From the Executive Director

2014-2015 Budget Preparation

Each year, the Board of Directors must consider how much money it is going to need to govern, administer and maintain Sun City Summerlin Community Association, Inc. The process of adopting an operating budget is the same whether it is for an association, a city council or Congress. With January upon us, the budget process is in full swing for SCSCAI. This is a very detailed and involved process by not only the Association's staff, but for the Finance Committee and the Board of Directors.

Each of the managers who oversee his or her specific department-maintenance, golf, golf course maintenance, landscape, fitness, community services, Link, IT, security patrol, food and beverage and Administration-works closely with myself and the director of finance to review current budget numbers. This includes capital expenditure and reserves, which results in final projected budget numbers

for the upcoming budget year for SCSCAI. Once the figures have been finalized by each department head, the budget is forwarded to and reviewed by the finance committee. If accepted, the finance committee then makes a recommendation to the Board of Directors for approval.

Traffic Laws Apply In Sun City Summerlin

This month I ask you to do something that should be near and dear to all of us. Simply, S-T-O-P at stop signs, and proceed with caution after stopping. Our residents are getting injured and even killed because some of us are not stopping at stop signs located throughout our community. The Board of Directors prevailed on its request to the city to install blinking lights at busy intersections; we asked for more law enforcement; we brought in Metro representatives to speak to us; and we published articles in the Link. Despite all that, people are still running stop signs; and accidents and injuries still happen because people are not stopping at stop signs. Is saving 15 seconds worth injuring someone? How will you feel if you seriously injure or kill someone? What if that injured person were someone riding in the car with you—your wife, husband, daughter or grandchild? In addition to injury, how about considering the legal and financial consequences?

When asked why they did not. stop, some residents have responded, "I don't have to stop. I live here."

Actually, you **DO** have to stop. We here in Sun City Summerlin **DO NOT** own the streets. As I have said before, we are an open community and the city owns the streets and enforcement thereof, and all traffic laws apply.

So, please, **S-T-O-P** at the stop signs!

7 CANDIDATES VYING FOR 2014 BOD SEATS

The election committee is preparing to conduct the annual election of Sun City directors. This year, Tuesday, February 25, is designated as Election Day. Counting of the ballots will be on Wednesday, February 26. Five positions will be filled. Each home has FIVE (5) votes that may be cast for one candidate or divided among all in any manner desired. It is critical that not more than FIVE (5) votes are marked.

Ballots (part of the mailing label) and a return envelope will be included in your February Link. The ballot instructions are on the back of the address portion of the mailer. The ballot portion is perforated so the name and address can be removed by tearing it off at the perforations. After you mark your votes on this ballot, remove the address portion and insert the ballot into the envelope so that the bar code shows through the window in the envelope. It may then be mailed to the Administration Office, Mountain Shadows community center, 9107 Del Webb Blvd., Las Vegas, NV 89134, or save Sun City the cost of postage by personally depositing your ballot in the ballot box at Mountain Shadows. If you mail your ballot, it must arrive no later than 5 p.m. on February 25. A polling place will be set up in the Exchange Room at Mountain Shadows on Tuesday, February 25, from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Be sure to bring your Sun City identification card to show at the poll. The polls for voting will close at 5 p.m. on February 25.

Should you lose or accidentally destroy your ballot, another can be obtained at the Administration Office. Before requesting a replacement ballot, be certain that another member of your household has not already voted. If two ballots are received from the same household, BOTH will be voided. Also, if more than FIVE (5) votes are marked on a ballot, all votes will be voided.

hey gather every day around 3 p.m. at the greenbelt at the corner of Button Willow Drive and Sun City Boulevard. They know each other and their four-legged counterparts by name, smiling and waving hello as each approach the concrete benches located in the middle of the grassy area.

The conversations run quick and animated among the humans as one puppy causes a ruckus, teases two canine buddies and the three zip off, lightning-quick, up the hill.

The ritual involves an opportunity for the pooch pod to touch base and visit for a spell. Someone brings a bowl of water to help replenish the thirsty pups and there are always lots of treats.

"We meet every day and some of us even go out to dinner every Friday night," said Linda Habel. "She is a grandma to that one and picks him up every day from her daughter to come and play with us," Linda added, pointing to Marcy Ishum. "The bigger dogs come earlier, and this time is for us and the little guys," said Bob Dawson.

Whether part of an organized group or not, Sun City residents love their pets. Dog owners can be seen enjoying several of the dog areas located throughout out the community or exercising their pups day and night, while cat owners make sure their kitties are well fed and cozy. Responsible pet ownership is key, and SCSCAI has guidelines in place designed to keep pets safe and healthy; not to mention pleasant neighbors.

POOPER SCOOPER

Despite numerous articles in the Link, public notices and word of mouth, this four-letter word seems to fuel the most ire among residents, dog owners or not, and rightly so. In fact, it's the biggest generator of negative feelings associated toward dogs. While the answer seems simple: Pick up after your pet, the reality of it happening occurs only a percentage of the time. And, if it happens during a walk some dog owners either leave the bagged contents on the side of the road for someone else to pick up, or in a neighbor's trash can – both unacceptable options.

Basically, it boils down to two words – sanitation, obvious, and the law. According to Las Vegas Animal Control, failure to promptly clean animal waste from public property or the property of others is a misdemeanor.

SAFETY

Restrain your dog. It just makes sense. If your dog is on a leash, it is less likely to wander away and consume something harmful or poisonous, is less likely to bite or attack someone or another dog, or get attacked by a coyote. Likewise, Las Vegas Animal Control enforces a leash law.

SOMETIMES YOU SHOULD LET HIM BARK


Heed the warning if your best friend starts barking late at night. Don't tell him to be quiet. Your dog's hearing is more acute than yours. He may sense something wrong outside that you can't see or hear. A barking dog could mean that someone is prowling outside your home in the darkness. A burglar won't go near a home with a barking dog inside.

Other times you must stop him from barking. According to Community Standards Director Kate Carroll, if her office gets a complaint about a persistently barking dog, a courtesy notice is sent to the offending dog owner. The notice advises that a complaint has been filed and asks the dog owner to try to resolve the situation that is disturbing neighbors. If the problem cannot be resolved amicably, Community Standards' personnel will provide the

complainant with Animal Control's contact information.

According to Las Vegas Animal Control, the owner of a dog that barks excessively may be subpoenaed to appear at a civil hearing and subject to being fined if not corrected.

If talking with the owner has not solved the problem, Animal Control will send a letter to the pet owner. After the third complaint within six months, both parties will be referred to the Clark County Justice Center for mediation to resolve the problem. Persons submitting a written statement must appear at the civil hearing.

Sun City Summerlin Security Patrol's pet officer Janet May says, "Talk with your vet. The probability of having your lost dog returned is greatly increased if it has an implanted microchip. You'll never regret doing it, but you might regret it if you don't."

The microchip, usually implanted in the scruff of a dog or cat's neck, is only as big as a grain of rice. It's done very quickly and there should be no more discomfort to the pet than getting a routine injection. The cost runs from \$30 to \$50, depending on your veterinarian and the registration plan you select. The higher charge applies to a lifetime identification registration with no annual fee for cor-recting the information if you change your address. The vet's office does all the paperwork associated with the process. Changing the information associated with the microchip can be done online or by telephone. Most

veterinarians, including those located in and around Sun City Summerlin, do micro-chipping and do not charge for checking a lost pet for micro-chipped identification.

As soon as you know that your pet is missing, or if you find a lost pet, call Security Patrol, 254-2303. As quickly as you report your lost pet, Patrol drivers will help you look for it. Give your pet's description and its last known location to the Patrol dispatcher. And please remember to let Security Patrol know if a previously lost pet is found, or comes home on its own, so that Patrol members won't continue to worry and watch for it.

FIVE FERAL CATS: MY PRESENT IS THEIR FUTURE

Nearly three years ago, I took responsibility for having a colony of feral cats trapped, spayed, neutered and health-checked. While they were under anesthetic, each had his or



her right ear tipped identifying them as TNR (Trapped, Neutered, Returned) feral cats. After the cats were neutered and treated, they were returned to where they came from, my neighborhood. These had not been my cats, but they became my responsibility. I also have two indoor cats that my husband and I adopted as kittens.

A socialized domestic cat is friendly towards people and enjoys companionship with us in our homes. A feral cat is fearful of people and wants only to live on its own outdoors. A feral cat cannot be tamed as an indoor house cat. It is not adoptable. It will not let anyone pet, or even touch it.

When feral cats are trapped, neutered, inoculated and released back to where they came from, they will no longer leave their scent to mark their territory. ... they are more docile.

Well-meaning individuals often tell me that, instead of re-releasing them, we should have found homes for the cats after they were neutered. That is not an option. It is difficult to find forever homes for friendly socialized cats. No one will adopt a feral cat. They must be released. A feral cat is wild, untrusting of humans. It will not live indoors. Left to survive on its own, a feral cat usually lives less than two years. If a cat is lucky enough to be part of a colony that has a caretaker who provides spaying and neutering, regular feeding and shelter, it can live a content life for more than 10 years.

When feral cats are trapped, neutered, inoculated and released back to where they came from, they will no longer leave their scent to mark their territory. The males do not fight over females, they are more docile. They cannot breed, or multiply to potential great numbers.

I feed the outdoor cats every morning and every evening. They always have fresh drinking water on my porch and inside my garage. They have warm beds, jungle gyms to climb and toys to play with. Every cat has a name and is loved. The garage door stays open at the bottom for the cats to shelter inside from harsh weather. They are five healthy, thriving outdoor cats and I am grateful to be their care-taker. They don't bother anyone; my neighbors never complain about them and it is rewarding to see them live, play together and be happy.



New Year, New Projects Keep CAP Volunteers Busy

As the New Year arrives, your CAP committee has many projects in the works:

- 1. The landscape strategic plan is in the process of being approved by the Board of Directors. This plan sets guidelines for the amount and placement of vegetation. SCSCAI staff will use this plan to develop a detailed cost and timeline strategy for both the golf courses and common areas that will reduce the amount of vegetation to reflect the beauty of the desert, as well as save 20 percent in water usage over the next three years.
- **2.** The green committee meets with staff to find ways to reduce electric and gas usage. The committee is looking at electric usage on the golf courses as it relates to pumps

and fountains. This year it also will look at solar heating for our swimming pools. Outdoor pools use a lot of gas to heat the water during the last two weeks of October because the nights got so cold. While solar power has seen much advancement recently, the committee will determine if it has advanced enough to be cost effective.

3. CAP is recommending that something drastic be done to the Desert Vista parking lot as it is peeling and has many large cracks that keep getting bigger. A 2006 engineer's report noted that the parking lot needed to be dug up, re-compacted and covered with 4 inches of new surface. CAP has recommended the Board of Directors get bids from several paving companies before deciding

whether to spend approximately \$400,000 on the project. The concern is the parking lot will not get better and it is getting worse. SCSCAI received money from the original contractor to fix the problem several years ago, but has delayed the work due to the high cost.

4. CAP is looking at designs for better signage of upcoming events, so there could be something more attractive than plastic-wrapped A-frames.

5. Better lighting is being considered at the main entrance to Mountain Shadows for visibility and also in the parking lot at Sun Shadows. Look for a solution to this soon.

These are just a few of the special projects in the works with CAP. Come to our next meeting and learn more, get involved or voice your opinion. Volunteers are welcome.

Landscape

New Look Yields Low Water Use

In an ongoing effort to find ways to conserve water throughout Sun City Summerlin, the Landscape Department, working with direction from the Common Area Properties Committee, began a streetscape project in October along the median in front of Mountain Shadows community center. The project, which took approximately one month to complete, is located near the intersection of Del Webb Boulevard and Echo Mesa Drive.

According to Landscape Director Louis Darling, during the summer months the project will yield a savings of 126 gallons of water a day. "As we do more areas throughout Sun City, the water savings will start to add up," he said.

Louis explained that the three large terra cotta urns were filled with sand and concreted into place. Inside the vessels, Louis chose to display Pampas grass and blooms from desert spoons. The colorful gravel pattern comprises stones of varying size and boulders made of cherry mist and canyon red for impact. The winding rock wall was inspired by indigenous Native American symbols.





"We are still looking at other landscape materials and art that will add more color to the area," Louis said.

In addition, a new irrigation system with separate lines to service the palms and any future plantings was installed. As for the new stout palms, they were relocated from the median along Sun City Boulevard across from the Desert Vista community center. Transplanting the palms enabled the Association to save money on the purchase of new trees, while ensuring that street signs remain highly visible. Over the years, Louis said, the palms had grown to the point where they were beginning to block some traffic signs.

Having a Plan Best Way to Deal With Disaster

Although Sun City Summerlin is a safe and healthy community, it is wise for all citizens to prepare for natural and man-made disasters. The "Citizens Keeping Your Family Safe" during a disaster hand book has been compiled to help individuals, families and neighborhoods prepare and respond to a disaster. By reading the checklist and following each section carefully, you can prepare your own personal family disaster plan.

The main focus of the guide, available from the Community Preparedness Committee, is to address the following questions:

- How should I prepare for a disaster?
- What should I do if a disaster occurs?

What is a disaster? According to Webster's Dictionary, a disaster is "Any event that overwhelms existing resources to deal with the event." A disaster can be natural or manmade. Individually, it may be a home burglary or a power outage. Within a neighborhood, it could be flash-flooding, high winds or a hazardous material spill that limits access in and out of your home, fitness center or shopping areas. Disaster within our community may be anything from fire to flooding to high winds to terrorists.

Your Sun City Summerlin Community Preparedness Committee works very closely with

the emergency management unit of Clark County to identify all hazards and provide information to the community with regard to each. Working with neighbors can save lives and property.

- Meet with your neighbors to plan how the neighborhood can work together after a disaster, until help arrives.
- If you are a member of a neighborhood organization, club or community activities group, introduce disaster preparedness as a new activity.
- Know your neighbors' special skills (i.e., medical or technical) and consider how you could help neighbors who have special needs, such as disabled and so forth.

Where will your family be when a disaster strikes? They could be anywhere—at home, work, the fitness center or in their car. How will you find each other? Your family may not be together when a disaster strikes. You need to plan how to contact one another and what you will do in different situations.

Disaster can strike quickly and without warning.

It can force you to evacuate your neighborhood, or confine you to your home. What would you do if basic services like water, gas, electricity and telephones were all cut off?

Local authorities and relief workers will be on the scene after a disaster, but they cannot reach everyone



right away. Knowing what to do is your best protection and your responsibility.

While reading the guide, remember one major factor: Cell towers will be cut off locally and land lines may be cut as well. So designate a family member or friend who lives away from you who can call and let everyone know you're OK, where you are and where you may be heading. Give this person's phone number to all immediate family members.

Most importantly, remember that planning now brings relief to those we love and to those who love us.

Recruit Orientation Teaches How to Serve Safely and Efficiently

In November, a group of new patrol volunteers had their initial training class. Three veteran Patrol members — assistant training officer Janet Moseley, head driver Dick Clark and head dispatcher Silvia LaMay — were the instructors. Dick emphasized that Patrol members' safety is priority one when they assist Sun City residents and Association personnel, as well as Las Vegas police, fire and emergency responders. Metro's Northwest Area Commander Captain Christopher Tomaino reads the Link and maintains an excellent working relationship with Security Patrol.

Accompanied by a seasoned trainer, every recruit works three on-the-job shifts and their new skills are reviewed at a checkout session. A checklist confirms that new volunteers have had training in all appropriate support

areas. New volunteers must serve five solo shifts — each four hours long — to earn a training-completed ribbon and be issued a full uniform. Patrol administrators want reassurance that members are committed and competent. Every patrol shift involves different responsibilities, detailed in a procedures manual, which each member is issued to keep. The manual is a comprehensive how-to book developed from years of past experiences. Veteran Patrol members also are required to attend at least one refresher training class a year.

Training for members emphasizes the Patrol's mission to provide 24/7 surveillance throughout the community, while observing and reporting questionable individuals or any unusual situation. New volunteers are shown how to check the outside of vacationing residents' homes to make sure doors and windows are secure and nothing else is awry. They also learn how to approach residents

MONTHLY STATS

In one month, Patrol members alerted residents to 306 garage doors that were left open after dark. They did 465 house checks for vacationing residents and gave directions to 254 visitors at the three information centers. The five patrol cars added 14,372 miles to their respective odometers.

whose garage doors have been left open after dark. With experienced trainers, new drivers check the security of Association buildings and maintenance yards at night, as well as the information centers at community entrances. They're guided to help look for lost pets, as well as how to treat persons who may be lost or confused. It's also vital to review the services Patrol officers should not perform, such as providing medical treatment, or using Patrol cars to push or pull disabled cars.

When they are patrolling, new drivers are expected to wave to everyone they pass. The purpose is twofold: It is polite and reassuring to acknowledge residents; and, just in case it is someone whose intentions are not righteous, a wave from the Patrol driver lets a potential bad guy know that he has been seen and the driver can describe him and his car. Please don't hesitate to wave back to the Patrol driver.

Flying the Friendly Skies All In a Day's Work for Sun City's Dorothea Rizzo

orothea Rizzo, born in Berlin, Germany, was introduced to airplanes very early in her life. Unfortunately, as a child during the war years, she had to spend most of her nights in the cellar of her house with her mother and other people while airplanes from above brought bombs, destruction, fire and even death.

Many years later these airplanes brought travel and a glamorous life to Dorothea when she was hired by Pan American World Airways in New York.

Dorothea immigrated to the United States after she finished her education in Berlin. She settled in New York City and, after applying for a job at Pan American

Airways, she was sent to Miami for training. Training was rigorous and included learning about airplane safety, grooming and the art of preparing, cooking and serving meals to passengers. Food was presented on trays and real China, and had to be carried to each passenger individually since food carts had not yet been developed. Passengers were well dressed and there was an atmosphere of luxury, elegance and class.

After her training was complete, Dorothea shared an apartment with another German girl in Kew Gardens, a section in Queens, N.Y. Dorothea was soon offered a position in the special services department at John F. Kennedy Airport, handling VIPs. She remembers meeting many dignitaries, heads of state from around the world, movie stars and even members of the British and Iranian royal families. Pan Am handled Air Force One when it came to New York, and Dorothea met many members of the Kennedy family. She also worked at the glamorous Pan Am Clipper Club at JFK, where the elite came together prior to boarding their flights. Dorothea's most memorable experience was watching one of the many public fights between Eddie Fisher and Elizabeth Taylor. "I learned

words I had never heard before," she said.

Dorothea remembers severe winter storms that stranded passengers for days, requiring much patience and resourcefulness on the part of Pan Am personnel.

She met her husband, Frank, who was a Navy pilot at Pan Am after he left the service. She resigned from Pan Am in 1972 to raise her two children with the help of her husband. Unfortunately, Dorothea's husband died at an early age (54) from pancreatic cancer. After her children had grown up, Dorothea went back to the airlines and was hired by United Airlines in special services and the red carpet room. However, things were

rapidly changing in the airline business and the glamour and sophistication was disappearing. Dorothea retired from United Airlines in 2000 and moved to Sun City Summerlin. She joined the Sun City Tap Dance Company in 2004 and has performed in many of the club's shows at the Starbright Theatre. While she was with the Dance Company, she served as the social director for two years and was elected to the board as the secretary for two years. She resigned in 2010.

Dorothea also joined a line dance group in 2006, The Desert Spurs, which performs shows for assisted-living homes, talent shows, exhibitions and the yearly Ms. Senior Nevada pageant. She is still a member of this group of six ladies.

Dorothea has served on the board of her local sub-association as a secretary and has become familiar with the dos and don'ts of association life to keep Sun City Summerlin a beautiful and inviting place. She loves to entertain at home for friends with good food, wine and music, and she loves the life of leisure and beauty at Sun City Summerlin.
