President PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

e are so very lucky to live in what I am sure is one of the premier homeowner association (HOA) communities in the entire USA. Of course, we have great facilities and reasonable assessments, but what really makes our community great is the people who live here. You and your neighbors who keep their homes looking great; you and your neighbors who join our committees like Link, Finance or our Security Patrol; and you and your neighbors who help each other with moving trash cans and picking up newspapers when you are on vacation and so on. Keep it up.

For whatever reason, when Del Webb incorporated SCSCAI, it set up 39 separate sub-associations made up of various numbers of attached homes, each a separate corporation – a separate HOA. As a general statement, the "subs" are responsible for the exterior of the houses, including the outside walls, yards, roofs. If you live in a sub-association, you belong to the "master," SCSCAI, as well as the sub. Get involved in your sub-association. They also need talented people to keep things running well. Each of the sub-associations must have a Board of Directors, reserves, a budget, member meetings, assessments, insurance and so on.

Each month I spotlight one of our standing committees and this month I have some thoughts to share about our Finance Committee. Sometimes we forget what a large organization we are and what resources we collectively own. We are, in effect, a small city with an annual budget of about \$15 million that must be prepared and monitored. We need to decide how to invest our reserve fund of \$12.5 million, and we are required to have insurance for our facilities (worth about \$47 million) for damage and for liability purposes. The Finance Committee is the focal point for those activities and is responsible for making recommendations about SCSCAI finance matters, including investments, insurance, the budget, auditing and so on. The Committee is chaired by Board member Gerry Sokolski and presided over by an incredibly talented group of committee members, many (I think four at last count) who are certified public accountants (CPAs). We can all rest easy knowing that we have such a great group looking after our finances. Thanks to all the Finance Committee mem-

bers for all their hard work on the behalf of our SCSCAI residents. A great group of people who volunteer their time and talent to help keep us fiscally sound.

As a final note, all our residents are, in effect, members of a committee, the SCSCAI Residents Committee. Your job: If you see something, say something. See a leaking faucet, a tree branch that obscures a stop sign, a yard in disrepair, someone walking on the golf course (non-golfer, of course) – say something. On Page 6 of every Link is a list of Board members, with their contact information, as well as the Executive Director and her contact information, plus the telephone numbers of our facilities. Let us know if something needs attention. We can't fix it if we don't know about it.

Everyone Plays a Part In Pool Hygiene

long with the warmer weather, pool season is upon us! We've got three beautiful outdoor pools (and two indoor) in Sun City Summerlin ready for you to water-walk, swim, or just relax on the deck. Swimming and other pool activities are excellent forms of exercise that are low-impact, provide cardiovascular and strength benefits, and can be enjoyed by people of all fitness levels. With swimming being one of the most fun and popular activities in our community, it is important that we are aware of the responsibility we each have to exercise good pool hygiene.

Ultimately maintaining a healthy pool environment is a team effort, involving our Maintenance and Fitness departments keeping the pool environment safe and clean, and our pool users exercising good pool hygiene. We'll look at some things we can all do to ensure we have a healthy, happy pool season!

All of our pools are approved by the Southern Nevada Health District (SNHD) to be open to the public. Our permits are renewed annually according to a schedule established by SNHD.

In order to maximize germ-killing power, the SNHD sets required levels of disinfectants and pH. It is required that our

pools maintain a minimum free available chlorine (FAC) level at all times of 1.0 ppm (parts per million). Hot tubs/spas are required to have a minimum FAC level of 3.0 ppm at all times. Maximum FAC concentration shall not exceed 10.0

ppm. Chemical levels are tested daily and average between 3.0-5.0 ppm, well within the required levels. Our chemical testing logs can be accessed by visiting the Maintenance Department.

Chlorine in swimming pools kills germs that can cause recreational water illnesses (RWIs), which can make people sick, but it does take time. In a properly disinfected pool, most RWI-causing germs are killed in less than an hour. In the event of a fecal incident in the pool, the pool is shut down for 24 hours and raised to the maximum chlorine level of 5.0 ppm. This process appropriately disinfects the

- Shower with soap and water prior to entering the pool. You must take your shower at the pool (not at home) to ensure you are removing all possible contaminants.
- ◆ ALWAYS get out of the pool for restroom needs. Do not enter the pool if you currently have or have recently had diarrhea.
- Wear a swimsuit/swimwear. Wearing shorts, shirts, or other clothing can introduce dyes, germs, bacteria, etc.
- ◆ Do not swim while sick or with open wounds. Entering the pool with bandages is not allowed. This keeps bacteria from entering your wound, as well as keeping bacteria from your wound entering the pool.
- Never swallow the pool water.
- ◆ Stay hydrated while at the pool.
- Shower after swimming.
- ◆ HAVE FUN!!!

The Neighborhood Preparedness Team will meet at 9 a.m. on Wednesday, June 19, in the Committee Room at Desert Vista. Meetings are open to all residents.

Community Leaders Saluted at Events

n April, Neighborhood Watch block captains were praised at two events sponsored by the Neighborhood Preparedness Team (NPT). The learning sessions were introduced by Barbara Holden of NPT's leadership team and Security Patrol Chief Sandy Lyons. According to a crime analysis compiled by the Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department (LVMPD), Neighborhood Watch Block Captain and Security Patrol driver Allyn Ayotte, Sun City continues to achieve the lowest percentage of crime-related incidents in Las Vegas. Metro gives credit for that achievement to Sun City's volunteer Security Patrol, with support from Neighborhood Watch volunteers. According to Metro's Crime Prevention specialist Randy Klenosky, volunteers who serve Security Patrol and Neighborhood Watch significantly contribute to the community's safe environment.

NPT board member Bill Holden provided information about crime alert tools available to Neighborhood Watch groups, including Alertnest, a recording system of reporting Metro crime incidents. LVMPD is previewing the innovative system in Las Vegas before it is applied nationwide.

Block Captain Molly Sher led a discussion offering ideas about working directly with members in Neighborhood Watch, including the use of street-specific gmail addresses for communicating among active Watch volunteers. Currently, 93 block captains oversee 84 streets in Sun City.

NPT leadership member Erik Braun provided an overview of

the sessions, including the package of informational materials prepared for every guest. Erik also introduced Klenosky, who

works closely with the NPT program.

Upon moving to Sun City, Block Captain Jean Heatherly learned that creating a Neighborhood

Watch group was a terrific way to introduce herself to her new neighbors. "I contacted Barbara Holden, who was happy to give me pointers. It really is easy to form a Watch group. I was surprised at how little time and effort it takes," Jean said.

In June, the NPT's monthly newsletter, Neighborhood Watchdog, will cir-

culate to Watch group volunteers and residents who have subscribed to learn about the community crime prevention program. Interested residents may contact neighborhoodwatch-suncity@gmail.com or telephone 702-658-4486.

Neighborhood Watchdog news will analyze crime incidents reported within a 2-mile radius of Sun City. Emphasis will concentrate on home and car burglaries, and thefts.

A sheriff's officer in conversation with a Sun City resident expressed the likelihood that our low crime rate is significantly attributable to educating our residents about local crime information and teaching the worth of home security practices, including the use of outdoor cameras and improved lighting, as well as avoiding the peril of clever telephone scammers.



Phase 2 of Palm Valley Irrigation Project Starts June 3





Summerlin to Get Its Own Police Station

The Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department broke ground on a new sub-station earlier this year and reports the building is scheduled to open in the fall west of Interstate 215 at Far Hills Drive. Construction continues on the Summerlin sub-station. which will be the 10th in the LVMPD's jurisdiction.

According to a recent article in the Las Vegas Review-Journal, land for the sub-station was donated by the Howard Hughes Corporation in 1997. When complete, the Police station is expected to reduce call-response times as the dedicated staff of officers will replace those who currently split their time serving two of Metro's largest areas in the northwest and southwest parts of the valley.





Things to Remember When Discarding Trash

SCSCAI reminds residents when putting out their trash cans for pickup that all containers must be placed with their wheels facing the curb. If more than one can is placed curbside, a space of 2 feet must be left in between the cans. This space allows for ease of operation of the trash truck's automated arm to maneuver around the cans. Bulk trash pickup is scheduled for two days this month, on Tuesdays, June 11 and 25. Bulk items are defined by Republic Services as items that are 6 feet or less in length, items must not have protruding nails, and tree branches must be tied in weights of 50 pounds or less. Bulk trash items need to be left at the curb; mattresses are required to be wrapped in plastic, and all items must be bundled or bagged. No loose trash will be picked up.



Busy Drivers Split Time Between Community Groups

un City Summerlin Security Patrol members volunteer hundreds of hours as the eyes and ears of this community. For 24 hours, seven days a week, on four-hour shifts, volunteers have saved lives, assisted seniors with minor household problems, protected residents' safety by making them aware of their open garage doors, helped find lost spouses, and reunited lost pets with their owners. Countless adult children have expressed gratitude for Security Patrol's diligence in helping them contact their parents.

Some Security Patrol members also volunteer with Sun City Summerlin Charities/Volunteers, driving residents to appointments and fixing minor household problems, and Sunshine Service, which provides medical equipment for short-term needs, as well as necessities for visiting grandchildren.

Jim Edwards, a 12-year volunteer with Security Patrol, joined both the Patrol and Charities within a month of moving to Sun City. "We bought a house but didn't move in until 2007. We received the Link, so we knew what was going on in Sun City," Edwards said. "With Charities, I drove residents to doctor appointments and did minor repairs. There are similarities between Security Patrol and Charities – neighbors helping neighbors."

He continued with a story. "A few years ago I remember that a woman who just moved into Sun City phoned Charities asking for help in putting light bulbs into the fan fixture. When I arrived.

she had everything ready to do the job – light bulbs and step stool. I

looked at the fan and told her that there wasn't a light fixture on the fan. She was upset because she had been told that the house had all the amenities."

Edwards drives the midnight shift for Security Patrol. During his routine patrol between 2 and 3 in the morning, he came upon a large pickup truck parked in the street in front of a residence. "I thought I heard a motor running. I stopped the car, got out and put my hand on the hood.

It was warm to hot and the motor was definitely running. I rang the doorbell and woke up the resident who, at first, didn't believe me about the motor. He came out and heard the sound. He was very thankful and thanked Security Patrol for letting him know."

Michael Pennock, a Security Patrol driver for almost two years, joined Charities six months ago. "I saw my elderly neighbors who needed help with getting to doctor appointments. I thought, I drive for Security Patrol, I can drive someone to their appointment, and I can drive at night for emergencies." Pennock continued: "Sun City is a wonderful place to live. You feel save in your person and home. Security Patrol drivers carry water in the summer for residents who are walking or are in need." Pennock is presently training as a dispatcher and is an information volunteer.

Recently, while on patrol, Pennock came across a resident who flagged him down. "She was very agitated because the garage door wouldn't stay closed," he said. "She had an appointment and was late, and the door wouldn't stay closed. I saw that the electronic eye was loose, so I tightened it and the door stayed down. The woman was very appreciative."

Both men have a history of volunteering before retiring. Edwards was active in fundraising for the Shriner's Burn Institute; Pennock volunteered during the Civil Rights movement and was active in other union and political causes.





ALFRED 'AL' ROWE: HE SURVIVED D-DAY TO SPEND A LIFETIME ON THE RAILROAD

eventy-five years ago this month, the coast of Normandy was witness to the largest invasion in history. War and accompanied invasions were not new to Normandy. The region had been contested for centuries with England and France both claiming ownership. But this was different, the size of the invasion fleet was mind-boggling. German soldiers awoke in the pre-dawn morning of June 6, 1944, to the sight of some 5,000 ships spread across 20 miles of sea. Well, more than 155,000 Allied Army and Naval personnel were aboard those ships awaiting H-hour, 06:30, to begin the assault. One of those men was future Sun City resident Alfred 'Al' Rowe.

Al grew up in Sacramento, Calif., but spent his late teen years in Norden, a railroad town near Donner Lake. Al's father was a railroad man. Growing up in the high Sierra Nevada mountains gave Al a sense of independence; some would say stubbornness.

"In the summer I would hike by myself though my father was dead set against it. I taught myself how to ski and that ability was one of two special skills that I had that interested the Army. The other

was surveying, a trade that I learned in high school," Al recalled.

After high school, Al got a job surveying for the Southern Pacific Railroad. That job lasted until just shy of his 20th birthday when he received his draft notice. Al dutifully reported for induction into the Army at San Jose, Calif., and in doing so began a less-than-traditional Army career that spanned nine years and two wars.

"Somebody noticed that I had skiing and surveying experience," Al said. I was told to wait until they got enough people together to send to Colorado for mountaineering training, but before that could happen somebody else decided that they needed my surveying skills more and put me on a train to Fort Claiborne, La. But our train got stuck in El Paso and we arrived in Louisiana three days late by which time the outfit I was supposed to connect with was gone. At that point, they didn't know what to do with me. Eventually, I was assigned to the 358th Engineer General Service Regiment.

"This was a kind of catch-all outfit. Our job was to support other Corps of Engineer units with general labor and things like clearing mines, running DUKWs and building storage units. Most of the guys



in my outfit were poor boys from the coal mines who couldn't even read. I guess that's why they promoted me to corporal. Before we were sent to England, we were trained in landmine removal, not an easy thing because the Germans were pretty tricky."

The morning of June 6 found Al and his Company aboard an attack transport along with major elements of the 29th Infantry Division. Portions of the 29th were part of the first wave to hit the beaches, but most of the Division was sent in as part of the second and third waves. The 358th was part of the third wave.

"When it came time to load into the Higgins Boats, we climbed over the side and down a net. The Navy chiefs were supervising the loading and, at the last minute, he put my buddy and I into a boat loaded with infantry. That's how we got separated from our outfit. When we got within a couple hundred yards of Omaha beach, our boat got stuck. The coxswain dropped the landing ramp and told us 'if you want to live, you'll get off this boat now! We're sitting ducks.'

"I got off, but the water was too deep. I dropped all of my gear and after inflating my life belt, started swimming to shore. Somehow my buddy and I made it there but we weren't even sure where 'there' was. Later, I found out we were in the area of Omaha labeled Dog Red. It was still pretty hot with bullets and shells everywhere. We had no idea where the rest of our outfit was and frankly we were more concerned with finding cover. I spotted a wrecked half-track and we took refuge there."

The pair stayed in that shelter for a couple of days until an MP came along and directed them to the company HQ. At that point, with no mines to be cleared, the pair was loaned out to a graves registration unit. Casualties were high and they were busy.

"What we did, basically, was to sort through equipment and determine if it could be reissued, had to be sent back to England for refurb or just plain scrap. Mostly boots, helmets and rifles. Not a very pretty assignment, but necessary," Al recalled.

The battle progressed, the Germans in the coastal defenses eventually ran out of ammunition and major progress was made as the infantry moved inland. The 358th was sent to the Cotentin Peninsula, where they cleared wrecks and otherwise aided in the opening of some of the smaller ports. After Cherbourg was retaken, Al and the 358th repaired bridges, built gasoline storage tanks and built a network of pipelines and storage tanks to support Patton's tanks as they moved into the French heartland.

"Interesting thing happened when we started laying pipelines. A number of German POWs volunteered to help. Seemed that they weren't too fond of Hitler and wanted to get the war

ended. Later, when we recaptured Paris, our outfit laid communications cable under the Seine River. After that, we were sent to Antwerp to rebuild the port facilities that the Germans had pretty well destroyed.

"About that time, General Eisenhower put out a call for men willing to be infantry officers. In general, I didn't like volunteering for anything in the Army but I thought if I'm going be shot at, it might as well be at an officer's pay," Al said with a smile. He did volunteer but nearly didn't get passed by the review board when he offered a few, less-than-politically correct answers to their questions. Somehow he made it through, completed the Infantry Officer's training in Fountainebleau, France, and was commissioned on May 24, 1945, as a Second Lieutenant and assigned to the 36th Infantry Division. Al was eventually reassigned as Executive Officer of a company responsible for the retrieval and maintenance of the Pershing Tank, the largest of the American tanks used in World War II. He remained there until his discharge on February 1, 1946.

Returning to California, Al settled into civilian life and attended the University of Southern California, majoring in civil engineering. He had survived D-Day and all that went after. He was home and, while he did struggle with some of the effects of Post-traumatic Stress Syndrome (PTSD) life was basically good; that is until June 1951, when he was recalled to the service and sent to Korea.

"I didn't go peacefully. It was bad enough fighting a war but this was a 'Police Action' and I wasn't a cop. But eventually the Army won out. They sent a couple of MPs to escort me to Vancouver, Canada, where a plane waited to bring me to Japan. There I attended a chemical warfare school before being brought to Pusan. Next thing I know I'm on top a hill somewhere in Korea earning my Combat Infantryman Badge. After a while, I made enough of a pain-in-the-butt of myself that I got transferred to the Philippines as part of the 30th Engineer Base Survey Company, 29th Engineer Battalion. My assignment: Complete a topographical survey of the coast of the Philippine Islands. We did that using two ships, which we (the United States) had donated to the Philippine Navy. We accomplished that mission sufficiently well that we received a Unit Citation," Al said with some pride.

"At that point, they let me go home, where I was discharged on October 27, 1952, as a First Lieutenant.

Home was again in California. Al returned to the Southern Pacific Railroad as a surveyor. Eventually, he made the move to construction superintendent responsible for the track, bridges, snowsheds and tunnels running between Roseville Calif., and Reno, Nev. After 43 years on the job, he retired and moved to Sun City in 2007. Quite a run!

Mom had some asset protection planning in place and passed away without having to use her Medicaid assistance. SOLUTION: We met with Dad, and suggested the family get him formally tested by a doctor, and it turned out he was competent enough for us to get better Durable Powers of Attorney and advanced Elder Law planning in place. The end result was \$320K would now be protected and not available for Medicaid "recovery". When the time comes for Dad to move into a skilled nursing facility, the cost of care could be covered by Medicaid assistance. The funds from the sale of both homes would be safe from Medicaid. The daughter and her Dad now have their assets and funds protected.

WHAT IS IMPERATIVE TO UNDERSTAND: Had the daughter not gone to an Elder Law Attorney, Dad's assets and funds would HAVE been used FIRST before Medicaid kicked in. He would only have about \$2K in assets left.
