

Car Show, Garage Sales Set Stage for Free Fall Events

The fall season is fast approaching and the intense heat of summer will be a thing of the past. This season signals some events that are free to residents and visitors. I would like to highlight two of those events for you to consider.

The first is the Classic Car and Motorcycle Show scheduled for Sunday, September 20, between 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. It will be located in the eastern parking lot of Mountain Shadows near the fitness center. During the 25th anniversary of Sun City Summerlin, we held a car show that turned out to be successful and it was decided to see if it would be well attended as an annual event. More than 150 cars, trucks and motorcycles will be on display. This is a good event to meet old friends and greet some new residents of our community.

Because garage sales are not permitted in Sun City Summerlin, your Board of Directors has authorized two weekends in October as days for anyone to set up a garage sale on their property. The dates are October 9-10 and



October 16-17. You may begin your sale at 7 a.m. and clean up by 5 p.m. Residents are responsible for placing their own advertisements in their periodical of choice.

o you remember when a pair of fuzzy dice dangling from a rear-view mirror was all the rage? How about when T-birds and Stingrays ruled the road? Cruising down the boulevard with your steady or heading to a party serenaded by the Beach Boys' "Little Deuce Coupe?"



Those memories and more are what organizers of Sun City Summerlin's Classic Car and Motorcycle Show hope to rekindle as they present an exhibition of automobiles and motorcycles on Sunday, September 20, from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m., at Mountain Shadows.



"The first word that comes to mind, especially living in a retirement community, is the word nostalgia," said Sun City resident and lead organizer Jerry Silvers. Jerry himself used to own a gorgeous Tbird and coordinated car shows back in California. He also was instrumental in putting together the car event for Sun City's 25th anniversary last year.



"The second reason to consider having a car show in Sun City is that we have a community of classic car owners. Some of them members of clubs, but many who have never attended and exhibited at a real car show," he said.

Fellow show organizer and resident Dennis Nicpon, who will display his prized 1973 Pontiac Firebird (pictured on the cover), said most of the cars that participated last year will return this year. Plus, he and Jerry made the rounds at local car shows this spring in hopes of wooing outside classics. They were successful.



According to SCSCAI Executive Director Sue Papilion, the Board of Directors approved and funded the car show because they believe our residents need and enjoy various types of recreation enjoyment."







In all, there will be more than 150 vintage vehicles on display, in addition to several motorcycles owned by Sun City residents.

"I could have easily registered another 100 vehicles," Jerry said. "The response I received from local classic car clubs and private collectors caught me off guard. They all wanted this event to be a success by offering their best cars because, in the past, all the major car shows were in the Henderson area. The Summerlin community classic car owners have been neglected all these years and they want their own full-fledged show. It's wonderful how people in the classic car community took me into their confidence and offered me their experience, knowledge and contacts."





And it's not only the guys who are looking forward to the show, added Dennis. "There's a 1966 Ford Mustang with pony interior that's painted a rare gold color that I hear is coming. My wife, Gloria, is going to be tickled pink when she sees it. She had a convertible one just like it back in the day and she was a real hot-rodder, I tell you."

Whether you're a car collector or a fan of vintage wheels, Jerry said visitors can expect to see Model As, muscle cars, a 1964 Porsche 356 SC coupe, Cadillacs, Chevys, T-birds, a 1971 De Tomaso Pantera, Studebakers, Shelbys, one-of-akind roadsters and more. In addition to the displays, there will be food, music, art and vendors to help shape the event into a full-circle family affair.



Security Patrol

Ride Along With Security Patrol After Dark

It was nighttime when two Security Patrol cars left headquarters to begin their four-hour shifts. The drivers called the dispatcher to check that their radios were transmitting clearly and to let her know where they would start to patrol.

One car was driven by a woman volunteer, who has been a Patrol driver for seven years. Almost immediately, she was waved over by a resident who

showed her his remote garage door opener. "It stopped working," he said. "Did you try changing the battery?" asked the Patrol driver. The resident didn't know how to access the battery, so the Patrol driver did it for him. She directed him to a nearby store where he could buy a replacement battery and promised to return to his home an hour later to put it in his remote door opener. After she installed the fresh battery, the garage door worked like new.

Later, the same driver spotted her first open garage door for that night. There was a golf cart with a set of golf clubs parked inside the exposed garage that could easily be stolen. The driver also saw an expensive-looking racing bicycle and a cabinet with tools hanging on pegs. More disturbing, the door between the garage and the home had been left ajar. No one answered when the Patrol volunteer knocked on the door. Together, with the Patrol's watch commander and a caring neighbor, Security Patrol volunteers entered the home to check for anyone who might be in trouble inside. No one was in the house. Apparently, the property owner had left in a hurry, neglecting to secure the doors. With the neighbor present, the Patrol officers closed the door to the

home, as well as the garage door. An alarm system in the utility room had not been activated by the homeowner. During their four-hour shift that night, the two Patrol drivers alerted nine more residents that they had forgotten to close their garage doors.

The other Patrol driver was called to the home of residents because a very confused woman had knocked on their front door. The woman had wandered away from her home and was lost. The Patrol drivers and their dispatcher were able to learn the woman's name and call her husband to take her home. The same Patrol driver also traced running water to its source and advised homeowners that a sprinkler had broken in their front yard. The driver helped turn off the outdoor water until the homeowners could have the sprinkler fixed the next day. The driver's next stop was easy. He whacked a big spider on a frightened woman's wall.

During the remainder of their Patrol shifts, the two drivers rattled gates at maintenance yards to make sure they were secured for the night. Later, when all four community centers had closed for that day, the Patrol drivers walked around each building to check that every door was locked. They also reported the locations of two streetlights that were not illuminated. It was a routine night for both Patrol volunteers. It's always good when there are no dreadful circumstances that need involvement with police or emergency responders.

In one month, **256** residents were alerted that their garage doors had been left open after dark. Patrol volunteers checked **733** homes for vacationing homeowners, and they added **13,720** miles to the five patrol cars' odometers, while driving along every street in the community looking for anything out of the ordinary.



Stepping On Falls Prevention Program

The SCS Fitness Department will be sponsoring another falls prevention program called Stepping On. This program begins with a falls prevention screening session held on Monday, September 21, by appointment only. Residents may sign up for an appointment with the Desert Vista Social Monitor.

During the screenings, participants will fill out a questionnaire and perform a few simple balance and stability tests in which the individual's risk of falling will be assessed. Recommendations will depend on the results of the individual tests. One recommendation will be to attend the Stepping On Falls Prevention Program classes that begin October 5. Some participants may be referred to their health care provider for further intervention as necessary.

The Stepping On Falls Prevention classes will be held on Mondays, 1–3 p.m., October 5 to November 16 (seven weeks, two-hour sessions). Participants must be pre-screened to attend these classes during the screening session held on September 21 and commit to attending all classes. Sign up for both the screening and the class with the Desert Vista Social Monitor. Class size is limited. When full, a waiting list will be collected for future classes or cancellations. For more information on this program, contact SCSCAI Director of Fitness Kristie McWhorter, 363–1486.

The Stepping On Falls Prevention program is designed to challenge the older adult to appraise his or her risk realistically and provide a forum for gaining knowledge about safety practices. The Stepping On program's aim is to facilitate the older person's taking control of their situation, explore different coping behaviors and encourage follow-through on safety strategies in everyday life. The seven-week series will consist of education, group discussions, physical exercises and guest speakers. The classes will be taught by the Kristie McWhorter, who is also a certified group leader for the Stepping On Falls Prevention Program.

When to Change your Exercise Routine

Your body isn't changing. If you train the same way day in and day out, you will not experience continuous growth. Our body adapts quickly to exercise stimuli, and once it adapts it needs different exercise routines in order to see continued, positive changes. Think about it this way:

When we first start drinking coffee, we needed only one cup to get ourselves going in the morning. As time progresses, our body adapts to this stimulant and more is required for the same effect. This is how exercise works, too. If we do the same exercises the same way over and over again, our body will plateau and stop getting stronger. We will no longer see any results from our efforts.

Here are a few tips on how to change your exercise routine so you can continue to see and feel results.

- 1. **Make slow transitions:** If you are training one way for more than six months, it's time to mix up your workout. If you always do the treadmill, start on the bike, elliptical or stepper for 5-10 minutes, then finish up on the treadmill.
- 2. Ask for help: If you've never lifted weights before or you would like to know how to use a different cardio machine, sign up for an equipment orientation class (see the schedule on this page).
- 3. Change your intensity: Slow down your repetitions on the weight equipment and do a full range of motion. I talked about this in last month's Link article.
- 4. Work out with a partner: I have a workout partner and we meet every Monday, Wednesday and Friday at 5 a.m. I wouldn't get up that early to work out on my own, so she helps me keep motivated to get up and get it done.
- 5. Weight room: Change the number of sets and reps you do. If you always do two sets with 15 reps, go for three sets and 10 reps. It's the same number of reps, but you end up adding an extra set. You will be surprised how different it feels.
- 6. **Strength Machines:** If you use a weight machine for all your exercises, switch it up and add a couple of dumbbell exercises to your routine. Dumbbells are a great alternative for bicep curls, overhead presses and chest presses.

At first it may feel uncomfortable or difficult to make changes to your exercise routine. But remember, when you make those changes you are going to feel stronger, healthier and get better results.

Former LVMPD Police Chief Calls Sun City Home

In 1983, Las Vegas was in the grip of a major crime era. Prostitution, organized crime and street crime caused Las Vegas to be rated by the FBI among the Top 10 most crime-infested cities in the nation. In 1983, John T. Moran was elected sheriff and the head of the Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department. He promised the citizens that he was going to tame the Las Vegas/Clark County community. Subsequent changes in the department spotlighted one of Sun City's own, John L. Sullivan, at the time a 22-year veteran of law enforcement who was promoted from captain to deputy chief of police/chief of detectives. Under John's command were the Detective Bureau, Vice and Narcotics Bureau and Organized Crime/Criminal Intelligence Bureau. Within the first four years of Moran's first term in office the crime rate had been drastically reduced. By the end of his second elected term the same FBI statistic that had placed Las Vegas in the bottom 10 of safe cities had upgraded it to one of the Top 10 safest cities in the nation.

Upon John's retirement, Governor Bob Miller, D-Nev., recognized John's career with a proclamation that stated he had trained more of Nevada's law enforcement officers than any one instructor in the history of police training in the state. Also, it went on to say he furthered the profession and advancement of Nevada's law enforcement in the state more than any one other individual.

In the beginning of 1995, John retired from the LVMPD after a 34-year law enforcement career.

Tales to Tell


I had always listened to and enjoyed John's stories about his police career. John and I go back many years to when we lived in Kansas City, Mo., and went to the same elementary, junior high and senior high school. We lived around the corner from each other and were high school sweethearts.

After high school John enlisted into the U.S. Coast Guard and I went into nurses' training, married and started my family. After 36 years of being apart, and while we were both single, we met by chance and rekindled our relationship. At the time John had been living in Las Vegas for over 20 years and was a deputy chief/chief of detectives of the Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department and I was the office administrator for several physicians' offices in the greater Kansas City, Missouri/Kansas City, Kansas, areas.


After a whirlwind long-distance courtship in 1990, I became John's wife and I moved to Las Vegas without looking back. I became acclimated in a short period of time and loved the area. People have told us both that we had a storybook tale about how we found each other and became husband and wife after so many years. Perhaps it was those sentiments that one day led John to sit down at his computer and tell his story. As I had always observed John's accomplishments as a police officer and listened as he related some of his stories of his career to me, I encouraged him to write a book telling his story. His life has been an interesting and accomplished one. In July, he finally did it. He penned his first book, "Chief of Detectives."

We both love the Sun City community and those who we have met over our 15 years living here. We are both going to be here for the duration.
