Golf Course Vandalism



Residents are killing trees on the golf courses, especially on Highland Falls' 14th fairway. Five to seven trees were destroyed recently. This criminal act is done in the

name of a four-letter word - view.

No guarantee of a view was made by Del Webb. Resellers may have sold to residents on that premise. However, the destruction of Association property is a criminal offense, a violation of the law. These trees were not planted to punish those who live on the golf course; they provide a natural shield to protect golfers on an

adjacent fairway, to guard against injury to residents, or damage to residents' homes. The recent destruction of trees by residents has been for their own self-interest.

This is not the first time residents have destroyed Association property with criminal behavior. Lawabiding residents need to supply any information that will assist the Association in identifying these perpetrators. The Association will prosecute the residents involved to the fullest extent of the law.

The Association has no tolerance for this sort of action, and has a standing \$1,000 reward for information leading to the arrest and prosecution of any persons guilty of this type of criminal act.

Sun City Summerlin residents who subscribe to Internet crime reporting sites may not always be aware that the data they receive may be inclusive of a much larger search area than their immediate neighborhood, said Security Patrol Chief Bill Schoening, who receives regular burglary stats from such websites as Spot Crime and Alert ID, as well as information collected directly by Security Patrol members.

This possible misunderstanding may account for the large number of burglaries some residents cite when talking about the "rash" or "rampant" burglaries in Sun

City, Bill said. For example, when using Internet sites to obtain crime information, users must input a search parameter, which is usually a certain distance from a specific address. In most cases, two- and three-mile radiuses pull from neighborhoods outside Sun City, namely Desert Shores, The Trails and along Lake Mead Drive, Rampart Boulevard

and Cheyenne Avenue. The likelihood that some residents are reading burglary reports that include statistics from surrounding areas and mistaking them for happening in Sun City is a real possibility, Bill said.

Bill added that unlike Security Patrol members, residents are often unfamiliar with the names of Sun City streets. He said that Security Patrol officers meticulously study daily crime reports and are not seeing the high number of burglaries in the community that some residents insist are happening here. Bill does acknowledge that burglaries occur in Sun City and added that the Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department continues to rank Sun City among the lowest crime areas in the city.

Recently, while covering the community, a Security Patrol driver spotted the flashing lights of four Metro police cars parked outside a Sun City home. The Patrol driver asked police officers what was happening and if she could be of help – the Security Patrol's dispatcher often can provide vital information to police, allowing them to reach a designated contact person with information about a homeowner and, if a worrisome situation exists, the contact person can help police gain entry into the home. In this case, police officers advised the Patrol driver that the person inside the home had died.

Of course, the situation begs the question: Were there residents who saw the police activity and incorrectly assumed that a burglary had taken place?

Per Security Patrol policy, the driver radioed correct information to the dispatcher so that she could properly answer questions from any residents who might have called in.

> The Security Patrol is all about neighbors helping neighbors. If Security Patrol knows the facts of an incident occurring in Sun City, with respect to proper confidentiality concerns, they will share them with you.

Summer First Aid: Heat Exhaustion



Heat Cramps

Heat cramps are painful spasms in a muscle caused by excessive salt loss due to profuse sweating. Heat cramps are usually brought on by strenuous physical activity in extreme heat. The condition may occur by itself or as a symptom of heat exhaustion or heat stroke.

Treatment (and prevention) consists of the use of weak salt tablets or drinking enough of a weak salt solution (0.25 teaspoon of salt to a pint of cold water) to keep the urine pale.

Acclimation: Most heat disorders can be prevented by gradual acclimatization to hot conditions. Full acclimatization takes one to three weeks. It involves spending gradually longer periods in the heat, alternating with rest periods in cool conditions. Strenuous exercise should be avoided.

Heat Exhaustion

Heat exhaustion is defined by fatigue, sometimes culminating in collapse, caused by overexposure to heat.


It is most common in people unaccustomed to working in a hot environment. Unless treated, heat exhaustion may develop into heat stroke, which is a life-threatening condition.

Causes: There are three principal causes of heat exhaustion – insufficient water intake, insufficient salt intake and a deficiency in the production of sweat, the evaporation of which helps to cool the body.

Symptoms and Signs: Heat exhaustion causes fatigue, faintness, dizziness, nausea, restlessness, headache and, when salt loss is heavy, heat cramps in the legs, arms, back or abdomen. The skin is usually pale and clammy, breathing is fast and shallow, and the pulse is rapid and weak. Victims also may vomit or even faint.

Treatment: The victim should lie down in a cool place and, if conscious, should take 1 to 2 grams of sodium chloride (salt) or continual sips of a weak salt solution made up of 0.25 level teaspoon of salt to a pint of cold water. If the victim is unconscious, he or she should be placed in the recovery position until consciousness returns, when salt can be administered. With rest and replacement of lost water and salt, a full recovery usually takes place.

The landscape department maintains the grounds around the four recreation/fitness centers, as well as the three golf course pro shops. My staff works to keep up 10 parks/greenbelts and the main streets through and

around Sun City Summerlin, including Rampart, Lake Mead, Del Webb, Sun City, Anasazi and Thomas Ryan boulevards. I have certain workers who are assigned to particular areas, and the location they are assigned to is all they do unless a special project comes up.

For example, Mountain Shadows has a worker assigned to it named Victor, and Victor's goal at Sun City Summerlin is to make Mountain Shadows as beautiful as possible. Most crews are made up of one person, but some streets may have two workers depending on their size. This type of assigning helps provide a sense of pride among the workers, and residents will almost always see someone in their respective area.

In addition, a floating crew works on concrete and new landscaping projects, in addition to their assigned turf areas during the summer months. In the winter, they help other crews.

Hopefully, this will help everyone understand how we operate to keep Sun City Summerlin the beautiful community that it is.

Shock Attack:

Sound Effects Engineers Immortalize Jaws,' 'My Fair Lady,' 'Gunsmoke'

Do you remember what the top movie of the summer of 1975 was? It was "Jaws."

Now do you remember the opening sound: DAH – UMP DAH – UMP, DAH – UMP?

Well, we have three guys living in Sun City whose job it was to work with that sound in the sound labs of Zanuck/Brown Productions, the production company behind such unforgettable films as "The Sting" and "Cocoon." While they never saw the movie's stars – Roy Scheider, Richard Dreyfuss or the shark – they developed the key sound effects that terrified moviegoers that summer.

Vincent Melandri moved to Sun City from Los Angeles following his retirement in 1994; John Stacy began enjoying his golden years in Sun City in 1999; and Jeff Gall retired here in 1999.

Sitting poolside at the Pinnacle in April, the trio recounted their fondest film memories:

One of Vincent's first major movies was "My Fair Lady," starring Rex Harrison and Audrey Hepburn. His assignment was to supervise the sound transitions and dialogue dubbing. According to Vincent, Warner Brothers was experimenting with sound transmitters because Harrison wanted to do his dialogue "on the first take" instead of having sound engineers put the dialogue in after the movie was filmed. Since this was a new "science" in the movie industry (1964), the film recorders were surprised to hear police and fire calls and airplane voices on their soundtrack, which was the case when all recorders were transmitting on the same frequency.

Vincent finished his movie career in 1984 with "Weird Science," but went on to do more than 500 TV shows by the time he retired a decade later.

John began his career working for Universal Studios and remembered that "Animal House" (1978) was the first major feature where he was the supervising sound editor. That was after he had been part of the sound effects team for "Jaws" in 1975. John worked for Universal on many TV series, including "Rockford Files," "Columbo" and

winning an Emmy for "Duel" (1971), which was Steven Spielberg's first TV film, and "Amazing Stories" (1986), Spielberg's anthology series.

John culminated his career with supervising the sound effects for "Shawshank Redemption" (1994).

The youngest member of this illustrious trio, Jeff started working in the mail room right out of college and became a sound editor within weeks of being hired. He worked for CBS on "Gunsmoke" near the end of its run in 1975 and did some work for Universal Studios with "Jaws," "Jaws 2" and "Jaws 3D." He later worked for Stephen J. Cannell on "Hunter," "The A-Team" and "21 Jump Street."

It is important to understand that during the three decades in which Vincent, John and Jeff worked, technology was expanding by leaps and bounds. All three men learned their trade in various ways, and they shared how they advanced along the way.

Once you pinned the "sound of a shark in the water or the AK-47 for 'The A-Team' it was yours, which gave you work on the sequels and all the films that followed in that genre," Jeff said.

By the way, none of these three gentlemen or any of their crew developed the DAH – UMP DAH – UMP, DAH – UMP DAH – UMP, that was in John William's movie soundtrack. But the "glub," the "scream" and the "shark underwater" were products of their talent and imaginations. ~ Stu Gershon/Link
