New Ballot Procedure In Place for 2020 BOD Election

Hardly a day passes without hearing election news. Over the next several weeks, the election news you will be hearing will have to do with Sun City. You will soon be

seeing the names of the candidates who have chosen to serve our community by running for election to Sun City Summerlin Community Association, Inc.'s, Board of Directors. As with any election, voting is important, and we look forward to a strong response.

This year's ballot procedure will be different as a new process has been put into place. Unlike previous years when the ballot was delivered inside the February Link, the ballot will now arrive in a separate, first-class, 8x10 manila envelope, starting in early February. Ballots will be mailed to each homeowner, along with information about each candidate. This year, five seats will be available on the Board of Directors. While we are still in transition from two-year to three-year Board terms, the three highest vote recipients will be elected to three-year terms with the next two highest vote-getters elected to one-year terms. Detailed information about how to vote will be included in each packet.

The 2020 Sun City Election Committee consists of Michael Christiansen, Melanie Kirby, Ruth Mintz and Jim Strom. The goal of the Committee is to conduct the election and count the ballots. Ballots will be counted at the Association's annual meeting on Wednesday, February 26, 8 a.m., at Mountain Shadows.

Please be sure to read all the material distributed to you. Also, plan to attend the Residents' Forum's "Meet the Candidates" event scheduled for Wednesday, January 8, 2020, 7 p.m., at Desert Vista.

The deadline to submit your ballot for Sun City's Board of Directors election is Tuesday, February 25. All ballots must be received by the Administration Office at Mountain Shadows by 5 p.m. on that day.

New Year Brings Improvements to Smoke Alarm Replacement Program How Will I Get MY Smoke Alarms Replaced?

as Vegas Fire & Rescue – (LVFR) is replacing expired smoke alarms in Sun City residences. LVFR inspectors explain that the actual sensor in the alarm runs down over time. After 10 years, more or less, the alarm won't detect smoke, even if you fill the whole house with smoke, and even if you've replaced the batteries.

In 2019, alarms were replaced in more than 250 Sun City homes. The units have a 10-year battery; no more climbing the ladder! In addition, residents generously donated nearly \$1,100 to fund LVFRs purchase of smoke alarms throughout other parts of the Valley.

Below explains how YOU may sign up to get your units replaced in 2020. This process begins on Sunday, December 15, 2019.

- 1. Go to the Social Monitor at Desert Vista, Mountain Shadows or Pinnacle community centers.
- 2. Ask for a Smoke Alarm package.
- Complete the application, sign the required waiver and write a check ONLY for \$135, made payable to "N.P.T." (Neighborhood Preparedness Team).
- Please also fill out the blue Emergency Contact form with upto-date phone numbers and emergency contacts, preferably someone who lives nearby and has access to your home.
- 5. Return the forms and your check to any Social Monitor.
- 6. Installations will be done on a first- come, first-served basis as forms are turned in. You will be notified by post-card and/or phone about your installation date.

Meet Las Vegas Fire & Rescue's Certified Fire Inspector Zachary Collins

ach has been an integral part of the Sun City Summerlin 2019 Smoke Alarm Program. He will be the program leader and point person in 2020.

Zach grew up working hard on a farm in North Carolina. His work ethic, as well as his knowledge of fire prevention and safety measures, serves our community well. Zach has lived in Las Vegas for 30 years with his wife, four children and grandson. His service for 18 years with Las Vegas Fire & Rescue reinforces his commitment to programs like this. He wants Sun City residents to know he "Thanks everyone for taking part in your own safety and by joining the program."

In 2020, Zach will be doing

installs, scheduling, troubleshooting alarms, purchasing, education with residents and leading the volunteers during monthly installs. You may even meet Zach at your home when he installs your smoke alarms himself.

This cutting-edge community program signals a huge commitment from Las Vegas Fire & Rescue. LVFR wants to recognize its

partnership with Lowe's and First Alert, which allows them to purchase units at a huge discount. This is important because this program gets ZERO funding from Sun City HOA assessments.

LVMPD to Lead Women's Safety Class, January 13

S un City's Neighborhood Preparedness Team will sponsor a 90-minute women's safety class on Monday, January 13, 1 p.m., at Desert Vista. The instruction will be led by Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department women officers exclusively for women. LVMPD Officer Laura Van Dyke will teach effective tips for day-to-day safety, as well as provide information on certain situations that may be unique to women in Las Vegas. The class is designed to give women a general understanding of how to stay vigilant in their daily lives, as well as how to recognize and avoid potentially dangerous situations. Participants will learn how to make a safety plan to help decrease their chances of becoming a victim.

Walking and running are popular forms of exercise. To stay safe while doing so takes some preparation, said Officer Van Dyke. Criminals take advantage of every opportunity to victimize people, and women must be aware of their surroundings. Don't be so preoccupied with your activity that you fail to notice others around you, she added. Tips to stay safe include: Avoid walking or running alone. It is better to walk with others or with your dog; skip the headphones while out on your walk as they can be distracting and keep you from noticing people around you; always keep your head up, swing your arms, stand straight up, but be discreet and do not draw too much attention to yourself; avoid night walks; let people know where you are going and when you will return; if you think you are being followed, cross the street and go into a public place; carry a cell phone and identification; do not exercise near bushes where someone might hide; wear bright-colored clothing for high visibility; and consider protection items such as pepper spays, body alarms or whistles.

This Neighborhood Preparedness Team-sponsored event is limited to 50 guests. Required free admission tickets will be available, starting Sunday, December 15, at the Social Monitor stations at Desert Vista, Mountain Shadows and the Pinnacle.



Santa Is a Year-round Gig for Sun City Resident

was the night before Christmas and all through Sun City, Santa Charlie was busy keeping up with his holiday schedule. Actually, Santa Charlie, aka Charlie Bush's holiday routine starts well before the 12th month of the year. Charlie, who is affectionately dubbed Santa Charlie when he's in the red suit, makes, on average, 30 to 50 appearances as the famous elf, starting the day after Thanksgiving and leading up to Christmas Day.

Charlie, who has lived in Sun City since 2007, is quick to point out, "I'm a New Yorker, from Brooklyn," he said with smile and an obvious East Coast accent. In 2007, Charlie and his wife, Edie, moved into the community from their home in Concord, North Carolina.

But the tradition of inhabiting Santa's personality started long before he arrived in the desert.

"Any volunteer activity I've ever done, or organization I have joined has involved children," Charlie said. "I am a Shriner, and back in New Jersey I was an Elk. I've worked to raise money for children's charities and hospitals for a long time."

Recalling back when his daughters were 3 and 5 years old, Charlie said, "I started being Santa when my girls were very young. My wife made me a red corduroy Santa outfit. What would happen was I would come in as Santa and give them their toys, and I'd go out the front door and then down to the basement and I would change. Then I'd go back upstairs and my daughter would say, 'Daddy, you just missed Santa Claus.' I knew that could only go on for so long.

So, I went to my neighbor and told him, 'You be Santa for my kids and I'll be Santa for yours.' Then it evolved into going out and actually volunteering. I even bought a wig set," Charlie said. "Up until coming to Sun City, I had always volunteered."

Then something happened when Charlie signed up to work for the Shriners' annual Las Vegas golf tournament.

"In 2008, I remember walking up to the sign-in booth and the fellow standing behind the table, who had a beard, looked at me and said, 'You, too, could be one of us. You should become a member of FORBS.' To which I responded, 'My finances have been taken care of, thank you.' And he said, 'No, this FORBS is the Federation of Real Bearded Santas.'"

As Charlie learned more about FORBS and later attended a Santa convention in San Diego, he was hooked. Not only did he join FORBS, but he helped charter the local Silver State Santas chapter. Today, the group has 24 Santa members and its own logo. The members meet, in their real, full beards, every month for coffee to discuss the tricks of the trade. In addition to his work with the Silver



State Santas, Charlie attends Santa conventions, oceanic cruises, parades and he even dropped in on the World Congress of Santas that meets annually in Coppehagen, Denmark.

If all that isn't enough, Charlie was honored to become the honorary Santa of the Las Vegas City Council in 2011. In that capacity, he attends official tree lightings, various Ward events and special appearances at the request of City Council members. The city's calendar alone requires that Santa Charlie begin planning his Christmas calendar in February. As the year progresses, he adds more dates, and by October he is usually booked. It's a cool, seasonal gig. And thank goodness for the Silver State Santas, he said, as the members offer a great backup in the event that Santa's schedule gets double-booked, which sometimes happens.

When he's not appearing as Santa, Charlie works on his hobbies, including making statement belts in the Model Builders' workshop at Desert Vista. The, you guessed it, Santa belts complement the red suit for himself and his Santa buddies.

Why does he do it?

"Because it makes me feel good," he said.

That, and it just must be a kick to be on a cruise ship filled with 300 Santa Clauses. Can you imagine?

Crock Pot

Prep Time: 5 min. Cook Time: 2 hours. Servings: 10 Ingredients

40 frozen, pre-cooked meatballs (homemade or your favorite brand)

1 can jellied cranberry sauce1/2 cup orange marmaladeZest of 1 medium orange1 Tbsp. dried, minced onio

1 tsp. garlic powder

1 Tbsp. dried, minced onions Non-stick cooking spray

Instructions

Add non-stick cooking spray to your crock pot. Add meatballs and top with remaining ingredients. Stir to coat meatballs. Cover and cook on high for 2 hours. Turn heat to low until you are ready to serve.

Instant Pot

Prep Time: 5 mins. Cook Time: 5 mins. (Time to pressurize and sauce: 15 minutes) Servings: 10

Ingredients

5	
1 Tbsp. olive oil	40 frozen, pre-cooked meatballs
1/2 cup water	1 15-oz. can jellied cranberry sauce
1/2 cup orange marmalade	Zest of 1 medium orange
1 tsp. garlic powder	1 Tbsp. dried, minced onions

Instructions

Spread the olive oil evenly on the bottom of the inner Instant Pot and add meatballs to the pot. Pour the water around and over the meatballs. Add the cranberry sauce, orange marmalade, zest, garlic powder and onions on top of the meatballs, but do not stir.

Place the lid on the Instant Pot, turn vent to Sealing position and hit PRESSURE COOK for 5 minutes. Pot will take a few minutes to reach pressure. Cook for 5 minutes.

When the pot beeps, do a quick release. When the pin drops, remove the lid and stir the meatballs. To thicken the sauce, hit CANCEL and SAUTE for 5 to 10 minutes, or until the sauce becomes as thick as you want it. To keep meatballs warm in the pot, hit CANCEL then hit KEEP WARM.

The above recipe was made in a 6-quart Instant Pot electric pressure cooker. To make in the 8-quart pot, add 1 1/2 cups water, but keep the other ingredient amounts the same.



67 Million to 1: Sun City Golfer Nabs 2 Holes-in-one During the Same Round

he odds of being struck by lightning in your lifetime are about 1 in 3,000; a person's chance of being attacked by a shark, 1 in 11.5 million. Any person has a 1 in 185 chance of being murdered; a 1 in 60,000 chance of being killed in a tornado; and a 1 in 30,000 chance of dying in an airplane crash. By comparison these statistics, gathered by those who study such things, make Sun City's resident Frank Humel's latest achievement on the Palm Valley Golf Course quite extraordinary.

In any given round of golf, an average player has a 1 in 12,500 chance of making a hole-in-one. The odds of making two in a single round of golf jump to a 1 in 67 million. So Frank had a better chance of getting struck by lightning or being attacked by a shark and, well, you get the picture.

"Both times the pitch mark was about 8 inches in front of the hole precisely on both of them," Frank said, recalling his out-of-this-world achievement. "It wasn't like it hit the green and I watched it roll and it dropped in the hole. With the first one, I knew I hit a good shot and I didn't see anything. But then when I saw the pitch mark I kind of assumed it was in. The second one, one of my friends ran up first and cried out."

Frank is not a professional golfer, but one would be hardpressed to refer to him as a duffer. His first hole-in-one on that day was made on the third hole, 128 yards, using a 9 iron. The second, was on the seventh hole, 163 yards, using a 6 iron.

He started to play the game in earnest at age 43. Other career achievements include shooting a 69, his age at the time, and five additional holes-in-one.

Frank has lived in our community for 17 years and says that he appreciates the convenience of being able to leave his garage in his golf cart and drive to the golf courses.

What does Frank like about the game? He likes being outdoors, the exercise, the fun and camaraderie.

One could argue that the game of golf requires honed physical and mental skills. Some say luck is also a component. Frank considers himself lucky when it comes to the important things, which include his family and marriage. While his skill on the golf course is evident, some could say he also has had at least a fraction of luck on the links.


Double-duty Agenda Keeps Members Busy

he Common Area Properties (CAP) Committee voted to recommend forwarding nearly all 12 items on its New Business agenda to Sun City's Board of Directors during its November 5 meeting at Desert Vista. The meeting, which lasted nearly two and a half hours ran longer than expected due to the fact that the Committee did not meet in October because of a lack of a quorum.

In addition to its consensus to forward to Sun City's BOD the purchase of rental golf clubs for Sun City's three courses and increasing the height of the outfield fence of the Pinnacle's softball field, CAP members listened as SCSCAI directors presented reports on their individual departments. Golf Director Donny Long reported on increased rounds for the community's courses; Director of Golf Maintenance Brian Bagwell told the Committee his crews are currently tidying up course landscape issues around the tee boxes and roughs. "The Bermuda went to sleep quickly this year," Brian said, adding, "Next, we'll be painting the fairways so that they'll look great again soon." As for fitness, Director Pam Shields brought the Committee up to speed on the outdoor pools and pool furniture, explaining that the chairs, lounges and umbrellas have been stored for the season. Louis Darling, Landscape Director, told everyone that the new winter color has been planted, and soon orange snap dragons will be sprucing up the monument entrance signs. Louis also reported that fall palm tree skinning was complete and the irrigation system on Greenbelt No. 1 was being worked on.

As for Food & Beverage, SCSCAI Executive Director Mitzi Mills apprised the Committee on behalf of F&B Manager Anthony Marrone, who was absent.

"We're looking at closing the gap between expenses and

income," Mitzi said, explaining her continuing effort to analyze the Food & Beverage Department. "The Summit lunch sales are

strong, almost as great as the Tavern's. We seem to have found

our niche up there." Mitzi said as she updated the Committee on a recent Sunday brunch she attended where she was able to meet with and listen to residents' concerns over their expectations of the community's restaurants. Mitzi also told Committee members that Food & Beverage is booked almost every night in December with holiday parties, and that the groups are paying what they should.

"Anthony does a fabulous job, all the credit goes to him for that," she said.

o some extent our life experiences are governed by when and where we were born. For example, if you were a male born in Depression-era America you grew up expecting to get your driver's license at 16 and register for the draft at 18. At that point, you became an obligated volunteer. In other words, you waited for the draft board to call and volunteer you, or you elected to volunteer for service in the branch of your choice. One way or the other you expected to serve, whether it was immediately after high school graduation or delayed until college completion.

"My formative era was decidedly different from the current world of social media. I experienced a victorious and prosperous United States emerging post-World War II. America was perceived as noble and righteous; a triumph of good over evil," said Sun City resident Len Kreisler M.D.

"In June 1957, I married Joan Dorfman and graduated from the University of Vermont School of Medicine. I had taken and passed parts I and II of the National

Board of Medical Examiners and would be eligible to take part III at the end of a year of postgraduate, rotating internship training. Passing that would make me eligible to practice medicine in most states.

"After completing the internship in 1958, I had to make a choice. Either I could go into private practice and wait for the draft board notice, or I could take advantage of the Berry Plan, a federal program enacted to make it easier to recruit MDs. I


elected to choose the Berry Plan and signed up for a two-year hitch in exchange for which I received the rank of captain and a \$100-per-month volunteer enlistment bonus, plus the usual \$8,000 per year captain's pay. At that point, I officially became an obligated volunteer."

Len was sent to Fort Sam Houston in Texas for basic training.

"The trip south was like going to a foreign country for a Jewish boy from New York; segregation signs, unfamiliar accents and menu items needing further explanation — grits and collard greens, no way," Len recalled with a shrug.

"I had been a devotee of our military campaigns in WWII. I stuck to my goal of becoming a physician, but a contingent military career had always been in the recesses of my mind. I now had both, and I was determined to be a model officer and the best military physician possible. The Fort Sam experience was totally enjoyable, even crawling under live machine gun fire during the night training exercise. We had lectures on general military protocols, as well as specialized medical topics such as burn care, treating bullet and shrapnel wounds and helicopter evacuation capabilities. At the completion of basic, I was given the opportunity to request a duty assignment. I requested Europe. I got Fort Detrick, Maryland. My assignment: Classified."

Fort Detrick was the U.S. Biological Warfare research center. Officially, the center's programs were aimed at developing defenses against attacks using anthrax, plague, botulism, tulare-



"My first visit to Site R evoked the feeling of entering a Hitleresque WWII bunker. Among other things, the medical facilities were extensive with surgery, X-ray, pharmacy and hospital beds. Should the need arise, my medical unit was to move here for the duration. (Our families were not invited.) Our duties included regular inspection of the facility and ensuring that all was stocked and ready. The military personnel who worked there were stationed at Fort Richie and thus were my patients. Richie had just one doctor (me) and one dentist, plus support staff."

Things went well until a new post commander took over. Initially, people like the post surgeon and the chaplain had little contact. Slowly that changed. Rumors started circulating about irrational orders, inappropriate comments and threats of court martial. Eventually, one of those court martial threats was against an enlisted staff member, a World War II vet with what Len considered to be an excellent work record. Things began to escalate; records were kept, observations shared. The colonel was a West Point graduate so Len knew that it would be difficult to get the Army to take action against him. On one hand, that made Len doubt the wisdom of making a career of the Army, although if he had been single he would have pursued a regular Army commission regardless. But he was married, so he used his last weeks in uniform to put a negative medical evaluation in the Colonel's file and to file a complaint with the Inspector General.

His obligation complete in 1960, Len pursued his first love opening a family practice in upstate New York. In 1973, he was hired as Medical Director for the Nevada Operations Center, Department of Energy (Nevada Test Site). With that position, of course, came a move to Las Vegas. While working for the DOE, he became involved with the University Medical Center, eventually serving as Chief of Staff. When the DOE job ended, Len wasn't quite ready to retire so he signed up as a cruise ship doctor sailing on a number of ships between 1990 and 1995 at which time he officially retired. But, of course, retirement didn't mean sitting home and watching TV. Len has served on the Sun City's Board of Directors and has written five books, both fiction and non-fiction, and maintains an active MD license in Nevada. Your calls captioned. Whenever. Wherever.

This item will be paid for out of the Reserve account and was budgeted for in 2019/2020 in the amount of \$60,000.00 and is over budget in the amount of \$11,117.00. SECOND by Gerry Sokolski. This item will be paid for out of the Reserve account and was budgeted for in 2019/2020 in the amount of \$37,000.00 and is over budget in the amount of \$2,878.31. **SECOND** by Jim Akers. **APPROVED UNANIMOUSLY.**

RFP #20-18 – Golf Cart Replacement: MOTION by Ken Resnik to accept the recommendations from the Golf Oversight Committee and the Finance Committee to accept the recommendation of Director of Golf Donny Long that we accept the bid from EZGO in the amount of \$994,817.50, including tax, shipping and trade-in of all 210 carts. This includes escalating the trade-in and purchase of 130 golf carts that are not scheduled for replacement until the 2020/2021 fiscal Reserve Fund budget to allow us to take advantage of the volume purchase discount and to have the all of the Sun City Summerlin Golf Course carts be the same with a 5-year warranty on the carts that includes the lithium batteries and without a mechanical brake system. This makes the cost of each cart \$4,737.23. This item will be paid for out of the Reserve account and was budgeted as follows in 2019/2020 budget: \$412,000.00 for the replacement of 80 carts at Palm Valley Golf Course. In the 2020/2021 budget: \$257,500.00 for the replacement of 50 carts at Eagle Crest Golf Course; and \$412,000.00 for the replacement of 80 carts at Highland Falls

Golf Course. The total combined budget for 2109/2020 and 2020/2021 for all three golf courses is \$1,081,500.00. This purchase is under budget by \$86,682.50 if you combine the 2019/2020 and 2020/2021 budget for golf cart purchases, justifying replacing all the carts now because next fiscal year we would need to replace the remaining 130 carts as they will be out of warranty. SECOND by Bruce Alitt. APPROVED UNANIMOUSLY.

Adjournment: MOTION by Barbara Holden that there be no further business to come before the Board of Directors that the meeting be adjourned. SECOND by Jim Akers. There being no objections from any of the Board members, the Board President, Leo Crawford, adjourned the meeting at 8:38 p.m.




