

## Runner Roy Nelson to Receive By Jeannette Carrillo/Link Top Huntsman Honor

"I recall I started running with my son," said Roy Nelson II, who will be honored for a quarter-century of participation in the Huntsman World Senior Games in St. George, Utah, this October.

"There were two races back then, a 5K and a 10K and my son said I'll do the 5K and you run the 10K dad."

That was around 1966.

In 1970, Roy joined the Las Vegas Track Club, where he met and made friends with many of the same runners he sees today at races around the country.

"My first marathon was in October 1993. Since then, I have completed 14 marathons, including the Boston Marathon in 1995," Roy said.

"One of the funniest things I ever heard when I ran a marathon was a guy who told me, 'Keep going, you're almost there. Only two more miles to go.' Have you ever heard anything as crazy as that? When you run a marathon, you don't want to hear only two more miles to go. I could have killed the guy."

Originally from Detroit, Roy graduated from Ferris State College in Big Rapids, Mich., in 1959 and from the University of Wyoming Law School in 1962. That same year, he passed the Colorado State Bar and moved from Denver to Las Vegas. From October 1967 to October 1969 he worked as an Assistant United States Attorney. In 1969, Roy went into private practice, where he stayed for 30 years. He retired in December 1998.

In addition to running, Roy has enjoyed other sports. An all-around athlete, he played and lettered in baseball in college in 1958. Later, in 1994, he took up softball.

"In February 2017, I stopped playing softball when my wife, Phyllis, contracted Alzheimer's. Phyllis has been an inpatient at Desert View Senior Living since September. The prognosis for her is not good, but she is a trooper and will hang in there as long as she can."

Last month, Roy was invited to compete in the National Senior Games held in Albuquerque, N.M. He said it took him 25 years to get a second invitation. His first race in the Games was in 1994 in San Antonio, Texas, where he placed fifth in the 10K. Today, at 86 years old, he finished eighth in the same race. Although he doesn't think he turned in an impressive time, Roy finished high enough in the rankings to bring home a ribbon.

To be sure, Roy is his toughest critic.

Roy keeps in competitive shape year round, running several miles a week, starting as early as 4 a.m. in the summer.

With regard to the upcoming Huntsman Games, Roy has been an ambassador for the events since 1995. As a result of his membership and drive to promote the activities, he received a ring to commemorate 10 years and a watch after 15 years. In October, he will have completed 25 years and will be honored with the Red Rock trophy, a tribute to Red Rock Mountain.

If you would like to support Roy in St. George, he will be heading up there for his races, scheduled for October 7 and 10. If you would like to sign up to run alongside Roy or compete with him, the deadline to do so is September 1.

he success of an organization lay with its Board of Directors and membership. Security Patrol is fortunate to have a dynamic and progressive board that is engaged with the members, the neighbors and the Association.

Interviews with the board members reflect their individual and combined goals that are inclusive of our community. Training and recruiting are the priorities. Each board member has years of experience in Security Patrol, and each brings his/her business and professional expertise to the job to help achieve the goals of improved communication, training and volunteer appreciation.

Chief Sandy Lyons serves as dispatcher and driver in addition to her duties as Chief.

"Mostly, I fill in when a volunteer can't make his/her shift," Lyons said. "When I accepted the position, I knew I wanted to change the working environment to create a more pleasant, happy place to be in, and improve communications between the volunteers and the board. Since we work 24/7, it is difficult to let the midnight and 0400-hour drivers and dispatchers know what is current. I send out e-mail blasts to all members informing them of what is happening during the daytime shifts. I also wanted to improve communications with our Executive Director, Mitzi Mills. She supports Security Patrol, and together we work out issues that affect the community and Patrol."

"My goal as a board member hasn't changed in my second year as secretary," said Barbara Aimone. "It continues to be to



bring my unique experiences and perspectives to the board. Good happens when people have different perspectives and are able to compromise on important issues."

Barbara has worked as a dispatcher for six years and is a dispatcher trainer.

"We are fortunate to have volunteers, including newer members, who come to Patrol with dedication, ideas, energy and willingness to take on responsibilities. I see the Patrol continuing to serve the Sun City community well into the future."

Jim Strom is also serving a second year on the Board. "Last year as treasurer I worked with Fred Bailey to prepare the budget for Security Patrol that would meet its goals and reward the membership. This year, as assistant chief, my focus is on supporting the Chief, Sandy Lyons, improve communications with the Association Board, as well as continuously reinforcing the mission of Security Patrol."

Jim is also responsible for watch commander train-

ing. Presently, four new watch commanders have been added to the roster. "We are also very concerned with demonstrating to the membership how much the board appreciates their time and service. We are always looking for ways to reward the hours each member volunteers to Security Patrol," Jim said.

Recruiting and upgrading training is important to maintaining a viable organization that can assist the changing needs of the Sun City community. Fred Bailey, treasurer, echoed this concern. "This is a community of retired seniors and, of course, there is attrition due to health issues. Recruiting and training are my goals for the year. We need to increase membership, particularly for the midnight and 0400 shifts. Security Patrol is present at as many events as possible. At the new residents' orientation, we inform the new neighbors of the mission of Security Patrol and encourage new neighbors to join.

Membership is open to all residents, but recruits must take the training and understand the responsibilities. I emphasis that it is NOT a dangerous job. We observe and report."

As treasurer, Fred is responsible to the budget. "Last year, I was assistant treasurer, working with Jim Strom. He brought the department into the new age, creating forms, updating the computer program for accounting and record-keeping. The goal is to the Association Board of what Security Patrol is doing. Security Patrol costs the Association about \$100,000 per year and saves \$3 million."

That savings, he stressed, filters down to each homeowner. Recruiting and interviewing new recruits falls to Personnel Director Judy Foy.

"I am a dispatcher and have been a driver and head of training," she said.

With that background, Judy brings an understanding of the training process.

"I enjoy working with people, interviewing and guiding them into the disciplines. This year's focus on training in each of the disciplines is so important. We use the experiences of members in specific disciplines and stories. It is situational training, as well as the policies and procedures manual. Multitasking, particularly for dispatchers is very important. For drivers, being able to communicate with the neighbors is essential, particularly if we have a concern for resident call," she said. "Updating training for members and training methods for new recruits is the common goal among board members, Chief Sandy said. "That's my biggest goal. At the general meeting, held once a month, the board initiated mini training sessions in each discipline to communicate changes and approaches to improve our service to the community. I love the general meetings. I get to see and talk with people on all shifts," she said.

The future of Security Patrol is dependent on new recruits. "I don't see a drastic change for Patrol, but a younger force with new ideas to facilitate what we do, and do it better is the future," said Jim.

That appears to be the consensus of this dynamic board, whose concern for Security Patrol will continue to guide the members to serve the community of Sun City Summerlin.





# You Are the Captain of Your Own Health Care

hose of us who are 55 and over know the feeling of getting older. Whether because of a known medical condition or standard age-related changes, things just don't quite work like they used to. Some things slow down, some parts hurt more, and tasks may seem more difficult. The Center for Disease Control (CDC) estimates that more than 25 million people experience daily pain. Although many seniors experience regular pain associated with arthritis, joint disorders and other chronic conditions, pain with aging is not a foregone conclusion. It is NOT a natural part of aging!

Traditionally, chronic pain has been managed with pharmaceutical treatment. Cost, negative side effects and mixed results are causing many to explore non-pharmaceutical options to treat pain such as acupuncture, cognitive behavior therapy, CBD, meditation and exercise to name a few.

If you have a healthcare provider you trust and are comfortable with, consider yourself lucky. However, you must continue to be the captain of your own health care, examining all options available to you to promote good health and improve the quality of your life. It is too easy to simply blame doctors and the medi-

cal community for our pain. We must look

at the only thing we truly have control over, and that is what we individually think and do. Do we have lifestyle habits that could be causing or contributing to our illness and pain?

Do we blindly accept all prescriptions? Do we thoroughly research our conditions and medications that are prescribed? Are there possible natural alternatives available?

Conventional medicine (also referred to as Western or traditional) is medical treatment based on the use of drugs and surgery to treat symptoms of illness, and it is primarily reactive and treats the body part or disease symptom. Non-conventional medicine covers a wide variety of treatments and therapies who emphasize education, disease prevention and holistic (mind-body) treatment. Integrative medicine



**702-254-2303** – Sun City Security Patrol. Call if you observe any of the following:

- Suspicious vehicles, persons or activities
- Flashing porch lights
- Open garage doors at nighttime
- Lost or found residents, friends, relatives or pets
- Vehicles parked on a sidewalk
- Issues leading to concern for a resident newspapers piling up in a driveway, someone who has not been heard from in a while, or is not answering the phone.

If in doubt, call Security Patrol and the dispatcher should be able to direct you to the appropriate person or agency.



### **VINCE LOMBARDO: GUARDIAN OF THE OUTPOST OF DEMOCRACY**

pandau prison was already 70 years old with a sordid past when the Allies commandeered it to house Nazi prisoners sentenced at Nuremberg for war crimes. Originally built as a military prison in 1933, Spandau was designated as a holding area for opponents of the Hitler regime until the completion of the first Nazi concentration camps. From 1946 to 1987, Spandau was operated by the Four-Power Authorities, England, France, the Soviet Union and the United States on a rotating basis. In addition to the prison administrative personnel and military police, the walls and watchtowers were manned by infantry troops from each of four powers — again on a rotating basis, which explains how a boy from Chicago found himself manning a machine gun in a Spandau tower.

Vince Lombardo grew up in the Chicago area, graduated from high school in June 1956 and, along with a friend, volunteered for the draft. In August, he was drafted into the Army and proceeded to Fort Leonard Wood in Missouri for basic training after which he was sent to Fort Dix in New Jersey for advanced infantry training.

"On New Year's Eve 1956, I boarded a plane at McGuire Air Force Base heading to Germany as part of the 6th Infantry Regiment. Plane troubles forced us to land in Newfoundland (where we spent three days) before flying to Scotland and finally to Frankfurt, Germany, where we boarded a train for Berlin. At this point, Berlin was still in Russian-controlled East Germany," Vince said.

As part of their duties in Berlin, Vince and his fellow soldiers stood guard at Spandau one month on, three months off. Originally, seven Germans were confined at Spandau. By the time Vince arrived in January 1957, only four remained – Walter Funk, who was released in May 1957; Albert Speer and Baldur von Schirach, who were released in 1966; and Rudolf Hess, who died in prison in 1987.

"So, most of the time there were 60 of us manning the watch towers and walls to ensure that these guys didn't escape. It was pretty boring to tell the truth. We never had contact with the prisoners although we could see them when they were allowed out to work in the prison garden. Speer particularly liked to work there.

"But, as I said, it was pretty boring. Nobody tried to escape and nobody tried to break in to rescue them. I guess the most exciting times were when we turned over the guard duties to the Russians. My first impression was that they are kids just like us and the second was they were sharp. Of course, we were, too. I mean our boots were polished, we wore the blue infantry scarfs, our khakis were pressed (mostly by the German nationals we hired) and our helmets were polished. It was almost a contest. But other than that, there was no interaction with the Russians. They didn't make any secret of the fact that they didn't want us there."

The 6th Infantry also stood guard at the Joint Command Center, along with troops from the English and French detachments. The Soviets were there until they pulled out of the agreement.

"When we weren't standing guard, we were training — a lot of training. These were mostly live-fire exercises held out in the

countryside of West Germany. The thing that I remember most about them is the local kids who would come through the training area to pick up the brass to be sold for scrap. Since I was part of a machine gun crew, and we went through lots of bullets, we were pretty popular with them," Vince recalled.

"One of the best things about being stationed in Berlin was the proximity to France and Italy. On leave I was able to go to Paris, Rome and Venice. I also got to visit some relatives living in Metz, France. The only bad part of traveling was the Russians. We had to travel through East Germany and they harassed us as often as possible, demanding to see papers, etc. My travel orders had to be in English and Russian!

"In Berlin, we weren't allowed to leave the western sector. The only time I saw East Berlin was on a tour the Army gave us upon arriving in Berlin. It was pretty depressing. By that time, West Germany, including Berlin, was pretty much rebuilt but not East Berlin."

After completing his two-year tour, Vince returned to Chicago and got a job in sales, a career he stayed in until he retired in 1992 as the Regional Marketing Manager for the National Enquirer. Along the way he met and married Judith in 1967. The couple moved to Sun City in 1992.

## Fred Comes 'It's Time to Give Back'



s we've written many times in the Link, our community runs on volunteerism. Many people work hard for this community and that's what makes it work. One of our residents, Fred Comes, was recently selected as Volunteer of the Year for his work at the Ronald McDonald House Charities. For the past five years, since his retirement, Fred has driven the parents and relatives of sick children at University Medical Center, Sunrise Hospital and Summerlin Hospital to be with their children on Tuesday and Thursday mornings. I can directly appreciate this effort because when I had my heart attack 26 years ago, in Anchorage, Alaska, the hospital I was in had a similar program that housed and took care of my wife. As anyone who has needed the help of such a service knows, one of the most difficult things in the world is to have to make accommodation plans when dealing with tough family medical issues.

Every Thursday, Fred drives to RMcDH (Ronald McDonald House), loads a refrigerated van with lunches made by other volunteers and delivers them to several hospital locations for the families of patients. He also assembles and delivers bags of little projects, complete with a toy, for children waiting at the hospitals. On occasion, Fred also has done handyman work at the House.

The Ronald McDonald House program provides a home away from home for families so they can stay close to their hospitalized child at little or no cost.

According to Christine Fernandez, RMcDH's Volunteer Manager, Fred's volunteer hours totaled 1,134.75 since 2012.



Those hours, she added, equate to roughly \$24,000!

In addition to his work at RMcDH, Fred volunteers one day a week at the Red Rock Canyon Visitor Center, where he is a tortoise wrangler. He answers questions from visitors about the tortoises, while he waters and cleans up the enclosures.

"I took the assignment because I can keep up with the tortoises," he laughed.

The desert tortoise is the official state reptile of Nevada. The Red Rock Canyon Visitor Center is home to seven females in the largest enclosure, and two males that each have their own pen. To see the most tortoise activity, visit the Red Rock Visitor Center on Wednesday or Saturday at 9 a.m. during feeding time. For volunteer opportunities, call 702-515-5350.

As if all of that wasn't enough, Fred also works as a driver on our Security Patrol one afternoon each week, which, he says, gives him a real "sense of community." After moving here two years ago, Fred realized that the Security Patrol team was a great way to "get and be connected."

As you can see, Fred wears many hats, and after compiling all this information, I asked him, "Why do you do it?"

His answer, "It's time to give back!" It's just that simple.

### Volunteers Step Up When Fire Monitoring System Fails

n Friday, May 31, a serious electrical malfunction caused the Desert Vista Community Center automatic fire monitoring system to shut down.

This important location houses Sun City Summerlin's main ballroom, a fitness center, club space and Administration offices, along with an indoor swimming pool and the Board of Directors' meeting room.

The local Fire Marshall ordered the buildings, set among 48,000 square feet, to be manned 24/7 until repairs could be made. He ordered monitoring records be kept of key locations in order to confirm that those locations remained secure while the alarm system was being repaired.

Without round-the-clock monitoring, the buildings would have had to be closed until repairs could be made.

Upon learning of the breach, SCSCAI Executive Director Mitzi Mills immediately contacted Sun City Security Patrol Chief Sandy Lyons and requested that a plan to monitor the facility be set in motion to assure that the Fire Marshall's orders were carried out.

Chief Lyons quickly sent out an e-blast to all 215-plus Security Patrol volunteers, requesting assistance in monitoring the buildings. She reassigned some volunteers from their regular duties to cover the Fire Marshall's dictate, and assigned others to cover the 24/7 requirements while repairs were being made.

Patrol volunteers walked the entire facility every 30 minutes, 24 hours a day, seven days a week. They recorded appropriate time, location and condition information in special logs provided by the Fire Marshall at eight designated locations throughout the buildings.

Security Patrol volunteers remained on duty for 20 straight days until Wednesday, June 19. In all, volunteers turned in more than 480 hours, walking an estimated 110 miles to help protect all of the Desert Vista facilities.

This unexpected turn of events, and the need for a quick response points to the value of the Security Patrol team and the ultimate goal of Sun City Summerlin's Neighborhood Preparedness

Team. With more than 80 Neighborhood Watch groups, NPT volunteers are ready to assist in a community emergency. These three co-operative organizations, some with common member/volunteers, are in place to promote safe, secure surroundings for all residents of Sun City Summerlin.

We salute Security Patrol Chief Lyons and our Security Patrol organization for stepping up to help manage a difficult situation. We send special "Thanks" to those volunteers who devoted many extra hours of service.

When you see a Patrol volunteer, give a special wave to the folks who work tirelessly to help keep us all secure around the clock.







ome of you will remember back to the "Our Gang" movies of the 1930s when Alfalfa and friends would think of ways akin to the movie version.

It's easy, right! Well, it was Hollywood easy, not real life easy. When the Community Theatre Club got together to plan its next big thing, one thing was certain, they wanted to do a Broadway musical. Less certain was which of the hundreds of available candidates should they do.

to earn money — one of which was to put on a show.

Enter director Audra Duvall.

"When the committee approached me to direct their play, they left it to me to suggest a title. After some thought, I suggested 'Grease' — a suggestion that was enthusiastically welcomed. I had previously directed a rendition of 'Grease' at Forest Grove High School in Oregon and it was a smashing success."

"Grease" was originally performed in 1971 and by the time it closed on Broadway it held the record for the most Broadway performances at 3,388. Since then, "Grease" (which was named after the working class sub-culture of the time known as "greasers") has become a staple of community theater and high school drama groups across the country. During that time, the script has undergone a metamorphosis. The original play, in keeping with the greaser sub-culture, was a vulgar, raunchy epic focused on teen pregnancy and gang violence.

Adaptation as a Hollywood movie required significant modification into a relatively wholesome teen love story. The version being produced by the Sun City Community Theater is

Educator by day, director by night, Duvall has been involved with local theater groups since her teen years. She acted in school plays while in middle and high school, and received an award as the Best Student Director at her high school before going on to major in Theater at college.

"As a theater major we acted, directed and produced plays. It was just part of the course. Later, I directed plays at the local community college, again receiving an award, and was an Education Professor at the University of Phoenix for 10 years."

# So It Begins

On May 25, members of the Community Theatre Club and the Sun City Dance Company met for their first rehearsal. Before the curtain goes up on the first of three performances, set for Friday, September 13, to Sunday, September 15, at the Starbright Theatre, this group of 18 actors and numerous backstage personnel will have met 40 times and collectively put it well over 2,100 performer/hours. All so that, to the audience, it looks easy.

Tickets for "Grease" are available at the Starbright Theatre box office, and at the Social Monitor stations at Desert Vista and Mountain Shadows.







#### What Does It Take to Be a Board Member?

In the next couple of months you will receive notice in this magazine from the Sun City Summerlin Election Committee notifying you that if you are an owner of home in Sun City Summerlin and in good standing you are eligible to run for the Board of Directors.

While there are only two qualifications to be a Board member (1) an owner of the home and (2) a member in good standing, as a Professional Community Association Manager (PCAM) I like to share with homeowners what they need to know not to just be a Board member, but to be good Board member and I also like to share what, if elected, they might expect as far as time commitment and meetings.

### How many hats can you wear? A Board member at SCSCAI wears more than one hat!

Owner: As a Board member you are still a homeowner and have all the same obligations, responsibilities and opportunities of every homeowner. Board members pay the same assessment and fees that homeowners pay and do not receive any compensation or perks. As an individual owner you cannot speak for the Board. While you can share information that is available in open session minutes, publications or on the Web, you cannot commit the Association, Board or staff to provide services, purchases or maintenance of any kind. You can bring items forward through the committee process and the Board meetings, but until voted on and approved by the Board it is an idea and not a commitment.

**Director:** As a member of the Board of Directors you are one of nine directors. All decision making is done at a duly called meeting with a properly stated motion that receives a second and is voted on. Majority prevails. There will be times you are happy about the outcome of a motion and there will be times you are not. In the end, as a Board member you should support the decision and not speak out negatively about other Board members who may not have voted the way you would have liked them to.

The Board as a whole, as well as each individual Board member, is assigned mandatory duties by the SCSCAI governing documents as well as the state of Nevada.

As a Director you are charged with protecting, maintaining and enhancing all of the common elements. This is important to note because it does not say just those you personally think are important or those with the largest use or those that you participate in. As a Director on the Board you have to be able to separate your personal interests and the interests of your friends or club members and look at the needs of the entire

Association. It is interesting to note the duties do not just say protect and maintain, it says enhance. Enhancing a property is a duty well above just keeping it clean and fixing things when they break. It means evaluating and replacing things that are obsolete and adding new things to keep the property from aging in place. There is also an obligation as a Director to make sure the business affairs of the Association are being managed properly and to ensure the Association is in compliance with the governing documents. One thing all Directors are made aware of is they can delegate action and jobs but they cannot delegate responsibility, and both the governing documents and Nevada State Law hold the Board responsible for Association business and Association care and Association financial stability now and for the future, whether or not the task itself was delegated to a staff member or contractor.

As a Director you have a fiduciary responsibility to the Association and will exercise the business judgement rule. As surprising as it may be this may be your biggest challenge on the Board, not because you are not honest or not a good business person, but because almost every decision you make will impact someone you or your spouse or significant other personally know in the community, one of your neighbors, someone you are in a club with or someone who voted for you. Whether it is a decision on the operations of an amenity or on the budget, you cannot let your own personal needs or the needs of someone you know play into your decisions on what is right not only for the community as a whole, but the future of the community 30 years from now. This is especially difficult at budget time as each Board member has a fiduciary duty to evaluate the information presented and make the best financial decision for the Association not for themselves or their neighbors. Every five years this decision is escalated because of the requirement for a full reserve study. The reserves are a driving force in preserving, maintaining and enhancing the community and the adjustments every five years can lead to larger increases in dues than in the previous years.

**Officer:** Once the election is over and the incoming Board members have been seated, the entire Board will elect officers. If you are elected as an officer you will be obligated to the duties set forth in the SCSCAI governing documents as well as Nevada State Law. Again, there are some of those duties that you can delegate, but the responsibility remains with you. Officers can make certain decisions, but those decision making powers have to have been delegated to them by the governing documents or by a vote of the Board approved by a majority of Board members in a duly called Board meeting.

**Committee Chair:** Each Board member serves as a Committee Chair. The only member who sometimes does not Chair a

committee is the Board President, primarily because of the other duties they perform. As a Committee Chair you will meet monthly and have a Committee of roughly 8 to 10 people. Each committee has a designated duty and your job is to direct the agenda and help staff prepare for the meeting, make sure items that need to go to the Board are presented to your committee and your committee votes on a recommendation you will carry forward to the Board.

### How Much Time Should I Expect to Spend on Board Duties:

Since each Board member is different this list provides the things that all Board members do to prepare for and attend meetings. The monthly minimum hours spent on Association business for the average Board member equals 68 hours a month.

In preparation for their monthly Board meeting, Board members attend an average of six of the nine monthly Committee meetings. Each meeting is at least 2.5 hours long. This includes the monthly Committee meeting that they chair. **15 hours** 

Review of financial statements in preparation for the Finance Committee meeting and Board of Directors' meeting.

#### 2 hours

Review of the agenda and back-up material prior to the committee meeting they chair. **1 hour** 

Property inspections for committees they serve on or Chair where applicable or meeting with staff to review documents for meetings such as finance and legal services. **2 hours** 

Review of the Board agenda and back-up material for the Board meeting. **3 hours** 

Attendance of open Board of Directors' meeting. 3 to 4 hours

Attendance of Executive Session. 1 hour

The Board members receive an average of 10 emails a day regarding Association business. While they are only copied on these and do not need to respond, they do need to read and be aware of them. **5 hours** 

Budget Hearings. Four consecutive days minimum – late March or early April (4 hours each). **16 hours** 

Budget ratification meeting. 1 hour

Coffee with the Board. Monthly. 2 hours

Each Board member is different on how many times they contact staff or the committee they are responsible for, or how many homeowners call them or email them direct. In talking with Board members over the years most agree that, on aver-

age, they spend at least four hours a week on Association business that includes talking to, emailing or being stopped by homeowners. **17 hours** 

In fairness, I have used the minimum of what time commitment is needed. Many of our Board members dedicate many more hours to the Association, but most people who are considering running for the Board want to know what I think the minimum hours are for meetings they should attend, meetings they are expected to attend, preparation for meetings and interacting with staff and homeowners.

If serving your community as a Board member sounds like something you would like to do, remember the only qualifications you need to have are:

Be a unit owner in good standing

No unpaid assessments

Disclose any potential or actual conflicts of interest Cannot stand to gain from a matter before the Board Cannot reside with or be related to a Board member or candidate Cannot be related to the Executive Director

Being a Board member can be a rewarding experience. I have found that the Board members who enjoy their time on the Board are those who went into the election knowing that (1) every decision is a decision made by the Board in a Board meeting; (2) the governing documents and state law have to be adhered to, and while changes can be made to the governing documents it is not only tedious and costly but many times takes an overwhelming vote of the homeowners in order to pass; (3) that while caring for the homeowners and their wants and needs is important, the fiduciary responsibility is the obligation; (4) there is a time commitment to being a Board member, and it is more than a three- to four-hour meeting each month.

In the next election there will be five available seats. While I have been here I can honestly say we have fantastic Board members. They are all in a small group of the best and most professional I have worked with. If you are interested in joining some wonderful men and women who take all of their duties seriously, think about throwing your homeowner hat into the ring.

I want all of you who think you would like to be a Board member to be empowered by the knowledge of not only what makes you eligible but what some of the duties and commitments are once you are elected. If you think you plan to run, start attending the Board meetings, Coffee with the Board and committee meetings now so you are well versed on the issues when you participate in Candidates Night!


