I inherited are not only great at what they do, but they are

exactly what I would have looked for had I been the one filling the position. Did we struggle in the beginning? You bet we did. My philosophy on what customer service is was very different from things they had heard and how they had been directed in the past. I train to the "yes," which was a new management style for them, one of trying whenever possible to enhance a resident's lifestyle by finding a way to say "yes" without compromising the rights and enjoyment of others, without violating the governing documents and without creating a liability or undue financial obligation on the Association. Imagine my surprise when I was embraced by the staff who not only wanted to create this "yes" atmosphere but had wonderful positive ideas on how to do it. When I say 98% were onboard and excited I am not exaggerating. I cannot begin to tell you how many compliments I get on staff members going the extra mile. The enthusiasm and willingness was there all the time. I did not create it, I empowered them to feel good about their jobs and do what they do best. These are the people who make me look good. Way too often I get the credit for the things they make possible. I am merely the messenger of their dedication and hard work, and the beneficiary of their efforts. Thank you to the staff for taking me in, teaching me what you do and sharing what you know about Sun City Summerlin. And please know that I know without a doubt that I am only as good as the department directors who work alongside of me.

In many communities security is the million-dollar topic. When I talk about our volunteer Security Patrol to others in this business people lean forward in amazement. First of all they do not believe that it works, second they do not believe we do not have another layer of security that is paid. What is always interesting is the companies they bring in to talk to us about security needs always bring it down to one key factor that detours crime – the presence in the community of a car or cars patrolling the community. Most security companies have different levels of service, the most common model is very similar to what our 216 volunteers provide, patrolling, reporting and creating a presence in the community. There are two big differences between what we have and what third-party companies bring to the table: (1) the volunteers live here in Sun City Summerlin and love the community and care for the homeowners and (2) a cost of \$2,333,700 or \$300 per home annually. The current rule of thumb is that for basic patrol services by a thirdparty company, 24 hours a day, 7 days a week is \$300 per home a year. This cost would be directly passed on to each homeowner and would increase your assessments. I do not know about you, but it is quite impressive the work these volunteers do by donating their time to watch out for the community and its residents, and the amount

of money they save the Association if we were to have to outsource this service. This fine group of residents keeps me informed on a daily basis of things going on in the community. I will be sharing more with you each month on what they do for us while they are out patrolling. They may not perform the duties assigned to the police, but then again neither do basic security companies, and as we are told over and over the mere presence of security on our streets detours crime. Thank you to these great volunteers for their patrolling, assisting the Association and watching out for us all.

Apathy is an interesting topic. In my business if homeowners do not show up for meetings it is primarily because they are satisfied with how the Association is being managed. We have about 75 people who regularly show up for meetings and we are thankful for them. I do not see a lack of people at meetings as apathy. When I look at all the events and activities taking place every single day here in Sun City Summerlin I completely understand that in your retirement or semi-retirement given a choice to go and do something fun or sit in a meeting, in most cases you are going to do something fun. I am so pleased though that so many of you want to know what is going on and want to contribute comments on items. I know so many of you through your email comments when you reach out to me or when you comment on my email blasts. I do not believe we have

apathy. I believe here in Sun City Summerlin we have many levels of involvement and we embrace them all. Sometimes I hear from people who are unhappy about a personal community issue and they will say other homeowners are apathetic or just do not care. I can tell you this is not true, on any given subject that I share I receive between 100 and 300 responses. I read them all. I learn from them what the personality and wants of the community are. I learn far more than in any other form of communication. So keep writing to me, keep sharing with me and by all means know without a doubt that I am thankful for each of you and I always remember that this is your home and it is my privilege to work here. What many of you may not know is I was not looking for a job when I interviewed here. I was very happy at a beautiful property called Indian Ridge in Palm Desert. My interviewing was somewhat of a fluke. Years ago I had expressed interest in the community when I was in Las Vegas as a guest speaker on building customer service, communication and communities. I was contacted and told your executive director position was open and I should not pass up the opportunity to apply to be part of this wonderful community. I like it when things come together easy; when it seems they are meant to be. But I never take opportunity for granted and I am thankful each and every day for the Board, the staff and the each and every one of you.




