PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



tarting on March 1st the budgeting process for fiscal year 2022-2023 begins. The process will take two or three weeks and can be watched via zoom. The Board welcomes comments from the residents on projected expenditures, reserve account balances and capital expenses to name but a few of the topics that will be discussed. Each Department Director will present their requests and reasons for those requests for operating funds, capital expenses and suggestions as well as requests for the expenditure of funds out of the Reserve Fund for the next year. The Board will not only decide on a budget to be presented to all the residents but will talk about potential expenditures two, three, or even five years in the future.

You have probably seen the requests for residents to answer survey questions. They have been sent out in the form of an email blast and can be answered online. One can also go to the Sun City web site and take the survey there as well. The Future Planning Committee has been meeting for about four months now and is gathering data to determine where you, the residents, want our community to be or to be heading towards in the next two to five years. The committee is still in the data gathering stage of this process. Clearly Covid has hampered our efforts to gather data on facility usage as residents' usage is being skewed because of the pandemic and the health concerns of the residents. The process will continue for the next few months.

Spring is just around the corner and with that we will be able to go out and enjoy one of the most comfortable times, weather wise, in the Las Vegas Valley. Spring also brings an even greater increase in the landscape and home construction in our community. That means that there will be even more dumpsters on our streets. Although the contractors are supposed to put pylons down and reflective tape on the dumpsters they unfortunately do not always do so. If you see a dumpster without reflective tape, call the Security Patrol (702-254-2303) and they will come out and put reflective tape on the dumpsters not already marked. Also be aware of the landscapers who put rocks and other landscaping materials in

our streets. These items should have pylons marking their presence on the street as well. Again, if you observe landscaping materials in the street not marked by pylons call the Security Patrol.

The election for Board members has just concluded and committee assignments will be made shortly. If you have an interest in serving on a committee please email that interest to our Exec-

utive Director, Mitzi Mills, (MitziM@suncitylv.com) noting what committee that you would like to serve on and any background information that would highlight your qualifications.

AARP Tax Aide

There are still a few time slots available for AARP's tax aide service, where volunteers will



once again prepare your federal income tax forms for free this year. The program will run from February 10 to April 15 on Thursdays, Fridays, and Saturdays. This service will be offered in the Mint Room at Mountain Shadows from 9 a.m. to noon and 1-4 p.m. Appointments are necessary and may be made by phone or in person with the Social Monitor at Mountain Shadows. We will be using the same software as last year. You MUST bring a copy of the last 2019 and 2020 tax return, vour Social Security card and a form of picture ID. We also need any W2s, 1099R, Interest, Dividend, Social Security SSA1099, W2G, broker statements, proof of health insurance and any other receipts for your miscellaneous deductions. Please note that we will only prepare returns for electronic filing; no paper returns will be prepared. Also note that we cannot prepare state returns, rental property deductions, business, or partnership (K-1) income other than simple interest, dividends, or capital gains. For appointments only, call the Social Monitor at Mountain Shadows, 702-966-1410. Have tax questions? Please call Mike Sanders, 702-724-0476.



ARC, Community Standards, and the Violation Process

Recently there have been a number of questions raised about the Development Standards of Sun City and how they are applied. This is a commonly misunderstood area, and we feel it deserves some explanation and clarification for our homeowners.



is charged with revising, interpreting, and upholding the Development Standards, approving applications for exterior work, and inspecting that work after completion to ensure compliance. ARC also has the ability to grant a variance to the Development Standards, if a majority feels it is warranted, reasonable, and within the bounds of maintaining community compatibility. ARC does not investigate or determine violations, assess fines, or call residents to hearings. Per the CC&Rs, the decisions of ARC are final on all matters.

Community Standards is a Sun City administrative department, currently having three employees. It is their function to process applications, support ARC, assist homeowners with questions and information, maintain files and records, and pro-

cess violation submissions. They also maintain samples of approved color palettes and materials. The Director of the department reports to the Executive Director.

On occasion, a resident will report a suspected violation of the Development Standards and expect immediate action to be taken. There is a process for this in place. First, the reported violation is investigated by staff. If found to be a violation, a letter is sent to the homeowner indicating the problem and seeking resolution. If, after a period of time is allowed and the problem has not come into compliance, a second letter indicating a hearing and potential fine is sent. If the violation continues, the homeowner will receive notice of being called before the Hearing Committee. The Hearing Committee determines if a fine should be levied or not, according to the SCSCAI fine policy. Fines can be ongoing, can continue on a weekly basis, and can eventually become a lien.

Residents reporting potential violations often call seeking to know the status of a complaint or report. By Nevada statute, all information regarding a violation, its status, its resolution, or its fines, are confidential. We are **not allowed** to give **any** answers regarding the matter to anyone other than required staff and the Board. While this can often be frustrating to the reporting party, it is the law.

As an example, if a reported violation is corrected within the designated timeframe, it has been cured and is no longer a violation. If it remains, either it was not found to be a violation, or it may be proceeding through the hearing and fine process.

We hope that this has helped to clear up any misunderstandings about how standards, variances and violations are handled. If you have further questions, you are welcome to contact the Community Standards office for further clarification.

May the sun shine warm upon your face;



"The Luck of the Irish?"

Those who immigrated here seemed to have made their own 'luck', my grandparents included. As they emigrated here from Ireland, like all immigrants, they came here to have a better life, not just for themselves, but their kids, kids like my dad. There was a time in Ireland where Catholics couldn't vote,



My Grandparents moved farther west to a coal mining town in Pennsylvania. Life didn't become the glamorous dream they had crossing the Atlantic. The little house had an outside pump for water, and a not so attractive outhouse; their survival depended on the coal mines where your life revolved around the 'Company Store" (as referenced in the Ernie Ford song 16 Tons). And yet, Charlie Sr., was able to eventually buy into a bar (so appropriate for Irishmen) and serve as a part-time constable (also, very appropriate for Irishmen). Through it all, my grandfather never drank, neither did Charlie Jr. (my Dad), but, being truthful, my Welsh Grandmother on my Mom's side more than made up for it!

Sadly, due to the hardships of the immigrant life, they had passed away and I never really knew my Grandparents, just heard stories, and perhaps just folklore, but they're a part of who I am being second generation. We often forget how hard the lives were of those who came before us, how they all had dreams, some fulfilled and others, well, have fallen short. But




whether they travel hundreds or thousands of miles, anyone who immigrated here seemed to be running to or running from something, many of them facing nothing but the hard life of back-breaking manual labor jobs just to put food on the table.

As for me- I could not have grown up MORE Irish. Attending St. Canice for 12 years, there were five Patty's in my class; our school's colors were green and white, with a shamrock as our school emblem. Our priests were Fr. McDonough, Fr. Mc Veigh, Fr. O'Brien, and Fr. Fallon (I think it was the law they all had to be Irish!); the basketball team was the Fighting Irish. And even though I lost my dad years ago, I still can hear him whistling Peg o' My Heart and get a little teary when I hear Danny Boy. Being honest, I have never found a four leaf clover, nor a pot of gold, and never saw a leprechaun, but every once in a while, I still look around just in case.

It matters not our complexion, our dialect or accent, our ethnicity, or our religious beliefs when you think about it, in the eyes of Native Americans, the rest of us are ALL immigrants. So, come St. Patrick's Day, let us remember all the immigrants who came to this country, a country still a work in progress, and give not just thanks but immeasurable credit to all those who left 'home' and made a new life in a country that was not always welcoming. One cannot imagine what life was for them 'back in the day', and yet, for many of us, our lives here are so much more than they could have hoped for or imagined. So, not just on St. Patrick's Day, but for all the years ahead, no matter where your ancestors originated . . . may Irish eyes smile upon you with an Irish Blessing: May the wind be always at your back. May the sunshine warm upon your face; the rains fall soft upon your fields and until we meet again, may God hold you in the palm of His hand.

These remarks were what I grew up hearing. In addition, I was taught to say some of my prayers in Gaelic And when all the adults were in a merry mood, they recited poems about how Englishmen were not so nice.

Yes, my Mackey and Bresnahan

relatives were proud of their Irish heritage and made sure I and other younger members of the family would carry on that pride. Most of them came from County Cork, arriving in the United States from the 1860s through 1914. My great grandfather brought along his shillelagh which I now have. Genealogy research has helped me to document earlier ancestors. As I am the oldest cousin of the many descendants, I try to pass along the facts and anecdotal stories for those still to come.

Most of my childhood neighbors were Irish but I lived near the edge of that community which bordered a Polish area. I could walk to the Polish school, two blocks away, but was quickly transferred to the parochial Irish school when old enough to cross busy streets. Since the Priest at the parochial Irish school was a family member, this too played a part in that decision.

Family was important, and my many relatives gathered together weekly. Major holidays were always spent together until finally no one had a house large enough to accommodate eight families. Reunions now help keep the growing family of cousins together, including one in Las Vegas several years ago. One of the first groups I joined in Las Vegas was the Irish American Club. I had the honor of carrying my great grandfather's shillelagh as the club marched in the city's St. Patrick's Day Parade. My wear'n of the Green that day and every March 17th is my great grandmother's shamrock pin stamped with the words "Erin Go Bragh", Ireland Forever


I have visited Ireland and kissed the Blarney Stone and even found a small business owner there named Mackey. Eat Right and Sleep Well: National Nutrition Month and Sleep Awareness Week/World Sleep Day

arch is National Nutrition Month! This month is all about making informed food choices and practicing healthy eating habits.

How much do YOU know about good nutrition? Healthy eating goes beyond eating fruits and vegetables and drinking plenty of water. Take this quiz, developed by the Academy of Nutrition and Dietetics, and see just how much you know. Who knows, you may learn something!

Questions:

- 1. Most Americans consume more than enough calcium, potassium, vitamin D and dietary fiber.
- Only people with medical conditions, such as diabetes or high blood pressure, need to limit their intake of added sugars and salt.
- 3. It's a good idea to wash all fruits and vegetables, even ones with peels that may not be eaten.
- 4. Drinking milk is the only way to meet the daily recommendation of three cups from the Dairy Group.
- 5. A vegetarian diet can provide adequate protein for athletes.
- 6. All carbohydrate foods, also known as "carbs," are the same and provide no nutritional value.
- 7. Using MyPlate as a guide, half the plate should include fruits and vegetables.
- 8. All vegetables offer the same types and amounts of vitamins and minerals.
- 9. Only foods that taste salty are high in sodium.
- 10. A registered dietitian nutritionist can help you develop a healthy eating plan that is as unique as you are.

Answers:

- 1. **FICTION:** The intake of foods that provide these important nutrients is less than what is recommended for most people in the United States. Including more fruits, vegetables, beans, dairy, and whole grains would help individuals get more of these nutrients that are needed for good health.
- **2. FICTION:** It is recommended that all Americans over the age of 2 limit sources of added sugars to less than 10 percent of their total calories, and children under 2 should avoid all sources of added sugars. For salt, also known as

sodium, less than 2,300 milligrams per day is recommended and even less for children under the age of 14.



- 3. FACT: All produce should be washed under running water even if the peel will not be eaten. This is because dirt and bacteria can be transferred from the peel to the inside of the fruit or vegetable as it is sliced or peeled. No soap should be used, but a produce brush is recommended when washing firmer produce, such as melons and potatoes.
- **4. FICTION:** Yogurt, cheese, buttermilk, and fortified soy milk also count as a 1 cup-equivalent from this MyPlate food group.



- **5. FACT:** A well-planned vegetarian eating style that includes adequate calories and a variety of foods can meet the protein needs of athletes. For personalized nutrition guidance, consult a registered dietitian nutritionist.
- 6. FICTION: Carbohydrates are the body's main source of energy. Many nutritious foods are sources of carbohydrate, including fruits, vegetables, and whole grains. These foods provide vitamins, minerals and dietary fiber, which can positively affect our health.
- 7. FACT: MyPlate represents a meal that includes fruits and vegetables on half of the plate and the other half is divided to include grains and a protein food. To complete the meal, a serving of dairy is recommended.



- **8. FICTION:** Eating a variety of vegetables throughout the week, including beans and peas, dark-green, red and orange, starchy and other vegetables will provide a variety of important nutrients like beta-carotene, vitamin C, zinc, potassium, folate and iron.
- 9. FICTION: While some foods may taste salty, others may not, and this can also vary based on the individual. Most of the salt we consume comes from foods that are already prepared. Choose foods with lower amounts of sodium by comparing their Nutrition Facts Labels and look for descriptions such as "No Salt Added" or "Reduced Sodium"

when shopping. Cooking at home allows you to control the amount of salt in your meals. When eating out, request sauces and condiments be served on the side or ask if lower sodium options are available.



10. FACT: When it comes to a healthy eating routine, one size does not fit all - everyone is unique. Nutrient needs vary based on our age, activity level, sex, health conditions and other factors. Registered dietitian nutritionists, also known as RDNs, can provide personalized nutrition advice to meet your goals.

"I didn't know that." This is heard all too often in Sun City Summerlin, when in fact, the information is readily at hand by signing up to receive eblasts sent out by our Administration, subscribing to "Tuesday Newsday," visiting the Sun City Summerlin website, and reading the print edition of the "Link." They are all sources of Sun City Summerlin authorized/official communications.

Eblasts provide the most current information from our Administration. A resident must sign up to receive eblasts which include notices about Zoom meetings enabling residents to virtually attend meetings of the Board of Directors, Standing Committees, updates from our Metro, and Covid updates. Our IT (Information Technology) staff, enables us to sit-in and contribute to our Executive Director's Friday Afternoon Chats and Coffee with the Board. Truly important are the last minute notices of closures, cancellations, and alerts that are available by signing up for eblasts.

How does one sign up for eblasts? It is an easy process. Just send an email to our Executive Director, Mitzi Mills, at mitzim@suncitylv.com. In the subject line state "Sign Me Up," and in the message include your name, email address, Sun City Summerlin address, and telephone number. Soon you should begin receiving eblasts.

"Tuesday Newsday" is a reminder that a new edition of the on-line "Link" is available each Tuesday at suncitylink.com. To receive these reminders, go to suncitylink.com, scroll down to the bottom of the Home Page and sign up. This site also provides links to our community's Facebook, Instagram, and YouTube sites.

Each week, "Tuesday Newsday" lists "Picks of the Week" offering suggestions for a special event each day of the upcoming week. "Community" lists timely notices of events such as golf events, when The Summit is closed for private events, monthly specials at our restaurants—Tavern at the Falls and The Summit, and schedules for such happenings as AARP income tax preparation. The "Clubs" page provides a weekly schedule of club activities. "Classifieds" include items for sale (including photos), real estate for rent or sale, and freebies (where residents can post items to be given away). It is under "Classifieds" that estate and moving sales for the following weekend are posted each Thursday—complete with maps for these sales' locations.

It is at suncitylink.com that it is often possible to download the following month's "Link" print edition days before receiving it in the mail. Just scroll to the bottom of the "Home" page for the most current edition of the print version of the "Link." Also available at this location is the current map of Sun City Summerlin.

The Sun City Summerlin website (suncitysummerlin.com) is presently being updated. Watch for the new format.

The print edition of the "Link" is mailed to every Sun City Summerlin homeowner and to those residents who have purchased a Renter's Card. This publication contains so much information. And the blue pages contain official Sun City business including Board of Directors' actions and financial statements.

So never be the one who says, "I didn't know that." Get connected and be "in the know."





now. All are invited.


