President PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



Working Together, We Will Get Through This Difficult Time

s I sit to write my article for September, I realize that it is only August 1 and circumstances seem to change weekly. With that said, I have noticed that our residents are using our facilities a lot. This is a great thing for our community as we need to keep active and busy. I am going to single out golf as the primary topic of this month's article. There are 1,288 homes that abut one of our three golf courses. That is nearly one in five of all the homes in Sun City. There are at least six formal golf groups in Sun City, as well as too many informal groups to count: There are the Ladies Executive, the Ladies 18 Hole, the Men's Niners, the Men's 18 Hole, the Guys and Gals, as well as the Nine, Wine and Dine. These groups play at least once a month and most on a weekly basis.

I am a golfer, but do not consider myself to be an avid golfer or even a good golfer. However, I enjoy the camaraderie of playing with new and old friends. We had to shut down our courses for about seven weeks because of COVID-19. Since our courses re-opened the amount of play has substantially increased. In May, the number of rounds played was 2,600 – greater than the number that had been budgeted. Since outside players were substantially prohibited that means that Sun City residents were playing substantially more. Admittedly, there were several other recreational activities that were prohibited, but still our residents were playing a lot more and I think that is a good thing. In June, the number of rounds was more than 4,100 – more than budgeted. Once again, more play by Sun City residents.

When the Board goes through the budgeting process and considers the number of rounds that are played each year, tournaments, and tournaments from groups outside Clark County are a significant part of the calculations. An over-simplification of the cost paid by golfers that use our three courses is that outsiders pay the most per round, Clark County residents not living in Sun City pay the next lowest amount per round, and Sun City residents pay the least amount per round. There are several loyalty discounts and annual memberships made available to residents to reward frequent play. While the average income per round might be

lower because of the substantial decrease in outside play, it has certainly

been gratifying to see the huge increase in play by our residents. As an aside, did you know that Highland Falls Golf Course was selected the Best Golf course in the Las Vegas Valley in 2017 and 2018?

I have also noticed, in spite of the heat, that many of our residents are still walking (especially at 6 a.m.). Our pools are getting a

lot of use as our residents are trying to return to what is now the new normal. The Board wants to thank the 99 percent of our residents who are helping us, and the staff work through these new and, at times, difficult issues. We, as a community, will survive this pandemic by continuing to work together.

Drink water no matter what activity you take part in during these hot days.

TRIPLE PLAY

Softball Club Offers Chance to Play, Participate or Just Catch Some Great Live Action

riginally, the Sun City Men's Softball Club had been around for a few years and members had to travel around the city to play their games. In 1998, that all changed when the Club got a home ballpark at the Pinnacle Community Center (Pinnacle Field) with their charter. Currently, the Club has 102 members that range in age from 53 to 86 years. Players come from all walks of life and, amazingly, there are three players that have been playing since the Club's inauguration – 22 years ago!

One of these three players is Russ Roskens. He is in his early 80s and still enjoys playing the game. Over the years, Russ has served the Club in a number of positions. He credits softball with extending the lives of a number of Club members over the years.

According to Club President Ted Biedryck, "When people move to Sun City, they leave behind their old friends and find themselves looking for new acquaintances and new routines. When they join the Softball Club, they immediately join a new family of over 100 people!"

The Softball Club has members of all skill levels. There are two leagues in the Club (the American League and the National League). Both leagues play competitive softball. The American League has three teams and is composed of players that regularly play in tournaments, while the National League has four teams and has players who enjoy the game, the camaraderie and coming out to play.

Jim Herhusky, who has been a member of the Club for a number of years and has served in multiple positions including president, told me three reasons that he plays softball in the Club:

- 1. The Club provides an excellent social environment by playing a team sport with a diverse group of guys.
- 2. Getting out in the fresh air and having an opportunity to exercise.
 - 3. Playing softball helps fulfill the competitive edge.

There literally is something to do for anyone who is interested in membership.

I had an opportunity to chat with the youngest member of the Club, Dean Byers. Dean just moved to Sun City about a year ago. He had played softball in the L.A. area for many years, so when he saw the field and heard about the Club, he immediately said, "Sign me up!" Dean says he gets kidded once in a while because he is the youngest player, at 53 years old. "I enjoy being outside and participating in sports, plus it gives me an

Summer non-league play provides players an opportunity to knock off the rust and become comfortable with the game again. Scheduled league play starts the first week in October and runs through May.



Playing softball is the Club's No. 1 purpose, but the Club also has multiple social events that include barbecues/cookouts, and there is also a Men's Softball golf league that meets every Tuesday. The activity enables golfers of all skill levels to play together in another fun, athletic environment.

Dues to become a member are \$30 per year. With their dues, members receive an official team jersey and hat, all the softball they can play and participation in social events. The Club welcomes new members at any time during the year. istorically, humans have mused about what labor means for centuries from Aristotle, who said, "The end of labor is to gain leisure;" to Voltaire, who is quoted as saying, "Work keeps at bay three great evils – boredom, vice and need;" to the 19th Century Americans who created Labor Day to improve workers' rights and to honor the U.S. employee.

So, how did this federal holiday come about? Who created it? And how has it evolved since its formal adoption in 1894? This article hopes to answer those questions and others you might have about Labor Day.

The U.S. was not the first country to think about the treatment of workers. In the 19th Century, May Day, customarily celebrated as a time to welcome in a new season, became an international workers' day.

In 1872, the first Canadian Labour Day was created when printers in Toronto began lobbying for a shorter work week. Here, our Labor Day goes back to when the average American worked 12-hour days, seven days a week, and children, aged 5 to 6, worked in factories and mines.

Back in 1882, not only did workers look to improve their conditions, but also to honor the American worker. As Peter J. McGuire, General Secretary of the Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners, sought "A day to honor those who from rude nature have delved and carved all the grandeur we behold."

There is a question, historically, as to who should be credited for the origin of the holiday. Records show that McGuire, who also was a co-founder of the American Federation of Labor, first suggested such a holiday. Other records seem to indicate that Matthew Maguire, a machinist with coincidentally the same name but different spelling, founded the holiday.

Matthew Maguire proposed the holiday in 1882, while serving as secretary for the Central Labor Union in New York. In accordance with the Central Labor Union's plans to recognize workers, the Union held its first Labor Day on Tuesday, September 5, 1882.

A movement was subsequently formed to move the holiday's proposal through state legislation in New York. However, the first state to pass Labor Day as a law was Oregon on February 21, 1887. Four more states followed suit that year – Colorado, Massachusetts, New Jersey and New York. Connecticut, Nebraska and Pennsylvania then followed.

By 1894, 23 states joined in adopting the holiday, and on June 28, 1894, President Grover Cleveland, signed a law

declaring the first Monday in September as Labor Day, a federal holiday.

In the beginning, parades and speeches organized in urban areas marked Labor Day's tribute to the American worker. Today, the holiday is recognized with fewer parades and more activities. Families celebrate the value of labor and the workforce, and Labor Day weekend has become the unofficial reminder of the end of the summer season.

According to the U.S. government website on Labor Day, "The vital force of labor added materially to the highest standard of living and the greatest production the world has ever known, and has brought us closer to the realization of our traditional ideals of economic and political democracy. It is appropriate, therefore, that the nation pays tribute on Labor Day to the creator of so much of the nation's strength, freedom and leadership – the American worker."

If you're planning on heading to one of Sun City's community buildings, be it a social center, a restaurant or a fitness center, you are required to wear a face mask. Frequently Asked Questions

Can I park or store a vehicle on the street? You can park on the street, but cannot store a vehicle as the streets in Sun City belong to the City of Las Vegas. To report vehicles parked on the street for any length of time, or that are inoperable, call Las Vegas Parking Enforcement, 702-229-6432.

Can I keep a vehicle that is inoperable in my driveway?No. Inoperable or unregistered vehicles may not be stored or parked on any lot. Note: It is a safety hazard to leave a vehicle unattended on a ramp or on blocks.

Can I store a recreational vehicle or trailer on my lot? No. Recreational vehicles, mobile homes, travel trailers, tent trailers, camper shells, detached campers, boats, boat trailers or other similar equipment or vehicles may not be parked, maintained or repaired on any lot.

Can I replace my mailbox? Yes. Mailbox replacements can be locking or non-locking, but the design must be chosen from the approved models on file in the Community Standards Office.

How many estate sales can I have? Only one (1) sale for a maximum of two days is allowed. That sale may be conducted one time only if the resident is moving, or if there is a death in the immediate household. A permit from Community Standards is required to conduct such a sale. No garage sales are permitted.

Can I post estate sale signs on utility poles and/or other common areas? No. Only one (1) sign is permitted on the lot on the actual date of the sale.

When can I put my trash out? Trash containers should not be placed in any part of the front yard for collection prior to 3 p.m. on the day preceding the scheduled collection, and must be removed by 7 p.m. on the day of collection.

Where can I store my trash containers? The obvious place is in your garage. Trash containers also may be stored in a three-sided enclosure in the side yard behind the front line of the home that is stuccoed to match the home. Another option is a three-sided wrought iron enclosure with the same color metal mesh screening, or even a three-sided area enclosed with bushes or shrubs that are the same height as the trash containers.

Are political signs allowed? Yes. One (1) sign per candidate or ballot question is allowed. There is not a limit on how many signs.

he Community Services Department is pleased to report some wonderful changes. There's something exciting to look forward to when Sun City Summerlin's Starbright Theatre will once again be able to open its doors to residents. Dirk Kleutgens, our Starbright Theatre Audio Engineer, took some time out of his day to describe the many changes that residents can look forward to.

"We brought the Starbright Theatre's sound to the 21st Century," Dirk said. "Dale Meeker, our longtime Lighting Designer and I, were able to achieve a lot of great changes over the last few months."

You can feel Dirk's excitement when he explained that thanks to the new line array PA speaker system, every seat in the Starbright Theatre will have an exceptional sound experience. Dirk made sure to point out that the update will not mean a louder Starbright Theatre, but thanks to added speakers and sub-woofers, sound will be delivered to each seat evenly. Likewise, the new mixing console will ensure a great sound experience everyone can enjoy.

There is also great news for Sun City's performing clubs and other entertainers.

"We added a new radio frequency system," Dirk said. "This means no more dropouts from microphones and, on account of additional monitor speakers, stage boxes, microphones, and wireless microphones, the theater will be able to accommodate larger groups where everyone on stage will hear themselves and the

audience will not miss anything."

Additionally, pre-show videos can now be streamed with Apple TV, which makes everything easier for the producer of each show. Overall, performing groups will be elated with the stage improvements and how at-ease they will feel performing.

firm handshake, a friendly hug, a kiss on the cheek – these are some of the gestures now on hold because of social distancing guidelines intended to keep us all safe. This does not mean, however, that good manners should go by the wayside. Instead, there are safer ways of greeting one another while visiting the community and fitness centers.

Information Centers

"We often get questions from new residents who want information about where to go for more information," Cathy said.

Assistant Head IC volunteer, Veronica Douglass, added: "We are the first contact with visitors and thus we can make a great first impression. I like volunteering at the ICs because I get to be the cheerleader for the community. Telling people how great the community is and all about the numerous activities that are available to





he Information Centers (ICs) stand like sentinels at Del Webb and Lake Mead boulevards, Sun City and Lake Mead boulevards and Rampart and Del Webb boulevards. Visitors drive past them as they enter or exit Sun City Summerlin. Security Patrol volunteers staff the ICs seven days a week from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Equipped with maps and information, volunteers provide interested persons with directions to golf courses, various streets and general information about Sun City. In addition, Information Centers are essential to the smooth operation of communication and assistance to residents.

"The IC volunteers could be the first impression of Sun City for a potentially new resident," said Cathy Swindle, Head IC volunteer. "We often have new people inquiring about what Sun City is all about and how we like living here. We provide them with a copy of the Link, a map of Sun City and information about

Security Patrol. We also provide directions to places within Sun City and sometimes outside the community."

In addition to greeting guests, IC volunteers maintain a shift log that reports on all visitors and calls received at the Information Centers.

The log is given to the Watch Commander during his/her shift rounds and stored at base. A monthly report of numbers is published in the Link. our residents. I also point people in the right direction to the community centers, golf courses, and other locations inside Sun City."

Training for IC volunteers follows the same criteria as the training in the other disciplines – dispatcher and driver. All must complete the initial training that includes policies and procedures, and one shift observing the other disciplines.


"After an application is received, I contact the volunteer and introduce myself," Cathy said. "Then I contact the training leader to set up the initial basic training. The applicant is given a policy manual, all required training forms and information on how to acquire the uniforms. The training consists of four training sessions at each of the three ICs and five solo shifts."

Veronica added. "We have a yearly refresher course to remind our volunteers of some of the new policies and procedures and anything new at Security base."

All volunteers receive a Class A uniform (formal), and a Class B uniform (a polo shirt that can be worn with brown or black trousers or beige trousers in the summer; knee-length shorts are permitted during the summer months). Volunteers are also issued a winter jacket and a lightweight jacket. Items are available at the uniform shop to all volunteers who complete their training. There is no charge for the uniforms.

COVID-19 brought changes to the operations of Security Patrol. After closing the IC operations in Phase I, Cathy reopened the ICs when Security base resumed operations.

"Masks, sanitized wipes and spray sanitizers are provided for each IC location. When an IC volunteer reports that these



supplies need to be restocked, the volunteer contacts the dispatcher or the assistant head IC volunteer, who will handle the request. A temporary policy was implemented to maintain social distancing. The morning shift closes at 11:40 a.m. to ensure it is gone before the afternoon shift arrives at 11:50 p.m.," Cathy explained.

Cathy also noted that there are 42, four-hour shifts per week.



"We have forty-three IC volunteers - full and part-time. Some volunteers work two shift per week: some are crosstrained as drivers or dispatchers. Recruiting is done by the head recruiter and assistant. They coordinate having personnel at the new resident welcome event and all have information tables set up at community events."

Cathy and Veronica are fairly new to the community.

"I moved to Sun City three years ago from Indiana. Since I had only a few family members living here, I wanted more information about Sun City and to meet new people," Cathy said.

"I have been a resident of Sun City for over three years now and a Security Patrol member for two years," said Veronica. "My husband and I love living here and being part of the community. And I just want to add one more thing: Thank you to all the IC volunteers working during the COVID-19 virus emergency."

Although Security Patrol is not taking new applications right now due to the COVID-19 virus, you can still get information on volunteer opportunities by calling 702-254-2303. You will be contacted when training resumes.





Let There be Sound Appreciation Sole Requirement for Membership

here seems to be some confusion about the nature of our club. Some people are assuming that one must be a musician in order to join. This could not be further from the truth. One does not need to play an instrument to enjoy our club; one only has to be a good audience member. Our meetings are concerts at the Starbright Theatre, and all are welcome!

A short history about the Classical Music Club (originally Chamber Music Club). The Chamber Music Club received its first charter in June 1997. It had 44 members and Rick Temple was the president. There was no treasurer or vice president listed on the charter as noted by the executive director who approved it. I have heard stories that the Club started by having concerts in members' living rooms before the Starbright Theatre was built. The Club's original purpose, or mission statement, has changed a little, "to promote the enjoyment, understanding, knowledge and appreciation of live performances of chamber/classical music, and to encourage fellowship among its members."

Our Club membership increased from 44 in 1997 to more than 400 – so we must be doing something right. Just the fellowship of assembling a group of people creates a sense of community that is important to human existence and contributes feelings of self-worth. Hearing some of the best music ever written, performed by world-class musicians, in a well-designed environment, for almost free, is part of what makes Sun City Summerlin one of the best places in the world to retire in.

There are many people who have contributed to the success of our Club. In the 23 years since the first charter, many Club presidents, board members and volunteers have donated their time, talent, and treasure. There are too many names for me to remember, so I will not name them, for fear of leaving someone out. However, I would like to thank them all; they know who they are. The one group of people that I will mention specifically are the many artists. I apologize in advance for those I could not mention due to space and time constraints. One of the first to come to mind is Dr. Mykola Suk, currently employed at UNLV in the division of keyboard studies as coordinator. He has been performing with our Club since arriving in Las Vegas in 2001. He organized the



Beethoven 250 Project, a two-year series of complimentary programs celebrating Beethoven's 250th birthday. Program No. 7, scheduled for April 27 in the Starbright Theatre, was a COVID-19 casualty. Dr. Suk also has been instrumental (pun intended) in recommending the Club to talented performers from the UNLV College of Music program. He will, hopefully, be involved when we are able to reopen the Starbright Theatre in the future.

While much has changed in Sun City and elsewhere in the last few decades, the mission statement of our Club has remained true. Our Club has expanded its scope to include performances by young artists, featuring The Nevada School of the Arts, a non-profit organization. This program usually begins in April, allowing new students most of the school year to have sufficient preparation. For many of the students, the Starbright Theatre is their first experience in a venue away from the school. Our appreciative audience response is sometimes life-changing, and the opportunity encourages the students to pursue a career in the performing arts. This passing of the torch between generations is a powerful feeling that is palpable to many in the audience. I spoke with Sun City's sound and lighting technician Dale Meeker, who manages the booth at the Starbright Theatre, about this and he said: "The Starbright is one of the best community theaters in our area."

While I personally have not been in any other community association theaters, I believe it. I know that our theater has fabulous acoustics, especially for piano, violin, viola, cello, bass, opera voices and brass, which is what our Club primarily features, though usually not all at once.

The Sun City Board of Directors have been working on budgeting and details of upgrading the sound system in the Starbright for some time now. In an ironic twist, the upgraded system was installed shortly after the Starbright closed in March. While the Classical Music Club primarily uses this system as monitors to help the musicians hear each other better onstage, it will greatly enhance many of the other programs the theater offers, especially the free movies that are regularly shown there. I am eagerly and optimistically awaiting the re-opening of the Starbright in the near future.





FITNESS CENTERS & POOLS ZERO TOLERANCE

for Owner or Resident Abuse,
Bullying, Name Calling, Harassment,
Disregard or Argument over COVID19 Restrictions at the Fitness
Centers and Pools

Dear Sun City Summerlin Owners and Residents,

At the August 11, 2020 Board of Directors Meeting, the Executive Director presented to the Board of Directors a plan to avoid shutting down or reducing the hours of any of the Fitness Centers and Pools. This plan comes from the Executive Team, made up of all the Executive Director and the Department Directors, and included the commitment that each Department Director would personally take a shift as a Fitness Monitor and/or provide a lead staff member in their department who would take a shift. The Board of Directors accepted the plan, therefore there will be no alteration in the hours that the Fitness Centers and Pools are open. During this time, the Director of Fitness will fill the 10 vacant positions caused by the exit of Monitors due to the treatment they are receiving from Owners and residents.

In addition, the Board of Directors adopted a NO TOLERANCE POSITION. Please take time to read and understand all actions that will be taken if an Owner or resident exhibits any type of argumentative, hostile or bullying behavior, including but not limited to speaking loud, belittling or swearing at a staff

member or any other Owner or resident or directed at no one in particular.

The following ZERO TOLERANCE POSITION applies to the Fitness and Swimming Pool Areas. The primary area of abuse is from those using the swimming pools. Therefore, at this time the Board of Directors has stated, that this measure will only be put in place in the Fitness Centers, which includes the Swimming Pools, however if any other Department Director experiences a growth of abuse in their department they can request the Board to adopt the same or similar policy.

If an Owner or Resident disregards, argues over, disputes the validity or creates any type of controversy, including but not limited to swearing, hollering, aggressive actions, inappropriate hand gestures, arguing, calling names, bullying, etc., regarding the COVID-19 Restrictions in place for Fitness Centers and Swimming Pools while at the Fitness Center or Swimming Pools, including but not limited to:

- Wearing of a Face Covering
- Having their Temperature Taken
- Having their Temperature Taken on their Forehead
- Social Distancing
- Reservation Requirements and Rules

The following action will be taken:

1. An Executive Team member or a Board Member will ask them to leave the building immediately and will escort them out. If they refuse to leave the police will

be called and they will be charged with trespassing.

- 2. The alleged offender will be given the Executive Directors business card and a letter from the Executive Director stating that they will not be able to return to any Fitness Center or Swimming Pool until they have made an appointment and met with the Executive Director to discuss the incident that led to their being asked to the leave the building. It will be up to the alleged offender on how long their ban is in place as it is their responsibility to make the appointment with the Executive Director. The Executive Director will schedule the appointment within 8 business hours of the request.
- 3. The procedure for assessing fines and sanctions,

including taking away or restricting the alleged offenders right to use all or some of Sun City Summerlin Community Association, Inc. amenities will start at the moment the person is asked to leave the building and will follow the Hearing Procedure per Sun City Summerlin Community Association, Inc. governing documents and NRS 116, which at the end of the discovery and submitting witness statements, the alleged offender will have a Hearing before the Board of Directors or Hearing Committee designated by the Board of Directors. The decision of the Board of Directors or Hearing Committee shall be final and will be enforced.

This procedure will only impact the offenders who do not think they have to abide by the State of Nevada Directives and our procedures.


