Five Star is part of the Sun City Summerlin family and everyone should want them to be successful. They are open 24 hours a day and serve food most of that time. They serve liquor all the time and often have great wines in the racks.



They honor our rules by not allowing smoking at the bar, and Five Star works with our Golf Department. The Tavern is planning a major renovation soon to enlarge the facility so it can cater to golf tournaments.

Five Star has struggled lately because the golf course was under such major construction. We have not been very consistent in visiting Five Star. A restaurant only can plan proper levels of servers and cooks if the business is consistent.

I hope Sun City residents will be good neighbors to Five Star and support its business and thank them for being here. I like going there on my free evenings to have a glass of wine. I won't drink alone at home, so I would like to see many of my fellow residents enjoying Five Star with me. # President's Message

#### **Finding a New Executive Director**

When Sue Papillon was appointed executive director by your Board of Directors in 2013, she promised to give us her services for two years. She wanted to enjoy the normal peace and quiet of retirement, especially her 1-year-old granddaughter. President, SCSCAI Sue has contributed her extensive experience to the running of Sun City and the

Board thanks her for her accomplishments during the past two years.

With this in our minds, the Board embarked on a plan to find a new executive director. We concluded that we would enlist the talents of an executive search firm, commonly known as a "headhunter." We contracted with an out-of-state firm several months ago and it conducted a nationwide search. Their work yielded several good candidates and the interview process began in September.

At press time of the December Link, the Board of Directors has decided on a candidate, however, we have not completed agreements/contracts. We hope to have this person onsite by the first of December. The person will be introduced to the community via our website, www.suncitylink.com, which is updated every Tuesday. A full article on the new executive

director should appear in the January, 2016 issue of The Link.

The duties of an executive director are extensive and far reaching. The director has a staff of nearly 300, and he/she creates and administers a budget of nearly \$15,000,000. In addition, he/she is responsible for the proper use of reserve funds that are in excess of \$13,000,000.

Sun City Summerlin conforms to a committee system of volunteers, where decisions and future plans are discussed before recommendations are made to the Board of Directors. The new executive director will be aware of actions taken by the committees that include: Architectural Review, Common Area Properties, Chartered Clubs & Community Organizations, Deed Restriction Hearings, Finance, Community Preparedness, Fitness, Information Technology, Golf Oversight and Legal Services.

The executive director reports to the Board of Directors (and to the president of the board directly on an as-needed basis). Directors who head up each department in Sun City report to the executive director.

Residents of Sun City will have an opportunity to meet our new employee at community events, Board and committee meetings, and by appointment at the office in Mountain Shadows.





# Take Steps to Protect Your Pets as Predators Prepare to Mate

oyotes mate in January and February. After a 60-day gestation period their pups, as many as six in a litter, are born from March through May. The adult males are aggressive during this time because they are hunting food for their mates, the mothers that are feeding their pups. Small domestic pets are soughtafter prey.

Coyotes practice compensatory reproduction. Normally, only the alpha male and female in a family group reproduce once a year. If either dominant animal is killed, however, the subsequent lack of hierarchy results in all of the other family members breeding that year, producing up to 10 times the number of normal offspring. When an overabundance of pups creates food scarcity, coyotes will gravitate toward human residences for food.

Coyotes flourish throughout Nevada, including in urban areas. Keeping domestic pets safe from attack is a challenge that isn't unique to Sun City Summerlin. According to the Nevada Department of Wildlife, a

coyote can run up to 40 miles an hour, covering well over 100 miles in a single night.

The Wildlife Department says that trapping and euthanizing coyotes will not significantly reduce their numbers. When their wild land was converted to human development, coyotes had to adapt or die. They adapted well, which isn't a negative consequence because their primary food source is rodents – rabbits, mice, rats, squirrels and skunks.

Everything in the wild is eaten by something; that is the way of the wild. In that respect, Park rangers discourage the use of poison to eradicate coyotes. Poison, rangers agree, risks death to domestic animals, as well as to other species that are not the intended target.

Last year, Sun City's Architectural Review Committee approved the installation of coyote rollers, fence toppings designed to discourage coyotes from scaling 6-foot-high walls. Anyone interested in learning more about the coyote rollers can Google the subject and

find a number of local companies that design, build and install them. Applications for the rollers are available in the Community Standards office at Mountain Shadows. (Coyote rollers are subject to a site inspection and ARC approval.)

Other preventive steps that reduce the likelihood of your pet becoming a coyote victim are:

Never leave your dog or cat alone in your back or front yard. Dusk to dawn is the most dangerous time, but a coyote attack can happen at any moment.

Feed pets indoors. Do not leave food or water in your yard.

Tightly cover garbage containers.

Carry a protective stick when walking your dog on a leash.


Creating noise is most effective to reinforce a coyote's fear of humans – good for them and for us.

Carry a small but loud handheld air horn.


Pet owners need to understand that it is their responsibility to protect their pets from predators. No one can or should be relied upon to do that for them.


# 107TH NEWPORT BEACH CHRISTMAS BOAT PARADE



#### Golf Course Maintenance Director Honored for Water Conservation Efforts



SCSCAI Director of Golf Maintenance Brian Bagwell, center, credits the very hard work of his dedicated staff for his recognition as a Water Smart Hero in October. In 2015, the Golf Maintenance Department's water conservation efforts will total a savings of 172 million gallons.

The Southern Nevada Water Authority's Water Conservation Coalition named SCSCAI's Golf Maintenance Director, Brian Bagwell, a 2015 Water Hero during its Water Smart Innovations Conference in October.

Brian, who has served on a local board for golf courses and a drought committee to help set standards and guidelines for saving water for the future, was honored alongside Boyd Gaming, Picerne Real Estate Group and Larry Simon of Pardee Homes.

To date, Brian said Sun City's golf courses have converted 3.1 million square feet of turf, which equates to saving roughly 172 million gallons of water a year. Conversions, he said, have been primarily in out-of-play areas next to homes.

"Water is our most precious resource, and for myself and other golf course superintendents, it is our responsibility to be good stewards of conservation and continue to look for ways to save water," he said.

When Brian arrived in Sun City nine years ago, he said that the Las Vegas Valley had been on water

restrictions for several years. SNWA began encouraging customers to reduce turf on their properties in 2003.

While original water-saving designs were crafted by the courses' original architect, Greg Nash, all subsequent projects (since 2007) have been completed in-house by Brian and his superintendents Eric Alms at Palm Valley and Roger Knight at Highland Falls.

"We converted approximately 7 acres in 2014 and we are in contract currently to do another 7 acres in 2015-2016. We have plans to do one last phase in the fall of 2016 to 2017 to remove another 7 acres," Brian said.

The WCC is a public/private partnership formed by community leaders to help increase water-efficient business practices within the Southern Nevada business community. The WCC provides information and encouragement to business peers in an effort to boost participation in water conservation and incentive programs.

"These Water Hero Award recipients represent companies and individuals that have made water efficiency and conservation a part of their

everyday practice and we're proud to be able to recognize each," said Doug Bennett, SNWA conservation manager.




#### Dos and Don'ts of Trash Collection

#### Smoke Alarms, Not Just Batteries, Need to be Replaced

Most of us pay attention to expiration dates on food and medical prescriptions. But, have you ever considered the expiration date of a smoke alarm? According to the National Fire Protection Association, the potentially life-saving devices have lives of their own and expire after about 10 years or 87,000 hours of service.

However, that's something that's not widely known. A recent national survey conducted by First Alert Smoke Detectors revealed that most Americans are not aware that smoke alarms need to be replaced every 10 years. If you neglect replacing your alarms, you could be putting yourself and your family at risk.


Everyone should make sure their home is equipped with working smoke alarms – the key word being "working."

The fact is, even if you have smoke alarms installed at home, you and your family may not be sufficiently protected if you haven't maintained them. The National Fire Protection Association estimated that 30 percent of all residential fires responded to are in homes without a smoke alarm (or they have a non-working smoke alarm).



To ensure that alarms are functioning properly, it is recommended that homeowners test the devices monthly. If you cannot recall when your alarms were installed, it's best to be safe and replace the units. Remember, Sun City is more than 25 years old, so homes constructed in Phases I and II, closest to Rampart Boulevard, already should have had their smoke alarms replaced. As for batteries, experts suggest replacing them twice a year, using the changing of the clocks as a reminder. And, since Daylight Saving time ended last month, batteries should have been replaced. If not, this article may help serve as a reminder to do so soon.

# Is it time to Revamp your Cardio Workout? Part 3

Are you doing the same cardio workout every time you set foot in the fitness center? Are you bored with your cardio program? Do you want to see more results from your cardio workouts?

Then it's time for a change with Aerobic Interval Training. Don't get scared by the words, it simply means

adding intervals or bursts of higher intensity activity into your regular cardio workout routine.

Whether you're just getting started or you've been exercising for years, AIT can help you rev up your workout. Before you decide if AIT is for you or not, consider these benefits:

- You'll burn more calories. The more vigorously you
  exercise the more calories you'll burn even if you only
  increase your intensity for just a few minutes at a time.
- You'll improve your aerobic capacity. As your cardiovascular fitness improves you'll be able to exercise longer with more intensity. This means you will have more energy during the day to get your entire "to do list" done.
- You'll keep boredom away while you exercise on your favorite machine or walk outside. Turning up your intensity in short intervals can add variety to your exercise routine.



#### How to get started:

After you've warmed up, continue for 3-5 minutes at your normal pace. Increase the intensity for 30-60 seconds and then resume your normal pace. Repeat.

For example: On a treadmill, you can increase your speed or add incline to create more intensity. On a bike – elliptical or NuStep – increase the speed of your pedaling or add resistance by increasing the level. If you are walking outside, increase your speed for 20–30 steps, then go back to your regular pace. Do 1–3 intervals based on how you feel that day. As you begin to adapt to these changes, continue to increase the duration and number of intervals.

AIT is not for everyone. If you have a chronic health condition or haven't been exercising regularly, consult with your doctor before doing any type of exercise, including interval training. Remember to start slowly when doing intervals. If you feel like you are overdoing it, then slow down. As your stamina improves, challenge yourself to do two interval days per week and 1-3 steady-state days. You will be surprised by the results you get!

#### Going Behind the Scenes at Sun City's 24-Hour Patrol

Sun City's Security Patrol volunteers engage residents every day, throughout the day, responding to calls that come into the dispatch center and more. The following is a list of real-life calls the Patrol responded to in October, and represents situations the volunteers can deal with when they begin their shifts.

The Patrol welcomes all residents who have questions about their service

or who are interested in donating their time to help keep Sun City Summerlin one of the safest communities in the valley. Patrol headquarters is located in the Desert Vista parking lot, in front of the tennis courts. The Patrol is open 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Volunteer positions include working in dispatch, at the information centers or being a driver.

Sun City Summerlin Security Patrol wishes all residents a safe holiday season!

- Report of a drone flying around the parking lot at Sun City and Del Webb boulevards. Security Patrol asked the drone flyer to leave.
- A resident reported a dog barking loud and long at a






Above: Hawaiian burger. Center: Summerlin salmon salad. Bottom: Grilled hot leg





# Engineering, Classic Cars, Nuclear Fusion All Part of Donald Scranton's History

n 1989 Donald M. Scranton became one of our first residents to move into Sun City and this is only part of his story. Donald grew up in Manchester, Conn., and was proud to have a father and grandfather who both were in the coffee and tea distribution business. During World War II, Donald's father worked in England installing Pratt and Whitney engines in American B17 bombers. In 1943, Donald left high school in his senior year with enough credits to graduate and joined the United States Navy Air Command during WWII and married his childhood sweetheart, Caroline.

With the help from the G.I. Bill, Donald graduated from Hartford University with a degree in hydroelectric engineering. He was employed by General Electric hydroelectric division and his mentor was Bill Farren, who installed all the original generators at Hoover Dam in the 1930s. Donald's career with G.E. spanned a total of 48 years. Donald is now 92 years old and semi-retired, as he has several ongoing businesses back East that he runs with the help of his two sons.

Donald's first assignment under the U.S. government Marshall Plan was to help rebuild Europe's energy structure. He spent four years in Spain and another four years in Greece installing hydroelectric generators in dams. In the 1950s, G.E. sent him on a special assignment to Princeton University to build two highly sophisticated generators in order to produce enough energy to create nuclear fusion. During his career working for G.E., Donald spent years traveling up and down the Columbia River, as well as six to seven states, including Alaska, to establish generating plants.

His final project in 1987 until his retirement in 1993 was to replace two upright generators originally installed by his mentor at Hoover Dam. To commemorate this achievement all the members of the team received an embossed brass belt buckle made from the scrap metal parts of the original generator.

Donald has amassed many awards throughout his career. He is a collector of old photographs and has manuals on all the specifications of each G.E. generator.

Donald's pride and joy is his 1964 Porsche 356 SC Coupe, which he has owned since 1964 and has personally worked on to keep it running like a clock all these 51 years.

# Arthritis Club: Water Workouts a Great Way to Target Every Joint in the Body

Most of the people living in our community suffer from some form of arthritis. Even me. Typing this piece, I am wearing a brace on each of my hands, suffering from Stage 3 arthritis in both thumbs.

As I spoke with Jim and Linda Gaughan, the president and vice president of the Arthritis Club, I was informed that the group has been in existence for most of the history of Sun City Summerlin. Jim said that the club has more than 80 members, who range in age from 68 to 91 years old.
