

bors-helping-neighbors concept is serving Sun City well. Two reports involved aiding residents who had fallen. Next, Renae Watsabaugh told the group how she spotted a front door left open by a vacationing property owner. The emergency contact was called to secure the door.

Countless landscape water leaks and garage doors left open after dark have been reported to Security Patrol. SCSCAI Board member Karl Wiedemann described how he noticed a stranger inspecting the backs of properties in his neighborhood. Upon questioning the man, Karl said the guy told him he was checking sprinkler systems. Knowing that to be untrue, Karl asked for business identification and the man left and did not return. One block captain noted a row of open mailboxes along a street, emphasizing the importance of not using home mailboxes for outgoing mail.

Another block captain said she has picked up newspapers accumulating in the driveways of vacationing homeowners. Gerry Sokolski photographed and reported an apparently abandoned car to Security Patrol. Patrol volunteer Don Rutkowski shared the monthly activities report by Security Patrol dispatchers with the neighborhood watch volunteers.

CPC Chairwoman and SCSCAI Board member Barbara Holden emphasized the importance of keeping information current on residents' emergency contact forms. She also noted frequent burglaries reported regarding driveway-parked cars. Helen Bubenheim became involved with the watch program because of three vacant houses in her neighborhood, one of which was being broken into by young people who were staying in the house at night. Neighborhood Watch members' information resulted in the property being properly secured, and monitoring deterred further break-ins while the house was being renovated for sale. According to Helen, as new owners move into the homes, she will be recruiting them to join the watch group.

Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department Crime Prevention Specialist Kathy Cassell attended the meeting.

"There is a lot of terrific lifetime experience and good common sense in Sun City," said Kathy. "More so than in other developments covered by Metro's Northwest Area Command. Occasionally that may be a drawback in that some retirees think former experience should allow them to go beyond observing and reporting potential crime."

Kathy further explained that, ideally, residents should use their expertise for timely observation and accurate descriptions instead of direct involvement. Kathy asserted that residents are fortunate to live in Sun City, surrounded by so many caring people such as the Neighborhood Watch volunteers. Addressing community residents, she said, "You should want to be part of that in some way."

Metro's vast Northwest Area Command serves roughly 370,000 residents in its assigned boundary. According to the crime prevention specialist, "It's the quietest command in the Las Vegas Valley."

# Ever-evolving Security Patrol

#### Leadership's Vision Keeps All Eyes Focused on the Future

hen Ron Gagne, a retired Chicago police detective, became the first chief of the Sun City Summerlin Security Patrol in 1991, his priority was to protect SCSCAI property and building materials stored on site. The Association provided vehicles for Patrol volunteers: members in beige uniforms chased away thieves. Two years later, as the population in Sun City grew, the job description increased to add vacation house checks, an interoffice mail run and information centers. Always moving forward, Gagne smiled at the improvements.

Here we are in the 21st century and Security Patrol moved to synchronize with it. Before computers were installed (2008-2009), all dispatch logs and personnel records were hand-written. Computers were a blessing for dispatchers and drivers with arthritic fingers, and a challenge for those who remembered the mimeograph machine.

Security Patrol's progress has been the result of strong, visionary leadership of the chiefs whom members have elected over the years. Chief Gagne would be proud of all his successors.

While all Security Patrol chiefs and their board of directors have contributed to the organization's advancement, this article concentrates on four chiefs whose leadership has directly contributed to the technological transformation of the Patrol. They briefly tell the story.



#### **JERRY WEISER (2008-2009)**

Technological changes began when Security Patrol purchased its first computer during Chief Jerry Weiser's two-year tenure. Until that time, logs and personnel files were hand written. Patrol drivers were required to write logs listing activities during

their four-hour shifts.



#### **JUDY HUNT (2012 AND 2015)**

"A lot of attention was given to radio communications during 2012. Radio frequency relay equipment was moved from Highland Falls to atop the Pinnacle. Higher elevation improved reception for handheld and car radios by removing static and calls being

dropped. Drivers were using their cell phones to communicate with the dispatcher. In that year, four cars and handheld radios were purchased that complied with the new Federal Communication Commission that all radios be narrow-banded."

During 2015, Judy oversaw the reconfiguration of Patrol cars with improved light bars and radio shut-off switches in cars. This removed the worry of drivers forgetting to turn off the radios at the end of their shifts





#### **BRIAN DODD (2014)**

"When I stood as assistant chief and then chief, I knew I wanted to do it because I felt I had something to contribute," Brian said. And he did.

Brian built on Weiser's foundation and revolutionized the way the Patrol uses technology. Among his achieve-

ments are: developed a Facebook page for increased Security Patrol visibility; initiated and wrote weekly email broadcasts for current news and information necessary for members; and implemented a Security Patrol network, disassociating it from the SCSCAI domain to allow for better local control.

Improving the clarity of job descriptions was another area Brian tackled. During his tenure, the Policies and Procedures manual was updated to enhance easy understanding of the responsibilities in each discipline. Brian oversaw a car replacement process that bought three new vehicles. Driver maps with correct spelling of street names were initiated and completed on his watch.



#### **BILL HENRIOD (2016)**

Security Patrol's boards of directors have played a vital role in guiding the chiefs. "I am gratified by the support of the board of directors during my tenure," said Bill. With radios, computers and vehicles running smoothly, Bill concentrated on developing leadership

and self-improvement qualities of the volunteers. His monthly articles in the Link and INSIDER (in-house newsletter) provided the direction and encouragement necessary in a volunteer organization. To improve efficiency, Bill changed scheduling to assist drivers in their duties. The Association's interoffice mail delivery was changed to 1 p.m.

from morning and afternoon deliveries so that 8 a.m. drivers performing vacation house checks would not be interrupted. It is most beneficial in the summer when the Patrol staff is short and the list of requests for vacation house checks is long.



#### DICK CLARK (2017)

In November 2016, Dick Clark was voted in as chief. Working with his board of directors John Lytle, assistant chief; Nan Stevenson, personnel director; Bob Segler, treasurer; and Darlene Vaturi, secretary; Dick has presided over the largest number of recruits in

many years, as well as the replacement of aging equipment.

"New members are vital to the future. There is opportunity to grow within the organization and become the future leaders of the Patrol," Dick said. "I worked with Brian (Dodd) as he brought the Patrol into the 21st century. When I first joined the Patrol, I met Jerry Weiser. I was impressed that retired people would devote 12 hours as a watch commander, and many more as chief. This is a wonderful community. I get more from it than I give."

Dick, along with all chiefs, has served as watch commanders, drivers and/or dispatchers, as well as assisted in other projects. By the time a person is ready to consider the responsibility of chief, he or she knows the heartbeat of the Patrol.

With insightful leaders and wise boards of directors, the Patrol serves Sun City residents well. Dispatchers maintain the connection among all the disciplines and problem solve. Watch commanders are at the ready in case of emergencies.

Volunteers are the Patrol's greatest asset. Over the years, the neighbors who willingly give four hours a week, led by elected chiefs, provide the best security possible. Chief Gagne's idea is still evolving.

#### **Emergency Contact Information Saves Lives**

This is a true story that happened within the last year here in Sun City. Late one morning a Patrol dispatcher received a call from a resident concerned about her next door neighbor. It was reported that the neighbor always read his paper and then brought it next door for her to read. It was now 11:45 a.m. and the paper was still lying in the man's driveway. The dispatcher sent a car and driver to investigate. The driver checked all around the house but every door and window was shut, preventing him from looking inside. The front door, although open, was not accessible because of a locked security door. The driver yelled into the open door and thought he heard something. With the help of the dispatcher and the watch commander on duty, the driver requested emergency contact information from the resident's blue Emergency Contact Information form. The form had the name of a friend who had a key to the house, as well as the name and telephone number of the man's son who lived

in California. The dispatcher asked the contact with the key to go to the resident's home and meet the Patrol's watch commander and driver, where entry was made into the home. The resident was found semi-conscious, lying in a pool of blood on the kitchen floor. Security Patrol called 911 and the resident was transported to the hospital, where he received several stitches and tests that resulted in a short hospital stay and a complete recovery.

The purpose of this story is to remind residents of the importance of getting to know their neighbors and ensuring their emergency contact information is filed and accurate. Security Patrol volunteers are most frustrated when they can't help. In this case they were able to. The resident had a form on file and a watchful neighbor. Security Patrol was able to do its job and a happy ending was the result.

taff members update: Brandon Balek, building maintenance supervisor, reported on the hardwood floor refinishing project at the Pinnacle Fitness Center's multi-purpose room, the Mountain Shadows pool patio cover and the Mountain Shadows Exchange Room. In addition, Brandon told the committee that an air conditioner unit and compressor was replaced in the men's and women's locker rooms at the Desert Vista Fitness Center. The roof at Desert Vista was repaired, and damaged tiles from the leak were replaced. A shower at the Desert Vista Fitness Center was repaired.

Brian Bagwell, golf course maintenance general manager, reported that his crew will plant Bermuda sod at Palm Valley in preparation to possibly change SCSCAI's overseed practices to no longer overseed the fairways. The bunker project has begun at Eagle Crest.

At Palm Valley, the irrigation project to redo Hole No. 5 is a test to get a better idea of what it will take to renovate the entire course in years to come. Work remains in progress along residents' yards on the front line at Highland Falls Golf course.

Louis Darling, landscape manager, reported that his staff is prepping Sun City Boulevard for new rock on green belt 2. He is waiting for easement paperwork for turf reduction. Green belt 4 is the next scheduled for turf reduction, which also will need paperwork from the Las Vegas Valley Water District. Green belt 10's water pipe broke again and was repaired. Work is being done to re-establish plants there.

The softball field bids were approved for Astro turf, and the project should be completed during the month of September.

Lastly, new flowers have been planted at the entrances to Sun City, which the committee is very pleased with.

**Special Projects:** Nine additional security cameras have been installed throughout the community from the original list. Tavern at the Falls Restaurant could be closed for construction this

month. Work will start as soon as permits issued from the city are completed.

New Business: There was discussion on new furniture for the Summit Restaurant. Also, SCSCAI Board member and committee member Karl Wiedemann discussed new flag designs and displayed some proposed ideas. Committee members agreed to review more designs to see which one is the best fit for our Community. This item will be followed up on at the next CAP meeting.

**Old Business:** The Mountain Shadows LED retrofit project is almost complete. Widening the circle of the driveway at Tavern at the Falls was not approved by a vote of the Committee.

Team Leader Reports: Allan Bell received e-mails inquiring about cutting back shrubs and plant growth. Allan replied that due to summer growth, at this time it was best to do this during the fall. Diane Glismann requested that the table in the entry of the Pinnacle be put into storage. The storage room is full of chairs that need to be sold.

Murray Waks would like the floor of the Pinnacle Art Room to be replaced due to damage from chairs. The flooring in the ladies' locker room at the Pinnacle Fitness Center also needs to be repaired. Brandon will look into it. Rhoda Ring discussed the purchase of new chairs for the Pinnacle Restaurant.

Ed Turken would like the sound system at Desert Vista checked into to see what needs to be done to fix it. It was discussed that it needs to be fixed and re-set before each event. A member of our own maintenance staff members should be responsible for recalibrating the system before each event.

Amos Barcus wanted to look into getting placards installed under the pictures of the stars that are displayed at the Starbright Theatre hallways and entrances. Amos also wanted to look into cleaning the chimes at the Mountain Shadows bell tower, which was taken care of by Brandon.





# Charli's Corner

How to do a Perfect Seated Leg Press

sing the seated leg press machine is a great way to train your legs for strength and support for the many activities that you do during your day. We truly use our legs for everything we do from walking, golfing, playing sports to squatting to sit in a chair (or the toilet), getting in and out of the car, and in and out of the bath tub. Maintaining lower body strength is the most important thing you can do to stay mobile and independent. Using the leg press machine is an easy way to do that.

#### DO It Right:

- 1. Put your feet up on the foot plate with your shins parallel to the floor, hip distance apart with your knees at a 90-degree angle (or as close as you can get).
- 2. Place your entire back, hips and head on the seat back.
- 3. Press down through your heels and feet until your legs are extended all the way, while keeping your knees soft, but not locked.





4. Push slowly with a 2-second count, feeling your muscles engage. Return to starting position with a 2-second count.

#### DON'T Make These Common Mistakes:

- Tuck your chin and let your head lift off the seat back.
- Arch your lower back off the pad.
- Go too fast with your repetitions and use the momentum.
- Put your feet too low on the pad or too close together.

very year computers and their components are cheaper than the previous year. For example, the price of disk drives has dropped an incredible amount over the past few years. As a result of that decline in cost, new applications using computers become economically feasible. One of the goals of the Information Technology (IT) Committee is to identify areas in SCSCAI that can be made better, cheaper or faster as a result of the decline in the cost of computer technology. We recently replaced the entire SCSCAI telephone system at a hard dollar savings of more than \$3,000 per month, and the new system has a much greater feature set. Another project was the installation of Wi-Fi at our facilities. All those projects were made possible by the decline in the cost of computer technology.

Over the past few years, SCSCAI replaced the IT infrastructure including the wiring of our buildings that made those projects possible.



Change can be a good thing. As the motivational speaker Tony Robbins said, "If you do what you've always done, you'll get what you've always gotten." And the IT Committee is working hard on the behalf of SCSCAI to identify new areas that we can change and make life better in our community. The most recent focus is how to make it easier for staff and residents to get better access to our information, including such things as better websites and easier access to all the data residing on our computers.

Thanks to the support of the Board of Directors, we are making our IT systems better, cheaper, faster.

Do you know that by providing our Sun City Summerlin Association with your contact information you enable your Association to greatly aid you in times of emergencies and concern? The blue information form contained in this edition of the Link can help you in so many ways. This

information is completely secure and confidential. And it is essential to your well-being that it be kept up to date.

Examples of assistance come from past situations when an accident or illness has occurred. Such situations have included: When residents are away and there is an emergency situation at home such as a failed water heater; when children or others concerned about your welfare can not reach you as expected; when pets are left at a residence and you are unable to return in a timely manner to care for them; and when you might be in need of assistance at home.

Emergency contacts, with access to your home, may be trusted neighbors or friends living within Sun City Summerlin or the greater Las Vegas area. If you have no family in the immediate area, you are encouraged to list contact information for relatives who might be in charge of your affairs. You are most strongly urged to complete the enclosed blue form and turn it in to the Security Patrol Office, the Administration Office at Mountain Shadows, or to any Social Monitor. You will need to show your Sun City Summerlin ID card at the time you submit the form.

If you already have your emergency contact information on file, please be sure it is up to date.

#### **How Sun City Works**

#### Considering Running for the Board of Directors Next Year? Here's How to Start

To be a candidate for SCSCAI's Board of Directros, you must be a member of the Association in good standing. Stated more simply, you must be a property owner and not have any unpaid and past-due assessments. Once you pass that rather simple threshold, the rest of the procedure is straightforward.

- Notify the executive director in writing that you wish to be candidate.
- Complete the Association-provided candidate's form.
- Complete a statement to be distributed with the ballots where you state whether you are a member in good standing and whether or not you have any actual or

potential conflicts of interest as defined by state law.

Steps 1 and 2 must be completed and submitted by the last business day of November. Prior to the opening of the voting period, you will be invited to the Candidate's Night Residents' Forum, where you will have an opportunity to state your qualifications.

That's it. The rest is up to the electorate.

#### A Military Career, Times Two ~ Bob Cohen/Link

It is not unusual to find someone who has devoted his career to the military - a 20-year man. Less common is a veteran who completes his obligation in one service and then begins an entirely new one in the same uniform. Such is the story of recent Sun City resident John Grabowski, Jr., "Grabber" to his friends.

A native of the Pittsburgh area, John graduated from Duquesne University before enlisting in the Air Force OTS program to begin his first career. The year was 1964. He graduated as a 2nd lieutenant with an AFSC of Supply and Logistics officer and

was assigned to the SAC base on the shores of Lake Huron. That assignment lasted long enough to be promoted to 1st Lt. and assigned to a one-year tour at Vietnam's main Air Force base, Tan Son Nhut, near Saigon. His assignment: logistics officer for the 619th Tactical Supply Group, providing support to a string of radar stations located around the periphery of Vietnam. The year was 1966. Things were relatively quiet in the Saigon area. That is until Christmas Day, when Viet Cong sappers attacked the base. Hey, this was war and things happen in war. Nothing personal as far as Grabber was concerned; nothing personal until he learned that one of the attackers was his barber at the base, the same man who routinely trimmed his hair using a straight edge razor! It suddenly became very personal.

And, speaking of personal, while stationed there he met a Vietnam Navy nurse, Miko, whom he dated occasionally, just dating, nothing serious. His tour complete, Grabber returned to the States with an assignment at Nellis AFB near Las Vegas. The year was 1967. The assignment was still in the logistics area. Life was once more routine until he received a call from Miko. She was in California and the relationship was rekindled. As the saying goes, one thing led to another and they were married in mid-December 1967.

His second career was about to begin. The year was 1969. His initial four-year obligation was met and he was considering his future when a friend suggested changing fields and joining the Air Force Medical Service Corps. It sounded good and in January John was recommissioned as a captain, MSC. Thus began a series of schools and assignments that took him to bases all over the U.S. and a five-year hitch as a hospital administrator in Tachikawa and Yokota AFBs in Japan. John and his wife considered that the best assignment of all!

The year 1981 saw them assigned to Zaragoza, Spain, which was followed by an assignment to the Air War College in Montgomery, Ala. (John had previously obtained his Master's degree in business and hospital administration at the University of Florida.)

Following that was a promotion to (bird) Colonel and the assignment as an inspector general, which saw him on the road for 276 days in the first year. Finally, after completing an inter-service tour at the Defense Supply Agency and a tour in California, John retired with 27 years of service.

Las Vegas was now home and after another 13 years in the civilian workforce, he retired permanently. Sadly, Miko died in 2016. Grabber is committed to the SC life, where one of the first things he did was to join the Military & Friends Club, of course.

Over-watering | Quickest Way to Kill a Plant

ummer is here and the heat affects everyone and everything. When plants get too hot they will wilt. Don't freak out.



Before adding more water make sure they need it. Too much water will make the plants wilt even more and cause root rot. The biggest killer of plants is over-watering, especially during the summer. So, take the time to make sure your plants need the water before giving them more.

Moisture meters work great and you don't need to buy the most expensive ones, either.

Most will have a reading between I and IO and be color coded. Make sure if you use the meter you know what time the irrigation comes on. It will be wet right after the water cycle and drier before. Keep this in mind before adding water or lowering the water. Usually, if a plant starts dying from the outer leaves in, that's due to not having enough water; if it dies from the inside out, that's too much water.



n the vein of keeping up with the times, the Link has undergone several changes over the past few months in hopes it will keep Sun City's official magazine moving forward while increasing the amount of information provided to residents.


The first change to the magazine came by way of increased pages. Steady advertising sales proferred an opportunity to add four pages to the monthly product and therefore expand community coverage. The Link Committee added several new features to the magazine that focus on helping new residents navigate the Association in How Sun City Works; pays a nod to history in Now and Then; and honors residents for their military service to the United States in Thank You for Your Service.

The biggest change, however, has been to the magazine's website, www.suncitylink.com. The site, which launched four years ago and enjoys a dedicated following on its Tuesday Newsday e-blasts, has rebranded to "Think Link." Reminder e-blasts still go out every Tuesday morning with a clickable link to the website. Once residents sign on, what they will discover is a brand new look that features a photo gallery; a searchable key word menu; an expanded classifieds section, where residents can download ad forms and place their ads via email; and community columnists, who offer insights into shopping and dining deals, cigars, video poker, day trips, history, humor and more.

The key to navigating the site is what insiders call the "hamburger" or box menu adjacent to the Table of Contents label (located at the top left of the screen). By clicking on the

hamburger, visitors will be able to turn the pages to read what's going on in the Home, About Us, Community, Classifieds, Clubs, Club Calendar, Advertisers and Archive sections.

A neat feature on the Home tab is Top Picks of the Week, where editors help residents fill out their weekly calendars by recommending fun things to do.

In About Us, readers will find the website's mission statement, an introduction to the staff and volunteers, as well as a way to contact the magazine in case you'd like to get involved in the creative process.

The Clubs section features video spotlights of Sun City clubs on a dedicated YouTube channel, where videos will be archived under an SC LINK prefix and have a shareable feature so you can forward them to your friends and family on Facebook and other social media outlets. The page also displays a live club calendar that allows club representatives to post monthly club meetings and cancellation notices on one centrally located site. Next month, the Link will work with the Residents' Forum to introduce this powerful new feature. Club presidents should plan on attending the Forum on September 13.

Visitors also will notice an expanded section on Link advertisers, where you can get to know the businesses that support our community. A new advertiser story will be featured every week.

Last but not least, analytics are working behind the scenes that enable staff to track visitor traffic. This will help editors see what sections work and which ones need improvement.

### SO YOU WANT TO SING?

### What's the Difference Between the Musicmakers and the Silvertones?

o, you just moved into Sun City Summerlin and used to sing in the choir back home, or you just like to sing in the shower. You scan through your first issue of the Link and see that there are two singing groups, the Musicmakers and the Silvertones. And you wonder why.

As a resident of Sun City, you are allowed to attend two meetings of each of the community's 79 clubs without charge to see if you would like to join its membership.

If you go to the Silvertones, you will find out that Hal Denham is the president of the Club and George Pucine is the musical director. When asked to describe the Club to new residents for the purpose of this article, Hal said "The Silvertones is a singing group that has a harmony section that provides more options for the members. It gives some of them a chance to do solos or duets."

The Silvertones has about 65 members.

Hal is also a member of the Musicmakers and said, "The Musicmakers do four-part harmony (soprano, alto, tenor and bass), and their music has some foreign influence and

is, sometimes, more classical." Hal further explained that the Musicmakers' music is "more disciplined."

As the musical director for the Silvertones, George selects the music for the shows, and in his arranging is tasked with getting the music to fit the capabilities of his singers. He told us, "If you like to sing and cannot read music, you're welcome into the Silvertones."

The Musicmakers are a bit different. The Club's president is Pat Vaughn and the musical director is Dennis Gazso. Pat described the music of the Musicmakers as: "We sing different parts and the MusicMakers like to challenge their ability in the arena of vocal music." Pat is very proud of her group of talented people and added, "They are very dedicated to our music."

Dennis pointed out that their music is very eclectic and therefore a little bit more varied. In its last show, the Musicmakers performed pieces from John Denver, the Beach Boys and Vivaldi (sung in Latin).

In researching this article, I found some people who were members of both singing groups, so I asked them why they decided to join the group they did. Here is what they said:

Sam Mastripolito reminded me that "In order to sing for the Musicmakers you have to go through an audition and know how to read music. The Musicmakers are more disciplined, and it's harder work. The Silvertones are more social and sing familiar music."

Dorothy Macchio said, "The Silvertones sing the oldies of our generation that people are more familiar with like show tunes and the movies." On the other hand, "The Musicmakers sing classical choral music. I love singing in both groups because I love singing oldies, but I also love the four-part harmony of the Musicmakers."

Eileen Cox, one of the newest members of both groups (she just moved here a year ago and joined the Silvertones and the Musicmakers within a week), loves what she is doing and she is so enthusiastic. "I'm in both groups, but for different reasons, and both of them are fun and wonderful!" Eileen said.

Another of the multi-talented people who is in both groups is Roger Storkamp. "I like the popular music of the

Silvertones, which includes selections from movies and Broadway, while the Musicmakers sing polyphonic (four-part harmony) songs, which are unique and classical.

"Dennis selects pieces to challenge the group, while George adapts the music to his group," Roger said.

Linda Van Horn, a member of both groups, explained, "The Musicmakers is a smaller group (about 25 to 30) with people who read music and like to sing the different parts."

The last person I spoke with was Mary Ruth Webb, who

just loves music. Mary is a member of the Silvertones and goes to all of the Musicmakers' concerts. Mary is also the last of the original Silvertones, who has been singing for more than 20 years in the community. She just celebrated her 90th birthday!

In the end, if you love music, either group or both can be for you. It just depends on how much time you have to devote to one set of clubs. Because, remember, there are another 77 you might want to look into joining.


