

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
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CELEBRATING CITIZENSHIP

Sun City Residents Recall Their Paths to America after World War II

To Remember and Not to Forget * ALEX KUECHEL

rowing up in Berlin during the late 1920s and early '30s, Alexander Kuechel had a relatively normal life. His parents, Sinthe and Fanny, had a successful clothing manufacturing business, thus sheltering Alexander and his older sister from much of the economic turmoil of the time.

"We were fully integrated into the German culture, although my parents had originally emigrated from Poland and were not German citizens. We spoke only German in our house. I attended a local Christian school. At that time, I did not experience any anti-Semitism.

"Our home was located in the Prenzlauer Berg neighborhood in the Pankow borough of Berlin. It was very near the Rykestrasse Synagogue, the largest synagogue in pre-war Berlin and the second largest in Europe to survive the war. Although it was trashed during Kristallnacht, it escaped burning because of its location next to a large apartment building and the local police station. It remained in service until 1940 when the German military confiscated the building," Alex said.

All that began to radically change with the election of Hitler and the Nazi party's control of the Reichstag in 1933. The persecution of the Jews began with the law forbidding them from holding any public and professional positions. Nor were Jewish students allowed to attend public schools and universities.

"So, I was enrolled in a private, Jewish school," Alex said. "One of the ironies of the day was that the forced termination of all Jewish teachers and University professors meant that there was an ample supply of great teachers available. Among other things, the school began teaching foreign languages. I believe that this was to prepare us to leave Germany. I chose to learn English. At this time, my father became religious and I was enrolled in religious school in the afternoons. We also joined a Zionist Organization."

By the fall of 1938, things got considerably worse. In an organized program, the Nazis attacked anything Jewish. Businesses were torched, synagogues were destroyed and people were beaten in the streets. Alex's father was arrested but Alex and his mother remained in Berlin. In January 1939, Alex received a certificate from the Zionist organization that granted him admission to Palestine, then an English protectorate. German law granted a passport to anyone holding such a certificate, including people already in a concentration camp. But the organization asked Alex, who was 14, and his mother to allow the certificate to be used to get someone out of the camps along with a promise to replace it soon. They agreed.

In June 1939, Alex and his mother were forced to go to Poland. "We went to Zbanzy, Poland, where we met my father who had already been sent there. My sister was engaged to a local Jewish boy and they decided to try for Switzerland. The Swiss refused them entry so they went to Belgium, where they married and had a son. After the war I learned that my sister, her husband and son all perished in Auschwitz, as did my parents.

"Virtually everything we had taken with us from Berlin was stolen by the Germans. We arrived in Poland with little more than the clothes we were wearing. My mother left me with an aunt who lived is a very small village, while they went to Krakow and tried to get established. Shortly thereafter we got a letter saying that I had been granted permission to enter either England or Palestine, and that a passport was coming. So I went to live with my cousins in Krakow to await the passport."

On September 1, 1939, Germany invaded Poland and the killing and persecution of the Jews began. Alex's dream of going to England or Palestine died.

"We were living in Chrzanow, not far from Krakow and near the German border. In fact, this part of Poland was incorporated into Germany immediately after the invasion. So we were once again living under German law. It was difficult living there. My father worked making uniforms for the Germans and was forced to live at the factory — slave labor.

"One day, I remember it like today, we were all made to come to the town square to witness the hanging of six Jews. I never did learn why they were hung, they just were." Alex recalled.

In 1941, Alex was sent to the Bobrek Work Camp, a subcamp of Auschwitz, the first of seven camps that he would be assigned to. He worked six days a week, digging ditches for the future factory. On Sundays, he was allowed to go home.

In 1942, he was sent to Blechhammer, a newly established camp near Kozle, Poland. Some 350 prisoners were building a synthetic gasoline plant. Alex's job was wheelbarrowing cement.

"At Blechhammer, the prisoners were run by an Austrian Jew. When I arrived, he said that he was going to put me on a labor detail. It is only by luck that I survived.

"In these camps, you are a number, not a person. Any soldier could take your life for any reason without consequence. I remember one morning, around 3 a.m., in the winter we were all forced to roll call to watch a prisoner being beaten for stealing a potato. In many ways it was bad, but not as bad as some of the camps that I ended in, because Blechhammer was guarded by regular soldiers, not the SS.

"The luck that let me survive came in the form of the camp kitchen chef, a Jew from Chrzanow who took a liking to me and told me to come twice a day for food. Even when the local Kapo (Jewish police) tried to stop me, the chef protected me.

"Probably the worst experience I had was at the Graedite camp. While there, an epidemic of typhus broke out. The quards, afraid of contacting the

disease, just closed the camp, in effect locking us inside. We lived or died on our own. My bunk was next to a broken window; it was snowing, it was cold. Eventually, the disease ran its course. Many had died. At that point, the guards came back into the camp and held a roll call of the survivors. They did not, however, come into the barracks. I just knew they intended to transport the survivors to another camp, so I hid out in the barrack. Eventually, I had to come out and was transferred, but I had survived a little longer!"

The last camp Alex was sent to was Langenbielau, near the Gross Rosen extermination camp.

"Initially, I was assigned to work in the kitchen, which usually got you more food. However, one day the SS Commander was inspecting the kitchen, saw me and decided I was too healthy to be working in the kitchen so he assigned me to a detail constructing buildings. A lot harder work, a lot less food.

"The Jewish leader of the camp said to me, 'If you help yourself, I'll help you.' I thought about that and when a good time

came, I pretended to faint. They put me back in the kitchen peeling potatoes. I survived, but there were so many instances of unbelievable, sadistic cruelty."

How Can I Forget the Kapos, Their Whips, **Broken Bones and Spirits**

"One temporary holding camp I was in was run by a particularly sadistic SS Totenkopf (Death Head) commander. He caught a prisoner stealing some beets so he had him buried up to his head, placed a bowl of soup near him and left him to die.

"Some of the Kapos were very brutal, also. At one camp, there was a Dutch prisoner who played the violin. He was very good and the music was soothing. Like all of us, he was under

> fed, so when the Kapos 'rewarded' him by giving him a very large bowl of spinach soup, he immediately ate it all. Spinach is a diuretic; the large bowl caused dysentery and he died soon after. The Kapos thought that was funny."

> Despite the cruelty, there were very few moments of charity, Alex recalled. One day, while working outside the camp, Alex said one of the guards went into the nearby town and brought them a large pot of soup. They had to eat it on site and couldn't bring any back to the camp.

"He probably didn't want his officers to know, but we didn't care. It was food. Our normal ration was a small piece of bread, black coffee and weak soup."

"In late spring 1945, we started hearing the booms of the Russian artillery. We didn't know it then, but the war was nearly over. The Germans

started force-marching prisoners to camps deeper into Germany, but Baruch Meister, the Jewish leader of the prisoners in my camp, was able to convince the SS Commandant that they could move faster without us. I awoke in the morning to find the gates open, the camp guiet. Several hours later, the Russian Army arrived. For the most part, they ignored us. After searching the camp to make sure that there were no Germans there, they left continuing their drive to Berlin. They did leave a small detachment with us and they went into the nearest town and got food and clothing for us. Other-

would do nothing for us."

When the war ended, Europe was a disorganized mess. Alexander, now 21, went to the nearest big non-German city, which was Prague. There he located the Belgium Embassy and pleaded his case for transport to Belgium, hoping, once he got there to find his sister and her family. But he was told they

wise, we would have starved as the local German civilians

couldn't help him until all Belgium citizens were relocated. So, he made his way back to Germany, hitching a ride to Berlin on a Soviet truck.

"In Berlin, I went to a house that I had lived in and there saw a posting from an old friend, Heinz Linke. Heinz was a tall, blue-eyed blond — what the Nazis considered a typical Aryan, so he and his mother were able to survive the war in Berlin. They were alive and living nearby. I made my way there and knocked on the door. His mother opened the door, saw me and nearly fainted. I now had a place to stay and a connection to my past.

"In addition to Heinz and his mother, there was a young girl there. She was maybe 13. Her name was Lieselotte Lilo and she had been adopted by the Linkes."

Months later, Alex left for Arnstadt, where he ended up in a deserted home in the Russian zone that had belonged to a German General. Along the way, he joined up with three Polish girls and their brother who had survived the camps.

"We went to Furth near Nurenberg. We didn't like the Displaced Persons camp there so I went to the local town mayor, identified us as German citizens and claimed our right to confiscated housing that had belonged to Nazi party members. We got one and moved in. Weeks later, there was a knock on the door and I opened it to see my cousin Joseph Hoffman, who lived in Russia. Another connection to my past," Alex said.

Post-war Europe was still chaotic. It was difficult to earn a living and Alex had no skills or training. Few countries would accept him. The U.S. had strict requirements, among them a person needed a skill (trade) and a sponsor.

For Alex, those requirements were filled by ORT a non-profit international Jewish organization. Once trained as a welder and sponsored by the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee, Alex came to America. He arrived in New York on December 17, 1949. But he didn't like New York nor his job making ladies purses, so he went to night school and took classes in English, writing and American history. Still not satisfied, he moved to Los Angeles, where a cousin lived.

He landed a job working in the dining room of the Beverly Hills Hotel. "It was a good experience, and I met a lot of people."

"Later, my cousin from Argentina came to New York, so I decided to fly there to see her. My friend from Berlin, Heinz and his family were there also, so it was a good time to see family and friends. While there, Heinz asked me if I wanted to date Lilo, who was by now a young lady. We did go out a few times, but I had to return to L.A. and I thought, 'that's it,' but I did continue writing to her. A few months later, Heinz came to L.A. on his honeymoon and later invited Lilo to come to L.A. To shorten the story, we were married in June 1955, and in that same year I became a proud American citizen."

Alex's job career then bounced around a bit. Lilo was a cosmetologist and Alex tried that, but didn't like it. He eventually went into the restaurant business opening three Mexican restaurants. When the time came to sell those businesses, he became a licensed real estate agent (and later a broker), work-

ing in new home sales until his retirement. He and Lilo moved to Sun City in 1996.

For the past 22 years, Alex has been a lecturer on the Holocaust at high schools, colleges and Army recruitment centers. This past May, Alex and Lilo joined 19 other Las Vegas-area Holocaust survivors in receiving an honorary Doctorate of Humane Letters degree from Touro University.

Alex, who just turned 95, and Lilo have been married for 64 years and have two sons.

LEO VANDON

rowing up during the depression-era 1930s was difficult for most people, but for some it was a prelude to disaster. Take the case of thenfuture Sun City resident Leo Vandon.

"I was born in 1929 in the city of Alkmaar, the Netherlands. It was a difficult time for many, but more so for the Germans who had suffered a major loss in World War I. Unemployment, hun-



ger and homelessness were rampant. Adolf Hitler rose through the political ranks due to his mesmerizing speeches. He gave hope to the suffering population. In just a few years most everyone in Germany had a job. The depression was over and Hitler was a hero.

"When I was about 8 years old, I started listening to his speeches. My dad, Evert, tuned into a special station as he was taken in by the promise of a better future for everyone. On Sundays, my sister Truus and I went to the movies and watched German propaganda. I clearly remember Hitler's speech to 30,000 boys and girls of the Hitler Youth. The spectacle was a powerful, convincing demonstration of German power," Leo recalled.

Germany tried to get the Dutch to join the growing empire. The Netherlands was neutral in WWI and planned to remain so. Nevertheless, despite having ignored the military for years the government called up an army of 100,000 men who were given minimal training. On May 10, 1940, Germany invaded. For six days, the Dutch army held the Germans at bay; then Germany upped the ante and bombed Rotterdam, completely destroying the city. The royal family, along with the country's gold and money, had already fled to England. The Netherlands surrendered. German occupation was swift and complete.

"As a kid, I was impressed with the young German soldiers marching though our streets singing their hearts out, wearing perfect uniforms and polished boots. I still remember the 'click-clack' of the boots in perfect harmony with the marching songs. But, I was too young to understand the implications of the occupation.

"The Germans quickly imposed rationing of all essentials:

food, gasoline and coal. One day, I struck up a conversation with a young soldier standing guard at a facility near home. He seemed like a nice enough chap. I spoke a little German. I offered to polish his boots for a loaf of bread. Soon, I was polishing boots for other soldiers in exchange for bread. My mother, Nella, was quite happy to have the extra food, but warned me not to tell my father as he was very anti-Nazi at this point. Unfortunately, he did find out and my business died," Leo said.

"Later, I found a new way to help the family. We lived near a storage area for coal that was used to run the locomotives. At night, I would go by there and take one large piece of coal and put it in my backpack. It was a dangerous thing to do; if caught by the police, especially the German Gestapo, I would have been in serious trouble. Eventually, I was stopped by a Dutch policeman. I was really scared, but all he did was take me home and explain to my dad that he understood the tough heating situation, had a cup of coffee and returned to his patrol."

As early as 1941, the Dutch began protesting the forced removal of Jews. In February, the Dutch Communist Party called for a general strike in response to the Nazi raid on Amsterdam's Jewish population. Identifying Jews in Holland was made easy by the Dutch government's census, which required everyone to identify with a religion. Protests aside, the Germans began the systematic removal of Jews and Romanis.

"My father was the manager of a group responsible for maintaining the 10 locomotives at the Alkmaar railroad station. On May 16, 1944, the Gestapo ordered him to ready the trains for the transport of 600 Jews to the concentration camps. With the help of the Resistance, of which he was a member, he called a meeting of his employees and they decided to strike. Of course, we all instantly became enemies of the state. The Resistance did an incred-

ible job of finding hiding places for all the strikers and their families. In addition, they hid some 25,000 Jews, at least 17,000 of whom survived the war.

"My father and I were actively participating in the Resistance at this point. I had several duties, including delivering newspapers and food to people in hiding. As a kid, I was able to move about more freely as adults were subject to being deported to Germany as factory workers. My most dangerous assignment was to watch for supplies being dropped by the Allies and, when the parachutes landed in trees, to climb the trees and cut the supplies free — often while the Germans were shooting at me. This was always done at night. There were many other acts of resistance that my family participated in, including the building of radios tuned to Radio Orange, the free-Dutch station in England and the printing of newspapers," Leo recalled.

After the successful D-Day invasion, allied troops moved steadily toward Holland. In mid-September 1944, U.S. and British troops successfully liberated parts of Holland during Operation Market Garden, often fighting with the aid of Dutch Resistance members. The remainder of Holland was not freed until the German surrender in May. The interim period, named the Hunger Winter, was very difficult for the Dutch since the Germans cut off all food supplies.

"With the war over, we quickly tried to return to a normal life. The Germans had destroyed our home, but the Dutch government built a new one for us and even furnished it!" Leo said. "My father went back to work at the railroad yard and I returned to school, joining special night classes held to help us catch up with our education. After graduation, I found work as an electronic technician, attended night college classes and qualified as an electrical engineer. Along the way, I married Gerda; we had two children. I went to work for the Orange Line, a Dutch

merchant marine operator, as a ship's radio officer.

"In October 1954, I had a most exciting voyage on board the Prins Willem V. We were on a routine voyage on Lake Michigan, having just left Milwaukee. At 7:15 that night, in heavy chop and 23 mph winds, we collided with a towed oil barge. A 12-by-8-foot section of the ship was torn open. We started sinking quickly. As radio officer, I ran to the radio room to issue a mayday call as the rest of the crew began evacuating into our life boats. Only the Captain and I were still on board when the U.S. Coast Guard arrived in the Coast Guard tender Hollyhock and two boats from life-saving station McKinley Beach. The Captain and I were taken to safety onboard the small boats. Ironically, the Prins Willem V had sunk once before. While under construc-

tion during World War II, the Germans scuttled her to block the entrance to Rotterdam harbor as they retreated from Holland.

"In 1960, while employed by Fairchild, I was transferred to Sunnyvale, Calif., on a two-year assignment. It didn't take long for the family to become accustomed to the beautiful country and warm weather. We stayed, became American citizens and started a new life. When it came time to retire, we purchased a new home in Sun City; we were among the original residents. But it was a little too soon to fully retire. I qualified for a real estate license and went to work for a broker contracted with Del Webb and began selling Sun City.

"We are so happy to be living here to enjoy life as proud American citizens able to speak and write freely," Leo said.










Palm Valley Closures

One car can have up to six drivers in a 24-hour period. Sometimes personal stuff inadvertently gets left behind. Many a grateful driver has been reunited with his/her house keys.

Donna and Ron have volunteered for this job for six years. "In addition to cleaning the cars, I do the laundry," she chuckled. "I take the cleaning cloths home, wash and dry them and Ron folds them and gets them ready for the next week." While detailing the steering wheel, Donna asked, "How are you going to make this job sound exciting?"

Perhaps the job isn't exciting, but it is admirable! These volunteers donate their valuable time in addition to their Security Patrol commitment so that each shift driver has a clean and safe car to work in, and the neighbors see a well-groomed vehicle coming to their assistance. Smoke Alarm Replacement Program Kicks Off July 25

id you know that the smoke alarms in your home may no longer function correctly if they are older than 10 years? Most people don't realize this and could be in danger of not being alerted to a fire in their own homes. The United States Fire Administration (USFA) publishes data about fires each year, and there are an average of 3,000 fire deaths in this country every year. It's also important to know that about 87 percent of those fire deaths happen in the home rather than a commercial establishment, and half of home fire deaths happen at night when most people are asleep. That's why national fire codes now require that every bedroom needs a working smoke alarm.

Because Sun City's Neighborhood Preparedness Team (NPT) and your Las Vegas Fire & Rescue first-responders want you to be safe for many years to come, they have joined forces to sponsor a community-wide campaign to help replace your smoke alarms and save you money at the same time! According to Barbara Holden, Neighborhood Preparedness Team Leader, "This ambitious project will replace expired, hardwired smoke alarms and add 10-year sealed, battery-powered smoke alarms where they are needed in Sun City property owners' homes. Residents may be unaware that their smoke alarms have expired, and occupants may be unprotected."

Because battery-powered alarms alone do not meet the current national building codes, licensed and certified electrical contractors will assist with the installations, free of charge to the homeowner. The price of purchasing up to four replacement alarms, including one hardwired ionization combination smoke/ carbon

Las Vegas Fire & Rescue authorities, licensed professional installers, Sun City Charities' volunteers and Neighborhood Preparedness Team members have volunteered their time for this massive home safety project.

The purpose of the town hall meeting on **Thursday**, **July 25**, **7 p.m.**, at Desert Vista, will be to allow Las Vegas Fire & Rescue professionals and NPT team leaders to share the details of the smoke alarm replacement project, as well as some vital life safety information. This project is focused on a concern for resident safety, and provides a convenient and expeditious way to bring homes up to the fire code minimum standards.

monoxide alarm is \$100. This is a savings of over \$200 when compared to buying retail alarms and hiring a licensed electrician.

At the meeting, Fire Department professionals will educate and register the first 50 residents who sign up for the blitz day event scheduled for August. To secure your place in line for the first installations, participants will be asked to complete installation information and provide their payment check in the amount of \$100. The total capacity for RSVPs for the July 25 event is 125 residents.

"From an accountability viewpoint, it is a terrific bargain, an opportunity that no resident could match if they attempt to individually accomplish the protection that this community-wide project is going to afford them," Barbara said.



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UH OH, LOOKS LIKE a CENTURY PLANT IS READY TO BLOOM By Ellen Greenspan/Link

he Agave Americana, more commonly called a century plant is monocarpic, meaning it will flower only once, at the very end of its life. The life-ending bloom may not appear for up to 30 years, depending on climate. It grows slowly before suddenly sprouting a tall stalk and lastly, spectacular yellow flowers that signal the end of the plant's life cycle. The granddaddy of all agaves, a century plant's ornate base has a spread of 6- to10-feet-long grey-green spiked leaves. After the flowers fade and the mother plant turns black and dies, the tree-sized plant, often towering as high as 20 feet, requires the use of a chainsaw to cut it down.

There is eager rebirth news, though. The majestic century plant "pups" freely, its roots asexually forming multiple offshoots around the base of the mother plant. And from each of those baby agave pups another 30-year life cycle begins. Why the century plant grows, flowers and dies when it does is just another of nature's many mysteries.

The blue agave century plant is native to Northern Mexico and the Southern United States. A sweet liquid gathers in the stalk of a blue agave that can be fermented to produce Mezcal or Tequila.

At Barbara and Bill Holden's Blue Bell Drive home in Sun City, a blue agave century plant grew a colossal stalk in their yard. Exceeding 20 feet in height, it rose above their roof line, attracting curious admirers who never had seen such a strangely gigantic plant. Agave Americana is most common in the Southwest.

"I'm a retired science teacher," said Bill Holden. "I've always enjoyed working around plants, and I have a full agave garden in our backyard."

Bill was surprised to wake up one morning to see that the blue agave had developed a stalk, already having grown 3 feet high overnight. Since the Holden's are from Iowa, they had never before met a century plant. The next oldest century plant in the Holden's yard is estimated to be 7 years old. Bill predicts it will bloom around 2042.

Bill has been potting and giving away the agave pups. He has six agaves left for anyone interested in planting their own century plant.

"Contact us or stop by for one," he said. Young blue agaves should be planted in an open area distanced from a walkway. The plant will become widespread and its spiked leaves can deeply pierce bystanders.

In Sun City, the local theory is that 30 years ago, while initially landscaping Sun City Summerlin, the community developers and early home buyers planted Agave Americana century plants. The agaves have now reached the end of their life cycles, finally blooming throughout the community in recent years. What a wonderful way to commemorate the 30th anniversary of our community, courtesy of Mother Nature and perhaps some pretty savvy gardners.

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Pinnacle Outfield Turf to Get an Upgrade



he Common Area Properties Committee voted to recommend one agenda item from its June meeting to Sun City's Board of Directors. If passed by the Board, the project should begin this month.

The agenda item, brought to CAP by members of the Men's Softball Club, also was vetted by the Finance Committee, with a recommendation to the Board of Directors.

CAP volunteers were asked to review a revised plan to rehabilitate rather than completely replant the outfield turf at the Pinnacle softball field. The plan also included rehabbing irrigation

lines and sprinkler heads if needed. In addition, the plan seeks to add 10 feet of grass on the foul lines at first and third bases.

"We've got the best field in Las Vegas and probably west of the Mississippi in

the infield," said Fred Baniecki, who heads up all facilities projects for the Club regarding the softball field. "But the outfield is not there. We're using 1960s technology in the outfield vs. 2019 technology (in the infield)."

SCSCAI's Landscape Director, Louis Darling, explained that he included replacing the outfield turf in his 2018/2019 budget at a cost of \$55,000. However, when the sealed bids came back to him, the quotes exceeded the project cap by \$25,000 on the low end, \$76,659 on the high end.

After some discussion and questions posed by CAP volunteers to Louis and Ted Biedryck, Softball Club Vice President, CAP Chairman Bruce Alitt crafted a motion that supported the Finance Committee's earlier recommendation to take the project in-house. Bruce's motion, which was passed unanimously by CAP members, stated, "With the Softball Club in agreement and the Finance Committee in agreement, CAP supports the Finance Committee's recommendation to renovate the softball field's outfield, including adding 10 feet of grass on either side of the foul lines in-house." Turning the work over the Sun City's Landscape Department caps the costs well under the originally budgeted amount, and sets a timeline to close the field for two months, Louis said.

Closing the field in July and August coincides with the Club's summer hiatus, and is just perfect, Fred said.

COMMUNITY WALLS

Responding to a question about shabby looking exterior walls, Bruce announced that CAP would establish a new inspection committee to keep track of neighborhood walls in need of repair. After compiling a list, the committee would decide on what action to take.

The Latest Rumor:

The Board of Directors of Sun City Summerlin along with the Golf Oversight Committee and Golf staff have decided to stop over-seeding the Palm Valley Golf Course Fairways to save money by reducing the need for water, maintenance and seed.

Following are the "facts" behind this "news" being spread through our wonderful community.

Palm Valley Golf Course is presently undergoing a complete replacement of the underground irrigation system as well as a rejuvenation of the Bermuda grass on the Fairways. Both of these projects are necessary in order to repair problems that have attributed to the decline in the Bermuda grass and to promote the health of the Bermuda grass in the future.

While those spreading rumors about the fact that we are presently not overseeding the golf course would have you believe the decision was made without evaluation or thought, the reasons are pretty basic and I would like to share them with you.

Bermuda grass is the permanent grass on the fairways at Palm Valley Golf Course. It creates the base not only for the playing areas but for overseed. Bermuda grass does go dormant in the winter months, but it is not dead, the roots actively hold the grass in place and the grass turns green again as soon as the weather starts to warm up. This is a species of grass that when healthy sends out runners and fills in bare areas. The health of this grass is very important as it creates the base and playing field year round. When the health is compromised by winter overseeding the grass is choked out by the stronger winter Ryegrass seed leaving bare dirt.

<u>Winter "Ryegrass"</u> is perennial or temporary grass. It only lasts during the winter or cooler months and has to be seeded annually. It is a hardy grass but dies out as soon as temperatures get warm. This is a single blade grass, does

not send out runners and must be heavily planted each year by seeding. This hearty grass tries to hang on as long as possible, and if not sprayed out by chemicals will continue to take the nutrients and water from the Bermuda grass into the warmer months, creating competition for the growing space. The end result is bare areas once the Ryegrass completely dies out.

Rejuvenation of Palm Valley Golf Course Fairways -

Like any rejuvenation project things need to be done in a certain order to obtain the desired result and spend the least amount of money. While we understand that golfers prefer to have green fairways, we also know that spending money to overseed and water while we are replacing the irrigation system and putting down new sod makes no sense at all. It is a waste of your money and none of us who are tasked with overseeing how the Association funds are spent could justify spending money to overseed areas where the Ryegrass has choked out the Bermuda grass leaving large bare spots of dirt or where the irrigation is going to be shut off, dug up and replaced. There was a lot of discussion a couple of years ago about the best way to proceed. The decision was made to replace the irrigation system over a two year period of time and at the same time rest the existing Bermuda grass to restore its health. In addition sod would be added to the larger bare spots to speed up the recovery time. It was estimated that a 24 to 36 month period of time would be needed for the new sod to attach and fill in, and since Ryegrass is a strong grass and is known to choke out Bermuda grass, the fairways, including the newly sodded areas at Palm Valley Golf Course would not be overseeded during this project and would be allowed to strengthen.

Sometimes a Plan takes Time: All that that the Board of Directors, the Golf Oversight Committee and the Golf staff has asked is that those who golf take the time to understand we need their cooperation and support as we answer their requests to improve the fairways at Palm Valley. To that end I am sharing the following points.

Just replacing the irrigation system will not undo the bare spots created by years of overseed.

Overseeding will not cover the bare spots and even if it did it would only be in the winter months. Rye grass seed needs a base in order to grow, to be protected, receive nourishment and root. It is a single blade grass and if it does not have a Bermuda grass base as soon as it is mowed it will be pulled up by the root.

While dormant fairways can provide firm conditions and an excellent playing surface, it is a pale straw color. Some golfers find the pale yellow appearance aesthetically unpleasing or do not like the extra roll the ball has on a firmer surface, others find the change in the course from winter to summer challenging and an opportunity to improve their skill as a golfer. The bottom line is overseeding is not required to play the game of golf, and that is why more and more you see courses skipping overseed (just watch the Golf Channel and you will see what I am saying is true).

In 2018 we did the irrigation on the front nine and put sod down in many areas to improve the turf base. This sod needs to grow in and root for about 12 more months (a full season) before we even consider overseeding it.

In 2019 we will do the irrigation on the back nine and put sod down in many areas to improve the turf base. This sod will need to grow in and root for about 16 months (a full season) before we even consider overseeding it.

In 2019 we are already starting to see some of the benefits on the front 9.

In 2020 we should see the full benefits of the front 9 and start to see the benefits on the back 9.

In 2021 we should see the full benefits on the back 9.

In 2022 - To seed or not to seed, that is the question. When it is cold in other places in the country, we have almost perfect weather to play outdoor sports. When it comes to golf our green grass goes dormant during the winter and many people want it to be green not yellow. Following are some of the reasons Country Clubs, Private Courses and Associations have chosen to overseed or not to overseed their Fairways in the winter.

Overseeded courses are prettier.

Overseeded courses have thicker turf in the winter and allow the ball to land and not roll.

In the Fall courses are wet and soft for weeks and carts are restricted to paths as the overseed establishes.

Courses that do not overseed fairways can offer year round golf with limited cart restrictions.

Courses that are overseeded have increased weed issues.

In the spring or early summer the fairway playing conditions can be very inconsistent as the Bermuda grass

struggles to recover from the overseeding process.

What happens in 2022? In 2022 we will host a Town Hall to get feedback from the golfers on the conditions of Palm Valley and the future of overseed. Presently while the Board has heard proposals regarding water conservation and year round play by eliminating overseed the Board has not considered or voted on a plan to stop overseeding and has stated several times that the current plan is to stop overseeding while the Palm Valley Course is rejuvenated. The rumor that the decision to quit overseeding has been made is FALSE!.

It will be interesting to follow this project for the next 4 years as we rejuvenate the fairways at Palm Valley. The one thing I can say for sure from experience is if we do not do this rejuvenation project correctly and give the turf the opportunity to heal and root, we will have wasted the millions spent on the irrigation system and turf.

Except for the time the front nine is closed for the irrigation repairs the entire course will be open and playable, so this project has no negative impact on the ability to play the course, it all comes down to the personal preference of the golfer.

We hope each golfer will support this project, because in reality it addresses the turf concerns so many of the golfers expressed. This is truly a "you cannot have your cake and eat it too" situation. We cannot fix the golfers concerns and overseed the course at the same time.

In the end, all of the decision makers want to do what is right for the golf community and at the same time what is fiscally responsible as they spend the homeowner's money. We are lucky to have two other golf courses available for those who do not like to play a course that does not overseed the fairways, this allows us to take the time needed to do this project correctly.

I hope you will join me in supporting the Board of Directors, the Golf Oversight Committee and the Golf staff as they proceed with this project and please share your opinion with me after you golf Palm Valley Golf Course, that way in 2022 the Board can make a decision based on homeowner feedback of what has actually transpired and not speculation of what might happen. As always your opinion is important and staff is here to support what is best for the community.



Membership Meeting for Ratification

The Membership Meeting for Ratification of the 2019/2020 Budget for Sun City Summerlin Community Association, Inc., was held on Tuesday, June 11, 2019, at 9 a.m. at the Desert Vista Community Center. Of the 7,781 homes in Sun City, 246 homes were represented either in person or by proxy. Homeowners present were given an opportunity to express their opinions prior to the vote. Per Nevada State Law; 3,891 votes in opposition to the ratification of the budget were required in order for the ratification to fail. 202 votes were cast against the motion to ratify the budget. The Ratification of the 2019/2020 Board of Directors approval of the Budget passed, and is effective July 1, 2019. It is noted that while the 2019/2020 Budget starts on July 1 (fiscal year) the change (raise) in dues for each homeowner is effective the first day of the month following the closing of the first sale of your home (the date Del Webb closed on the sale of your home to the first homeowner). Assessments are due in one lump sum annually of the first day of the month as indicated above, unless you are signed up for ACH payments through the Sun City Summerlin Community Association, Inc., Accounting Department. If you are signed up, 1/12 of the total assessment will be withdrawn from the bank account you have provided each month.

Meeting of the Board of Directors: June 11, 2019

- 1. The Board of Directors unanimously approved a motion to accept the June 11, 2019, Board of Directors agenda as presented.
- 2. The Board of Directors approved a motion to accept the minutes of May 14, 2019, as amended, with eight members voting in favor and one abstention, Mr. Dick Clark. Mr. Clark abstained because he was not in attendance at the May 14, 2019, Board of Directors' meeting.
- 3. The Board of Directors unanimously approved a motion to accept the bid from Superior Courts for replacement windscreens for designated tennis courts and Pickleball courts at Desert Vista and Pinnacle in the amount of \$6,565, with the addition to the contract that the final payment will be held until all items noted in the final walkthrough are completed.
- 4. The Board of Directors unanimously approved a motion to accept the bid of Floor Works in the amount of \$52,650 to replace the existing flooring in the Pinnacle multi-purpose room as recommended by the Finance Committee and Common Area Properties Committee.
- 5. The Board of Directors unanimously approved a motion to accept the recommendation of Pam Shields, SCSCAI Director of Fitness, to purchase 11 pieces of replacement cardio equipment from Opti–Fit, Equip Fitness and The Dumbell Man for all fitness center locations, and approved the addition of \$2,951.95 to the already approved amount of \$47,000, bringing the total to \$49,951.95.
- 6. The Board of Directors unanimously approved a motion to accept to restore 10 feet of grass along the foul lines of the Pinnacle ballfield outfield and have SCSCAI's in-house maintenance crew top dress the entire outfield with sand, then water and roll out the outfield to even it out and fill in any holes.
- 7. The Board of Directors unanimously approved a motion to acknowledge they have fulfilled their duty as a Board in reviewing the April financial documents in accordance with NRS 116.31083(6), and stated for the record the Association is in compliance with Paragraph (b) of the sub-section 2 of NRS 116.3115 and reserve funds have not been used for daily maintenance.
- 8. The Board of Directors unanimously approved a motion to accept the recommendation of the Legal Services Committee to remove paragraph 9.11 Neighborhood Watch/Community Preparedness Committee from Sun City Summerlin Community Association Bylaws. Neighborhood Watch/Community Preparedness Committee has

- been changed to Neighborhood Preparedness Team (NPT) Organization and will no longer be a standing Board Committee, but will be an Organization that is open to the residents of Sun City per their charter. Changes to the Bylaws require a vote of homeowners and this recommendation will be held for a vote the next time we have a ballot issue.
- 9. The Board of Directors unanimously approved the motion to accept the unaudited financial statement for the period ending March 2019. It was noted that this item was held over from the previous month to give the Board members an opportunity to review the bank reconciliations.
- 10. The Board of Directors unanimously approved a motion to accept the recommendation of the Finance Committee that the Board of Directors consider the following options prior to issuing requests for proposals on all construction contracts with an estimated cost exceeding \$100,000; or for projects under \$100,000 in which there could be a completion concern.
 - A. Require a 100 percent performance and payment bond.
 - B. Require a letter form the contractor's surety agent, confirming the contractor's ability to provide performance and payment bond for the project, known as a "Good Guy Letter."
- 11. The Board of Directors unanimously approved a motion to ratify an insurance settlement agreement in the amount of \$2,000, involving Ditech Financial LLC and the foreclosure of 2537 Cog Hill Lane.
- 12. The Board of Directors unanimously approved a motion to ratify the emergency replacement of the Desert Vista Fire Alarm System in the amount of \$66,975.
- 13. The Board of Directors unanimously approved a motion to ratify emergency roof repairs at Desert Vista in the amount of \$9,930.
- 14. The Board of Directors unanimously approved as recommended by the Golf Oversight Committee and the Finance Committee a motion to contract with Bogey Golf Ball Retrieval. Per the terms of the contract, Bogey Golf Ball Retrieval will dive for, clean and deliver all range golf balls from the golf course lakes to Sun City Summerlin Community Association, and will pay .10 cents per ball to Sun City Summerlin Community Association for all non-range golf galls retrieved and retained. The Board of Directors asked the Executive Director to review the contract and make any necessary corrections or additions prior to having it signed by the Board President.
- 15. The Board of Directors unanimously approved a motion to accept



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
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
