or most Americans, celebrating By Molly Sher/Link Independence Day or July 4, is

an expression of pride and joy for the United States of America. This is reflected in quotes, by some of history's greatest men:

"And so, my fellow Americans: ask not what your country can do for you - ask what you can do for your country. My fellow citizens of the world: ask not what America will do for you, but what together we can do for the freedom of man." – John F. Kennedy

"For to be free is not merely to cast off one's chains, but to live in a way that respects and enhances the freedom of others." – Nelson Mandela

"May all of you as Americans never forget your heroic origins, never fail to seek Divine guidance, and never lose your natural God-given optimism." – Ronald Reagan

Traditionally, the pomp and circumstance of this holiday have always included fireworks. How did fireworks, previously known as "illuminations," become a Fourth of July tradition? Was the birth of our nation also the birth of using fireworks for important holidays? Who was the first to use this display to mark significant occasions, and where did fireworks come from?

At first glance, it appears that we can thank John Adams, who overwhelmed with the significance of the 13 colonies, reviewed a draft of a declaration of independence composed by Thomas Jefferson. John Adams wrote to his wife Abigail, of his excitement. "The Second Day of July 1776, will be the most memorable Epocha in the History of America," Adams wrote. "I am apt to believe that it will be celebrated, by succeeding Generations, as the great anniversary festival. It ought to be solemnized with Pomp and Parade, with Shews, Games, Sports, Guns, Bells, Bonfires and Illuminations, from one End of this Continent to the other, from this Time forward forever more."

("Epocha" is an archaic word for epoch. "Shews" is an archaic word for "shows").

John Adams was off by a couple of days. On July 4, after making a total of 86 small changes to Jefferson's draft, the Continental Congress officially adopted the Declaration of Independence. Most delegates didn't actually sign it until August 2. The first organized celebration of Independence Day would take place in Philadelphia, on July 4, 1777.

Upon further investigation on the history of fireworks, one finds that somewhere between 600 AD and 900 AD, Chinese alchemists experimented with using gun powder and bamboo, filling the bamboo with the powder, and throwing them into a fire pit. Steel dust or cast-iron shavings were added to make the explosion sparkle. This form of "fireworks" was used to scare off evil spirits at New Year's festivities and at weddings.

Both the recipe for gun powder and fireworks made their way west, with the Mongols after the Silk Road opened and trade began in the 13th century.

Pyrotechnics became a common manner of celebration for pageants and plays in Europe. In England, King Henry VII included fireworks at his wedding to Elizabeth of York in 1486, which is considered the first known use of the displays



at a national celebration. Queen Elizabeth I was a huge admirer of fireworks, and even appointed a "Fire Master of England" to oversee productions.

By the 18th century, the displays had grown extravagant, with the likes of King Louis XIV and Peter the Great using them

for every important occasion. The use of fireworks became a popular way to celebrate national prosperity and patriotism.

John Adams was not the first in his suggestion of using fireworks, but in his letter, Adams was announcing to his wife the birth of a brand new nation, and suggested the most popular form of celebration of his time: the fireworks. In 2016, the U.S. Census Bureau reported that \$296.2 million worth of fireworks were imported from China to the United States; fireworks are still connected to their origins, it seems.

There is a lot to be said about the joy that a spectacular firework display evokes in people. On a lighter note, that joy might be expressed in a rather popular song:

'Cause baby you're a firework, Come on, show 'em what you're worth Make 'em go "Oh, oh, oh," As you shoot across the sky Baby, you're a firework, Come on, let your colors burst Make 'em go "Oh, oh, oh" You're gonna leave 'em all in awe, awe, awe - "Firework" by Katy Perry Happy Fourth of July, everyone!

COMMUNITY STANDARDS Attention Golf Course Homeowners

he SCSCAI Development Standards make it very clear that if you live on a golf course lot, no wall or yard feature higher than three (3) feet will be permitted within fifteen (15) feet of a property line bordering a golf course or green belt.

Landscape plants and shrubs in the same location must be maintained to a maximum height of three (3) feet.

In short, NOTHING (including bushes or any landscape accessory) taller than three (3) feet is allowed in the fifteen (15) foot setback from the property line (on the golf course or green belt) towards your home.

Also, wrought iron fencing or a combination of wall with a minimum of two (2) feet of wrought iron fencing on top may be built to a maximum height of five (5) feet on property lines bordering golf courses or green belts.

Is Your Home Safe? Important Safety Tips From Las Vegas Fire and Rescue

one, do not hesitate to call 911 for help. Most of us are unable to grab hold and lift someone else back up safely, but Rescue can do that. With the sophisticated communication system available to them, the dispatchers will find you the closest rescue unit quickly and when they arrive, it will be determined if you need to be further evaluated. Every Rescue vehicle has a certified emergency medical technician and other paramedics on board. They actually bring the hospital emergency room to your doorstep. You can thank a television show in the 1970's for this



t is exciting to share information from Timothy Szymanski, one of the most dedicated first responders in our community. Tim has worked with Las Vegas Fire and Rescue for fifty-one years and now serves as the Public Education and Information Officer. He and his fellow officers are ALWAYS sitting in stations 24/7, waiting for calls to help

valley citizens. It is difficult to decide what to mention as the most important points, everything we discussed seemed very significant.

> Falls. Of great consequence to residents of Sun City is the subject of falls. We seem to be talented in the art of going from standing to melting in a heap on the floor or sidewalk. If this happens to you or a loved

huge change in responses as "Emergency" came on the small screen and communities decided to follow the example portrayed in our living rooms. As 95% of the calls to Fire and Rescue are medical, do not ever feel embarrassed about dialing 911.

If it is just a matter of setting a person back up on their feet and nothing else appears amiss, the rescue team heads back to the station to wait for the next call. There will be no charge to the individual who called for help. If, however, the team determines there may be an underlying cause, these units can stabilize a patient and transport to the hospital. There is a charge for this service and they do accept Medicare.

What if you fall at home and you are alone?! Tim says your best friend can be your cell phone. Carry that phone with you AT ALL TIMES. 20,000 (that is twenty thousand) folks lose their lives in this country every year because they were not able to contact anyone after a fall. He also mentioned there is now a watch available that automatically alerts five pre-programmed telephone numbers if the wearer takes a tumble.

One other strong suggestion from him is to wear a bike helmet (or similar) if you spend time walking our neighborhoods. A very small brain bleed can be fatal if you fall and hit you unprotected skull. Also if you are experiencing chest pains, the Rescue units could save your life! Again, please call for help right away and give the responders the best present they get, plenty of time to help you.

As we begin the subject of fire, we need to look at some of the main causes; cooking, electrical and smoking.

Smoking. Addressing smoking we need to realize that as cigarettes went out of style for many reasons, smoking calls went down. Now there is marijuana. Very important for those indulging to remember that the ONLY place it is legal to smoke that substance is inside your home, not on the patio, not in the garage. Tim strongly recommends a metal container with water in it, to catch your ashes and butts. Garage makes the list as a possible location of flammable materials, not the least being the gasoline in any parked vehicles. Smoking is the leading cause of fatal fires.

Cooking. Next up is cooking. Around the holidays, particularly Thanksgiving, Fire and Rescue goes out on an abundance of calls when homes fill up with carbon monoxide or emissions from all of the cooking areas. Please consider this important suggestion open windows every hour to dissipate all the builtup possible discharge of gasses before they turn into an emergency. Then enjoy the holiday feast! Never cook in the garage, see smoking for reason.

Electrical. Not all surge protector electrical plugins are made equal. This is a great area to consider purchasing the best available. Although Sun City homes are well built, the electrical systems never were planned for all of the electronics so many of us use today. Look around your home or get a professional electrician to help you use your outlets correctly.

Part II of this discussion will appear in the coming months to include smoke detectors. "So much information, not enough space."



Fascia and Flexibility

lexibility is the theme for the Health & Fitness Department during the months of July, August, and September.

Flexibility refers to range of motion of your joints and the ability to move freely and without pain. We know that when you lack flexibility, it becomes more difficult to perform both simple and complex tasks. Eventually, your body will begin to compensate for this lack and will adapt, altering your movement patterns to perform these tasks safely and without pain. Externally, this can result in adaptations like poor posture


or a shuffling walk. Internally, it results in tight muscles and tight, dense fascia.

What is Fascia?

Fascia – is a sheet of connective tissue covering or binding together body structures. Fascia surrounds the muscles, organs, bones, tendons, and ligaments and is arranged throughout the body like a web. This article focuses on myofascial pain and tightness. "Myo" relates to muscles and "fascial" relates to fascia.

Fascia is organized in a series of "lines" that facilitate your movement patterns in everything you do, helping the body move as a unit. For instance, the Superficial Back Line runs along the back of your body from the bottom of your feet to the top of your neck. The Lateral Line frames the sides of your body and extends from the center of the foot, running up the outside of the leg and thigh, crisscrossing up the side of the torso, over the shoulder and ends near the ear.

Once you understand how fascia is organized, you can easily see how low back pain or shoulder imbalances may actually be caused by problems in the feet. If one area of the fascia is tight, it can reduce flexibility throughout the entire line. When you stop

tivity, the muscle fascia will start to bind together and become tight, limiting mobility and causing painful "knots". For more information on fascial lines and their purpose, Google "fascial lines" or "myofascial lines".

> When experiencing painful mobility, it can be difficult to determine whether the problem is your muscles, joints, fascia, or some combination. There are currently no imaging tests, lab work, or blood work that can diagnose myofascial

pain. A physical examination of your muscles is required, usually by a healthcare provider that specializes in physical medicine and rehabilitation.

Non-pharmaceutical therapies include hands-on manual therapy and specific stretching techniques. Some of these are listed below.

Myofascial Release is a type of physical therapy that focuses on reducing pain by relieving the tension and tightness in the trigger points.

Foam Rolling is a form of self-myofascial release and involves massaging your own fascia tissue to relieve the stress and tension with the use of a dense foam roller.

Fascial Stretches help to relieve fascial tightness and tension. One key difference with these stretches is that once in position, you will hold these stretches for a minute or more.

Treatment plans generally involve more than one therapy and can include others like heat therapy, yoga therapy, and acupuncture.

If this article has piqued your interest or has left you with more questions, you are in luck. In August, we will hold a Foam Rolling Workshop where you can learn about foam rolling and how to do it. Also, Kika Stretch Studios will provide a seminar/demo of their unique stretching technique. We have also added an Active Stretch class to our schedule.







was born in downtown Los Angeles, in the California Hospital on 16th and Hope Street. So, a true native I am. I grew up living in the "Valley". No freeways, acres of orange trees, and what I thought was a long walk to school and back.

Being a Magazine Coordinator was never on my bucket list/career path. I felt so grown up! I often still miss the hustle and bustle of a down-town environment.

I learned about printing at the elbow of my father who was a print jobber. His specialty was the hotel/motel and restaurant field. I learned bookkeeping, shipping, inventory control, hand wrote liquor inventory books, and customer service in the small office supply store that he owned. Also, in the bindery in the back of the shop where the forms were printed. This was a great foundation for me. Many jobs over many years.

In 1980 while visiting my brother in Las Vegas, I was offered a job at the old MGM hotel during a visit to the gift shop. Never thought I would have an interview in a tube top and shorts. I said "yes" to the job and moved here. I then went into department store management and eventually became a Divisional Manager with Bullocks. I have owned my own Cross-Stitch and Needlepoint store here in Las Vegas. Whew, I have worked a long time. Thought I was retiring in 2006 with a part time job with Michaels. A friend recommended me to become the office manager for a printing and mail house. It was there that I first met the Link magazine. Now I am working as the Link Magazine Coordinator. 





CLUB SPUGHT SPANESHE CLUB



embers of the Spanish Club were eager to resume their weekly lessons on Friday mornings in Sun Shadows to learn Spanish and, as soon as the COVID-19 restrictions were lifted, they started meeting again on June 4th.

Depending on the proficiency of the member, the club divides its classes into three groups; beginner, intermediate conversation, and advanced. Beginner classes start with the basics of learning vocabulary and elementary grammatical rules. As one progresses, members "graduate" to the intermediate conversation class and then on to the advanced class, where members converse in Spanish, expand their vocabulary and practice using different tenses to improve fluency. As one's ability to speak and understand Spanish improves, members are encouraged to attend both the basic and the more advanced classes as they transition.

Joan Jones, who moved to Sun City in 2001, has been teaching classes in Sun Shadows for the past 19 years. Joan teaches beginner and advanced classes. Joan's beginner class uses a book called "Spanish Now", which combines language lessons with historical and cultural content. Joan believes learning Spanish is important not only when traveling to other countries, but also to understand the customs of other cultures.

Dania Alvarez, who moved to the USA from Cuba 62 years ago and has been living in Sun City for 23 years, teaches the intermediate conversation class. Dania runs her classes in a lighter, more informal, and humorous way. She does not use a book, but rather encourages the club members to converse in Spanish.
