




Link Delivery Timeline

Baby Boomers - Stand out for their rigor, commitment to results, and great preparation.


Generation X - Recognizes the value of teamwork, encourages collaboration, bridges generations.


Generation Y (Millennials) - Strong on versatility, self-confidence, flexibility, unparalleled digital skills.

2020 Nevada General Election

By Mail:

You will receive a ballot in the mail as required by Assembly Bill 4 as approved by the Legislature and signed

by the Governor. Completed ballots must be postmarked or dropped off at a designated drop off location no later than November 3, 2020.

(For additional mail ballot drop-off locations please check online at ClarkCountyNV.gov/vote or call (702) 455-8683).

In Person:

You may still cast your vote in person at a polling place in your county during early voting October 17-30, 2020 or on Election Day November 3, 2020

If you decide to vote in-person instead of by mail, you will need to do one of the following:

If you have a mail ballot, surrender your voted or

unvoted mail ballot (preferably in the packet sent to you) to an election official at the voting site.

If you do not have your mail ballot, you will sign an affirmation at the voting site swearing that you have not already voted in the current election and that you understand no one may attempt to vote or actually vote more than once in the same election.

AARP sponsors an important program in Sun City to prepare income tax returns for residents. This program is staffed by volunteers who prepared more than 500 returns last year. Each return is prepared by a trained counselor and reviewed by an experienced volunteer to assure a high standard of service.

We need your help. Volunteers should have some knowledge of income tax rules and some computer skills. You will be required to attend a one-week tax course and pass a minimum proficiency exam. You will need to contribute at least four hours weekly during the tax season. We work at Mountain Shadows on Thursdays, Fridays, and Saturdays from the beginning of February until April 15. all is the time to do some fertilizing before winter hits. It would be good to get at least two applications done when the weather cools down. Fertilizer should be well balanced such as 9-9-9 with iron. For drip areas, use a water-soluble fertilizer which you should be able to purchase from your local nursery or hardware store. Do not be afraid to ask a store professional on what to use. Most nurseries have a gualified staff member to help you decide what to use, and how to apply the product. With most water-soluble fertilizers, you can mix it in a bucket and then pour it into and around the plant. You can also use fertilizer spikes for your palms and other plants. Again check with your favorite nursery on which product you should use on the plants that you have.

This is also the time of year to plant bulbs if you choose to add some early color to your garden. Some say you should refrigerate them before planting them. I'm not going to dispute this, but at the Pinnacle, we have Daffodils that bloom every





year and we do not do anything to them. Each year they bloom, they appear with more plants and the following year after.

Lastly, do not forget to reset your irrigation timers. You do not want to get a love letter from the water department. I hope everyone enjoys the fall.



If you are, the time to volunteer to run to be an officer is closely approaching and so is voting!

election of officers will be held with all the COVID-19 restrictions and many of the Chartered Clubs or Organizations, not meeting. You will be happy to know that we not only have a secure and fair procedure for Clubs and Organizations to follow, but your Administrative staff is willing to facilitate all of the procedures for your Club to save you time,

Following is an outline of the mandatory procedure, and an explanation of how we can do each process for you.

MANDATORY PROCEDURE:

frustration and expense.

- 1. Due to COVID-19 restrictions, Clubs and Organizations will not hold a meeting this year to report to their membership and to elect their officers. Since all Club members have equal rights to attend a meeting, there are limitations on how many people can attend a meeting, and at this time some members would not feel comfortable attending a meeting. The requirement to have a meeting is lifted for this election year.
- 2. Ballot Boxes in rooms or personal residence will not be allowed. To provide a fair and equitable opportunity for all members of a Club and Organization to cast their vote, and since Ballots will not be opened and counted at a meeting of the Club or Organization, ballots cannot be received or counted by a member or

- members of the Club and must be delivered to a neutral location by email, mail or placement in a drop box. The Association address, dedicated email address and drop box will be provided, and the items will be retrieved by staff members that are dedicated to making the Club and Organization process successful.
- 3. A blast email will be sent out by the Association to every member of every Club and Organization. Giving every Club and Organization Member the opportunity to self-nominate. All nominations will be submitted to the Association through email, regular mail or drop box. Since many of the Clubs are not meeting right now, and even for those that are, many members are not participating. This effort will allow any member interested in running for any open position to submit their names to a neutral party.
- 4. A ballot will be prepared by the Administration for each Club or Organization with the names of those who have self-nominated, and if the Club or Organization has a Nominating Committee with the names submitted by the Nominating Committee. All ballot formats will be uniform in design to assist the counting process.
- 5. The current Board of the Club or Organization will decide what method their Club will use to vote. Clubs and Organizations can use a combination of:
 - A. Hard copy ballot mailed to

Members and then returned by mail or to a drop box at the Administration Office. If preferred, the Administration Office will take care of preparing the envelopes and mailing costs as the postage is offset by other expenses, we are not experiencing for preparation of Club meetings. Those returning the ballots will have to provide their own envelopes and mail them to the Association address and provide their own postage, or they can drop their ballot in a drop box outside of Mountain Shadows.

B. Email Balloting, with the ballot being sent to members of Clubs or Organizations that have email addresses for their members. The ballot is sent by Administration from an email address unique to your Club or Organization and the member votes right from the email and returns it to the same email address.

C. You can use option A or a combination of options A and B. But unless 100% of your membership has an email address you cannot just use option B.

- 6. Unless your election day is before October 15, your election day will stay the same as your Club has already submitted and is posted in the Link Magazine. If your election day is between October 1, and October 14, your election day will now be October 15. The date change for those at the beginning of the October gives the Club, or Administration if the Club elects to take us up on our offer, the opportunity to get all notices out to their Membership.
- 7. All ballots will be received by the Administration through US Mail, drop box or email, and will be sorted and counted on the date of the Clubs designated election day.

 The name of the voter will be verified against the Club or Organization membership list. All member identification on the ballot will be

kept secret and will not be provided to anyone outside of the Administration offices. If a Club or Organization or a member of a Club or Organization challenges an election, the Club or Organization or a member of a Club or Organization can observe a re-counting. Anyone (1) Club or Organization officer who is not a candidate for a position can be appointed by the Club or Organization to observe the original counting of the ballot in a Social Distancing set up or by Zoom.

8. The Club or Organization will be provided with the final vote and will make the announcement to their Club or Organization. I know when the step by step procedure is put into writing, it seems long and even confusing, but keep in mind, these procedures make sure that, during this time that:

A. Every Member of a Club or Organization has the opportunity to self-nominate and run for a position on the Club or Organization Board.

B. Every Member of a Club or Organization receives a ballot, regardless of whether or not they are here at Sun City Summerlin, and whether or not they are participating in activities.

C. Since Ballots will not be opened at a meeting of the Membership, that all Ballots are received by a someone that is not in the Club or Organization and the Members vote is kept secret.

Also, please note, uncontested ballots will not be sent out, and the Club or Organization will be provided with the information and will just make an announcement. We look forward to working with each of the Clubs and Organizations to make all of the elections uniform in process, yet unique to your Club or Organization, and encourage you to let us take the stress out of your election by handling every step this year.

Night Drivers

hile you are sleeping soundly, watching late-night shows, or watching the stars, Security Patrol night drivers are patrolling the neighborhoods making sure you will not be disturbed. The shift beginning at midnight (or 11:30 p.m. shift time), ends at four in the morning (4 a.m.). After checking the Association properties, they patrol every street. When you see the flashing light from the patrol car, know that Security Patrol is there to assist if needed.

midnight shift, "I find it the perfect time and greatly enjoy making sure things are safe and secure for our residents as they get a good night's rest." Braun continued, "When I first began, there were a few more active coyote packs running around Sun City. I was amazed at how they would watch me walking around the [Association] grounds, following me, but not too close."

For two years, Earl Stitt has been patrolling the neighborhoods during the night. "The midnight shift is usually quiet, and the "pay hours" are good." Drivers on the midnight shift receive ten hours which is the currency for Security Patrol. One of the duties is to spot open garage doors. "I rarely got a complaint from a resident when I ring the bell late at night and alert them to the open garage door," he reported. Earl commented on some observations. "There are a number of residents







All four night drivers featured here are military veterans and they have stories. Jean Mohler, Joan Keltner, Erik Braun, and Earl Stitt chose to work the midnight shift. Mohler and Keltner on Sundays and Saturdays, Earl and Erik on Thursdays. Jean and Joan have served in Security Patrol for sixteen years. Joan remarked, "I choose this shift as it's very quiet." All open garage doors and 911 emergency lights are radioed to the dispatcher who then contacts the residents. "It's rewarding to see the open garage door close and the 911 lights go out."

"During the sixteen years," Jean reported, "I have trained as a Watch Commander, Driver Trainer, Dispatcher and Driver. As a 0000-0400 driver, I check all the Association properties." The primary responsibility for drivers on the

midnight shift is to check all four-

teen Association properties. That includes walking around the property checking all doors, noting non-working lights, irrigation leaks, any disturbances to the properties including tennis and pickleball courts.

Erik Braun, also a
Watch Commander, has
been with Security Patrol
for almost five years. His
reason for choosing the

walking between 2 - 4 a.m. They walk in the street and even though there is limited traffic, I would recommend they wear some reflective tape on their clothing or clothing with reflective material. Most residents, though, walk in the parking lots. I've spotted large RVs parked on the street and I think it would help with traffic if they put reflective cones around. Just an observation." After hesitating a little, Stitt recalled, "I have seen a winter's night snowfall."

Night drivers are important and critical observers for the safety of our residents. They respond to calls received by the dispatchers, assessing the situation and radio back for the Watch Commander if necessary.







Doris Poders-Barsky is a Sun City Summerlin resident, group fitness instructor for both the Health & Department and Fitness Club. She shares her words of wisdom on living a life that is better in motion: "Wisdom comes in many forms. For me, it was when I was in my 50's. As a sedentary secretary of 30 years, an incident happened and I realized I didn't have any physical strength to handle it. It was then I began to work out at Gold's gym in Northridge, CA with a trainer. From there I began to love the feeling of "movement" and "strength". So, the journey began and I haven't looked back since, and I'm 82 and going strong and getting "wiser" every day. My motivation is what got



me started, and the habit of feeling movement throughout my body is what keeps me moving. To maintain "balance in life" you must keep moving. It enhances your life and stimulates the brain. Any type of movement is of value for your health and wellbeing. Get off the couch and start your journey of movement and better health."



E.J. Levine, author, educator, and Sun City Summerlin resident who leads the department's monthly Life 102 workshops has this to say:

"There is a process to moving forward from negative to positive. Fill your mind, body and spirit with positive thoughts, and your thoughts will very shortly turn into positive words, and before you know it, the process moves you in to taking positive actions.

Jennifer Smith (above), moved to Sun City Summerlin from California about a year and 4 months ago. She knew at an early age that she wanted to be an athlete. Jennifer played volleyball through high school and at Arizona State University. She also began practicing with the swim team in college to keep her upper body strong for volleyball. After college in 1975, Jennifer entered her first 4 mile run and won. She decided to train for her first marathon that same year. Jennifer recalls, "I did a 3:20, and I was actually one of the top 100 women in the world." She has run over 20 marathons and countless halfmarathons but had to stop running due to a rock-climbing accident in 1998 followed by 6 back surgeries. Swimming is what keeps her body in motion. Jennifer says, "there's two critical things about the water. 1 - You need to learn to relax in the water, because the water will hold you up when you're swimming. 2 - Breathing. You need to learn how to breathe before you learn strokes or anything else. You have to adapt to what happens to your body as you age, and you can't stop moving because when you stop moving, you're dead."

"When you have health, you have everything" says Al Lunceford (below), originally from Warren, Ohio, who moved to Sun City Summerlin 13 years ago. Al came from a musical family and started playing clarinet at the age of 5. He spent his childhood around musicians. Needing a change from music, Al took a job in a steel mill for 3 years, then got a job in a bank as a teller and worked his way up to branch manager. After managing the bank, he decided to start his own company. The company grew and grew. "Desire. Dedication. Discipline. Those are my 3 D's of life. It works." Al recalls of his hard work and determination of owning a business. He started playing golf at the age of 57 and applies his "3 D's" to his golf game by practicing everyday and at 78 years old has a golf handicap of 10. Sun City Summerlin's personal trainer, CeCe Ceccarini, has worked with Al for the past 6 years and keeps him focused on good proper form in the gym. Al takes his health very seriously, and he and his wife incorporate fruits and vegetables into their daily routine. Al says, "it's the little things that mean a lot especially in this time in age to enjoy life."

3.5 ounce 50% dark chocolate bar

1/4 cup tahini or other nut butter

3/4 cup rolled oats or gluten-free oats (not quick oats)

Prep: 10 mins/Total: 10 mins. Servings: 12 small cookies Calories Approximately 90-100 per cookie



Instructions:

Melt the chocolate in the microwave at 20 - 30 second intervals, stirring in between until melted. Stir the tahini into the chocolate and mix thoroughly. Add the oats and mix again.

Line a baking tray with parchment paper or non-stick foil.

Scoop out about 1 tbsp. of the chocolate oat mixture onto the tray for each cookie.

Place the tray in the fridge for about 1 hour. When they are hard to the touch, remove the cookies from the tray with a knife or spatula or peel from the paper.

How Halloween Became a Tradition in the United States

"Tis now the very witching time of night, when churchyards yawn and hell itself breathes out contagion to this world." – Hamlet by William Shakespeare

or centuries Halloween has been celebrated around the world. How did it originate? And why is the day/night so . . . scary? Come with me through the shadows that seem to surely disappear in the light (or will they?) back through time to when this Holiday came into being.

The origin of Halloween has its roots in the Celtic festival of Sanhaim, which was celebrated in ancient Britain and Ireland. The original date for Sanhaim was November 1, and the Celts believed that the New Year began on that date. They would bring the herds back from pasture and prepare for winter. On this day, it was believed that the souls who had passed would return to their home's hearth, and those who had passed during the year would begin their journey to the "other world." Bonfires on hills were created to relight hearth fires and to scare away any evil spirits. Masks and other disguises were used to avoid being identified by ghosts that haunted the night. At this time, the notion of witches, demons, fairies, and others came into being. This important day was also for divining the future – marriages, health, death, and good fortune.

During the 1st Century, CE, the Romans conquered the Celts and added their two holidays, Feralia (honoring the passing of the dead) and Pomona, the goddess of the harvest, to the festival of Sanhaim. It is believed that Pope Bonaface, IV, who established All Saints Day, originally on May 13, moved the holiday to November 1, in the hopes of replacing a Pagan holiday with a Christian one. The evening before became a holy or "hallowed" night and thus Halloween on October 31, was officially born. While the Reformation put an end to the religious part of the holiday for Protestants, in Europe Halloween was celebrated as a secular holiday.


While Halloween was largely forbidden in the colonies, festivals that marked the harvest and some aspects of Halloween were observed. Beginning in the mid-19th century, when large groups custom of Halloween with them, and it became a secular holiday, particularly for children. It is thought that the custom of "trick or treating" was derived from Britain, where beggars were allowed to ask for food on this Holiday. Harmless pranks were the "tricks" and candy were the "treat."

Halloween parties often included bobbing for apples, a practice believed to come from the Romans for their feast of Polama. By the late 1800s, there was a large movement to encourage parents to have parties and discourage the use of grotesque scary costumes and references to witches, ghosts, and pranks. However, by the 1920s and 1930s, vandalism began to plague communities despite the more communityoriented feel of the holiday. A campaign was mounted to squash the practice of vandalism, and by the 1950's the practice was pretty much discarded; parties moved from community centers to homes, and the practice of trick or treat, once again revived, proved an economical way for neighborhoods to be involved in the holiday by giving children treats. Thus, the American tradition of Halloween began and has continued to grow. In today's world, Americans spend about \$6 billion on Halloween, making it the second-largest commercial holiday, with Christmas being the first.

Please be advised at the September 8, 2020 Board of Directors Meeting the SCSCAI Board Members passed and approved for posting and Owner comment the following Resolution.

Resolution #2020-1

COVID-19 EMERGENCY

Whereas a COVID-19 Emergency has impacted Sun City Summerlin Community Association, Inc.; and

Whereas the Governor of the State of Nevada has issued Governor of the State of Nevada's Directives Declaration of Emergency (Directives) including, but not limited to social distancing and the wearing of face masks; and

Whereas the Board of Directors (the Board) has determined that it is necessary to enforce the Governor's Directives, as quickly as practicable;

Now therefore, the Board of Directors Sun City Summerlin Community Association, Inc., does hereby adopt the following resolution:

- I. Any member or guest who violates the Governor's Directives may be banned pursuant to the Rules and Regulations of Sun City Summerlin Community Association, Inc. from the use of all or some of the Sun City Summerlin Community Association, Inc. amenities for a period of time not to exceed 60 days.
- II. The Executive Director is hereby empowered to obtain and review complaints regarding violations of the Directives.
- III. Upon a finding by the Executive Director that sufficient evidence exists of a violation of COVID-19 Directives, the Executive Director shall notify the President of the Association. Upon receipt of such notification, the President shall call a Board Meeting within three (3) business days to hear and determine whether or not any violation of the Directives has been committed by the alleged violator.
- IV. The alleged violator will be notified in writing, by email and delivery to the resident's address either by personal service or posting on the resident's door of the alleged violation and hearing date. The alleged offender may appear and may be represented by counsel. The hearing shall be held in Executive Session unless the alleged offender requests an open hearing.
- V. If the Board determines a violation has occurred, the offender may be denied the use of any or all Sun City Summerlin Community Association, Inc. amenities for period not to exceed sixty (60) days.
- VI. A quorum of the Board shall be sufficient to make a determination.

What Does it Take to Be a Board Member?

On page 65 of this issue of The Link Magazine notification has been issued by the Sun City Summerlin Election Committee that if you are an Owner of a home in Sun City Summerlin Community Association, Inc. and in good standing you are eligible to submit your name to run for the Board of Directors.

While there are only two qualifications to be a Board member (1) an owner of the home and (2) a member in good standing, as a Professional Community Association Manager (PCAM), I'd like to share with homeowners what they need to know not to just be a Board Member, but to be a good Board Member. I'd also like to share if elected, what they might expect as far as time commitments and meetings.

How many hats can you wear? A Board member at SCSCAI wears more than one hat!

Owner: As a Board member, you are still a homeowner and have all of the same obligations, responsibilities and opportunities of every other homeowner. Board members pay the same assessment and fees that homeowners pay and do not receive any compensation or perks. As an individual owner, you cannot speak for the Board. While you can share information that is available in open session minutes, publications or on the web, you cannot commit the Association, Board, or staff to provide services, purchases, or maintenance of any kind. You can bring items forward through the committee process and the Board meetings, but until voted on and approved by the Board it is an idea and not a commitment.

Director: As a member of the Board of Directors, you are one of nine directors. All decision making is done

at a duly called meeting with a properly stated motion that receives a second and is voted on. Majority prevails. There will be times you are happy about the outcome of a motion and there will be times you are not. But, in the end, as a Board member you should support the decision and not speak out negatively about other board members who may not have voted the way you would have liked them to.

The Board as a whole, as well as each individual Board member, is assigned mandatory duties by the SCSCAI governing documents as well as the State of Nevada.

As a Director you are charged with protecting, maintaining, and enhancing all the common elements. This is important to note because it does not say just those you personally think are important, or those with the largest use, or those that you participate in. As a Director on the Board, you must be able to separate your personal interests and the interests of your friends or club members and look at the needs of the entire Association. It is interesting to note the duties do not just say "protect and maintain", it says "enhance". Enhancing a property is a duty well above just keeping it clean and fixing things when they break. It means evaluating and replacing things that are obsolete and adding new things to keep the property from aging in place. There is also an obligation as a Director to make sure the business affairs of the Association are being managed properly and to ensure the Association is in compliance with the governing documents. One thing all Directors are made aware of is they can delegate action and jobs, but they cannot delegate responsibility. Both the governing documents and Nevada State Law hold the Board responsible for Association business and Association care and Association financial stability now and for the future, whether or not the task itself was delegated to a staff member or contractor.

As a Director, you have a fiduciary responsibility to

the Association and will exercise the business judgement rule. As surprising as it might be this may be your biggest challenge on the Board. Not because you are not honest or not a good business person, but because almost every decision you make will impact someone. It could impact you, your spouse, significant other, someone you personally know in the community, one of your neighbors, someone you are in a Club with, or someone who voted for you. Whether it is a decision on the operations of an amenity or on the budget, you cannot let your own personal needs or the needs of someone you know play into your decisions on what is right not only for the community as a whole but the future of the community 30-years from now. This is especially difficult at budget time, as each Board member has a fiduciary duty to evaluate the information presented and make the best financial decision for the Association, not for themselves or their neighbors. Every five years this decision is escalated because of the requirement for a full Reserve Study. The Reserves are a driving force in preserving, maintaining, and enhancing the community and therefore are a driving force in the budget. As a Board Member you must be willing to raise dues when necessary to cover day to day operations, but just as important to cover expenses 10, 20 or 30 years from now.

Officer: Once the election is over and the incoming Board members have been seated, the entire Board will elect officers. If you are elected as an officer you will be obligated to the officer duties set forth in the SCSCAI governing documents as well as Nevada State Law. Again, there are some of those duties that you can delegate but the responsibility remains with you. Officers can make certain decisions, but those decision-making powers have to have been delegated to them by the governing documents, or by a vote of the Board approved by a majority of Board members in a duly called Board meeting.

Committee Chair: Each Board member serves as a Committee Chair. The only member who sometimes does not Chair a committee is the Board President, primarily because of the other duties they perform.

As a Committee Chair, in most cases, you will have a Committee of eight to ten people and your committee will meet monthly. Each committee has a designated duty. Your job is to prepare the agenda and work with staff to prepare for the meeting and present items from you Committee Meeting to the Board for decision.

How Much Time Should I Expect to Spend on Board Duties:

Since each Board member is different this list provides the things that all Board members do to prepare for and attend meetings.

Monthly minimum hours spent on Association business for the Average Board Member = 68 hours a month

- In preparation for their monthly Board
 Meeting, Board members attend an average of
 six of the nine monthly Committee meetings.
 Each meeting is at least 2.5 hours long. This
 includes the monthly Committee meeting that
 they chair. 15 hours
- Review of Financial Statements in preparation for the Finance Committee Meeting and Board of Directors Meeting. 2 hours
- Review of the agenda and back-up material prior to the committee meeting they chair. 1 hour
- 4. Property Inspections for committees they serve on or Chair where applicable or meeting with staff to review documents for meetings such as finance and legal services. **2 hours**
- 5. Review of the Board Agenda and Back-Up material for the Board Meeting. **3 hours**
- Attendance of the Open Board of Directors Meeting. 3 to 4 hours
- 7. Attendance of Executive Session Meeting. 1 hour
- 8. The Board members receive an average of ten emails a day regarding Association business.

From The executive director

While they are only copied on these and do not need to respond, they do need to read and be aware of them. **5 hours**

- Budget Hearings. Four consecutive days minimum - late March or early April (four hours each). 16 hours
- 10. Budget Ratification Meeting. 1 hour
- 11. Coffee with the Board. (Monthly). 2 hours
- 12. Each Board member is different on how many times they contact staff or the committee they are responsible for, or how many homeowners call them or email them directly. In talking with Board members over the years most agree that on average they spend at least 4 hours a week on Association business that includes talking to, emailing, or being stopped by homeowners. 17 hours

In fairness, I have used the minimum of what time commitment is needed. Many of our Board members dedicate many more hours to the Association, but most people that are considering running for the Board want to know what I think the minimum hours for meetings they should attend, are expected to attend, preparation for meetings and interacting with staff and homeowners.

If serving your community as a Board member sounds like something you would like to do, remember the only qualifications you need to have are as follows:

- Be a unit owner in Good Standing
- No unpaid assessments
- Disclose any potential or actual conflicts of interest

- Cannot stand to gain from a matter before the Board
- Cannot reside with or be related to a Board member or candidate
- Cannot be related to the Executive Director

Being a Board member can be a rewarding experience. I have found that the Board members who enjoy their time on the Board are those who went into the election knowing the following:

- (1) Every decision is a decision made by the Board in a Board Meeting.
- (2) The governing documents and State Law have to be adhered to, and while changes can be made to the governing documents it is not only tedious and costly but many times takes an overwhelming vote of the homeowners in order to pass.
- (3) That while caring for the homeowners and their individual wants and needs is important, the fiduciary responsibility assigned to each Board member in the governing document is the Association as a whole.
- (4) There is a time commitment to being a Board member, and it is more than a three to four-hour meeting each month.

I want all of you who think you would like to be a Board Member to be empowered by the knowledge of not only what makes you eligible but what some of the duties and commitments are once you are elected. If you think you might like to run or if your planning to run, start attending Board Meetings, Coffee with the Board and Committee Meetings now, so you are well versed on the issues when you participate in Candidates Night!
