



# PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



ow. It is October already. I did not think that the summer would ever end but it has. Cooler temperatures will prevail. The rollercoaster that is COVID-19 has continued in our community. Your Board has tried very hard to follow the guidelines set forth by the appropriate Government and Medical authorities. We all realize that the inconveniences will continue a while longer but safety of residents is always the overriding factor in the Board's decisions. Most of you are aware of the increase in the Breaking and Entering's that occurred in our community this summer. Metro and specifically Summerlin Command have been overwhelmingly supportive of protecting our community. There were days in the last month when there were as many as 17 marked and unmarked cars in our community. Their commitment also involved assigning a "squad" of detectives to work in our community for quite some time. I also want to thank the Security Patrol who had twelve members work two-hour surveillance shifts at locations suggested by Metro daily (seven days a week).

We have learned from this summer's increase in crime that we must ALL work together to make our community safer. We need to meet and check on our neighbors. We need to attend in person or via zoom the sessions presented by Metro, Neighborhood Preparedness or the Association about making our homes safer and more secure. Remember that Metro is sponsoring National Night Out on Tuesday, October 5th in Downtown Summerlin. There will be vendors from lots of home security companies there that night. It is also a great opportunity to meet with and even thank the Metro officers who have been helping our community. Perhaps, you might want to start a Neighborhood Watch on your street. We have more such programs than any other community in the valley. But we can use more.

Our community has been less active for the last 18 months. Your Board wants activities to increase and so fairs, shows and events, with precautions being taken, are back in the forefront. We need to return to being an active 55-plus community. Enough of the past, let's look to the future. Where will the Association be in five years? Where do we want to be?

How do we get there? Your Board will be talking about these very issues

over the next few months. The Department Directors have submitted their thoughts for review by the Board. The "Future Planning Committee" as it has named itself has had two meetings already. This committee is made up of residents who will be talking to their friends, fellow club members as well as residents that they encounter at our various facilities. It is my hope that the perspective that this

committee which will not have any Board or staff members on it will be able to present to the Board a clear insight into what the residents of Sun City want in the next five years. In the future, I will report periodically about the progress of all these efforts.

# Are you a Witch?

#### FIND OUT IN THIS SPECIAL REPORT!

THIS ARTICLE ISN'T JUST FOR WOMEN: MEN CAN BE MALE witches labeled by some as wizards if they are good; warlocks if they have bad intentions; so, I hope men won't discard this article as being all about women. Unfortunately, though, women have "taken the rap" for being witches more than men. As an example, Merlin, the great Wizard, played a prominent role in the legend of King Arthur, as well as the "Wizard" in the "Wizard of Oz," so you know male witches are just as important.

As a child my first introduction to witches was watching "The Wizard of Oz," the classic movie of Glinda the good witch v. the "Wicked Witch of the West." Later, programs like "Bewitched" and "Charmed" became popular. Most recently, the play "Wicked" and the movie series, "Harry Potter" have exposed younger generations to witches and wizards.

Living in a neighboring town to Salem, Massachusetts, where the famous and terrifying witch trials took place, I also met the official "Witch of Salem," Laurie Cabot, back in the 90's. Her "Witches' Ball" on Halloween in Salem is still legendary.

But do witches really exist? Or is it all nonsense, or shall we say, "hocus pocus?" Let's take our broomsticks and fly back in history to truly understand how witches came into being and how they practice now.

The earliest recordings of witches can be found in the book of 1 Samuel, in the Bible, thought to be written between 931 BC and 721 BC revealing the story of King Saul, who sought out "The Witch of Endor." She summoned the dead prophet Samuel's spirit to help Saul defeat the Philistines. The witch prophesied both the deaths of Saul's two sons in battle and Saul's death as well. Saul, upon learning of both his sons' deaths, committed suicide; the Philistines were not defeated.

In the mid-1400s, witch hysteria was spreading throughout Europe, and early Christians perceived witches as evil beings doing the devil's work. Within a century witch hunts had become commonplace, and most witches (confessing under torture) were either burned at the stake or hung. Between the years of 1500 and 1660, up to 80,000 suspected witches (who were mostly women with assets, widowed, single or tended to voice their opinions) were put to death in Europe. Germany had the highest execution rate, Ireland the lowest.

But as hysteria decreased in Europe, it had also increased in the New World; between the wars against the French and British, a smallpox epidemic and ongoing fear of attacks from American Indians, scapegoats were needed to divert attention away from these problems.

Further, male doctors, who wanted to dominate the practice

of medicine, resented midwives and women who practiced healing with the use of herbs. These, as well as rich widows and outspoken women, became "fair game" for being labeled as witches.

The witch trials in Salem in 1692, became the most famous, although there were other colonies not as well known that also held trials. Ultimately 150 women and men were accused of witchcraft in Salem with 18 put to death.

The rise of Wicca (a Pagan religion which believes in both God and Goddess) may be traced back to Paleolithic peoples who worshiped a Hunter God and a Fertility Goddess and put images on the wall of caves. The discovery of these paintings is estimated to be 30,000 years old. Some could conceivably argue that Wicca might be the oldest belief system in existence. Over centuries of time, the "Craft of the Wise" and the knowledge of herbs and medicines helped those who practiced become healers and leaders in their communities.

In today's world, one can be a witch but not necessarily follow the practices of the Wicca belief system. However, there are a few "laws" that most witches observe: "Harm none" is the one principle that is of utmost importance, serving as an ideal to live by honoring a harmonious balance with all, including respect and reverence for the earth and animals as well as humans.

A second law is called "The Threefold Law," or the "Rule of Three," and is like the belief in karma that some Eastern religions follow. The Threefold Law states that any spell that a witch sends out for good or bad will return three times the energy to the witch creating that spell.

Many of the incantations and spells that witches perform these days might be compared to prayers that other religions send out to help others in their time of need.

Believe it or not, persecution of witches continues to this day; several men and women accused of witchcraft have been beaten and killed in New Guinea since 2010 – including a young mother who was burned alive. Similar violence has been recorded in Africa, South America, the Middle East and in immigrant communities in Europe and the United States.



### Suspicious or Not?



ith the heightened awareness of suspicious vehicles cruising through our neighborhood, we are all on increased alert for slow moving or stopped vehicles. So we want to make you aware of one activity that falls into that category, but is NOT a threat to your home security. This is our team of Architectural Review Committee (ARC) members who are out doing home inspections.



completion of the project. Then, one of our ARC team will stop by to determine if it was done as specified on the application. If so, the project is closed and goes into the Community Standards property files file system. Most of the time this activity takes place without the homeowner even knowing about it. Usually, the team member will only ring your doorbell if they need access to the backyard or cannot determine completion from the front of the house.



On occasion, when a resident sees a team member cruising the streets in a section of our community, they are curious as to what is going on. All team members have Sun City name badges. They will gladly identify themselves if approached. And, since they are all residents of our community, they will be over 55 years of age.

Often when doing their work, they will cross paths with Security Patrol cars who are also doing their job. Team members can always be identified by asking to see their name badge. We hope this helps you to understand that not all suspicions are worthy of concern. If you have any questions about this, please feel free to contact Community Standards at 702-966-1411.

### **Changes are Coming**

The LINK team has been working hard over the past couple of months to evaluate the production of our magazine. The goal has been to make it more efficient from a production standpoint, more timely in its delivery to the community, more useful to our residents, and more cost effective. To that end, you will see some noteworthy changes in future issues.


First and foremost, it will no longer be delivered in a clear plastic envelope. Using a clear plastic envelope causes a significant delay in getting the product to the post office. We anticipate that as much as two days will be gained by switching to a paper envelope. In addition, a paper envelope is much more environmentally friendly than plastic. Watch for your LINK in a bright yellow envelope.

Secondly, the section of the magazine which contains official Sun City notices and information, casually called the "blue pages", will be separated from the magazine. Rather than printing these in full color on heavy glossy paper, we will simply produce them

with black ink on blue bond stock. This saves costs, and allows for more full color pages and potential advertising to be in the magazine. It will also allow residents to retain the blue pages with their other community documents.

Finally, the magazine will change from being a self-cover printed on heavy coated stock to a heavier cover plus lighter inside pages.

### Help us Help you!

obby Jones said, "You swing your best when you have the fewest things to think about", this makes a person wonder why, if thinking less helps the game, are there so many rules? Golf rules incorporate not only the rules of the game of golf but the rules of the course itself.

The golf department has been asked to step up the policing on our golf courses to help maintain the beautiful conditions of the courses as well as to aide with enjoyment of the game for all players. In an effort to encourage golfers to follow the rules our golf department employees have been instructed to issue Violation forms to those individuals not following the rules. Violation forms will be recorded and the Executive Director and/or Board of Directors will contact the violator to address the violation. We are not seeking to discourage golfers from enjoying the course, we are seeking to encourage golfers to help ensure everyone can enjoy it.

We encounter a variety of transgressions on the golf courses so I thought it would be good to review a few of the things you can expect the Golf Staff to be on the lookout for.

#### 90-Degree Rule

Under this rule, carts are allowed on the fairway, but they must maintain a 90-degree angle from the cart path. You must take the cart path to a spot that is even with your ball, make a right angle turn and drive straight toward the ball.

#### **Golf Cart Rules**

Golf carts are to be kept 30 yards from tee and green areas. Golf carts should not be driving in out-of-bounds areas including native areas and homeowners property. Golf carts should remain on the cart path on all par 3's

#### Pace of Play

A round of golf is meant to be played at a prompt pace. Golfers should recognize that his/her pace of play is likely to affect how long it will take other players to complete their round. Golfers are encouraged to allow faster groups to play through. Palm Valley and Highland Falls Target Pace is 4 hours, Eagle Crest Target Pace is 3 hours.

#### **Driving Range Property**

Removal of driving range property, including range balls, tokens and baskets is prohibited.

#### **Dress Code**

Golf attire is to be neat and clean in appearance, our policy is designed to ensure that players adhere to golfing protocol to help maintain the game's traditions. The complete dress code is available in each golf shop.

#### Back To School

Remember that last day of summer vacation? Tomorrow began a new school year with all the adventure, trepidation, excitement and of course those 'all important' clothes laid out for the big day. Believe it or not you can have that same feeling again! Even to the clothes.

After visiting with a bundle of new recruits for Sun City Summerlin Security Patrol, it seems these folks have the same attitude even though they have a few years of experience behind them.

They have decided to give back to their community by helping to make it a safer place to live. The education and training for the newest members are all accomplished by those with years of proficiency in the different skills throughout the patrol. After filling out the ever annoying, but necessary paperwork, the recruits begin a "tour" through all of the positions available. This overview helps them decide where they would be most comfortable in Security Patrol.

#### So Many Possibilities

How did they learn of Security Patrol? The recruiting team makes sure that information is given to every new resident in the orientation that they attend when moving to Sun City Summerlin. In fact, it is one of the first things on that agenda. New community residents carry home literature that explains the patrol and the role the members play in the overall structure of our neighborhood. More paperwork comes their way in the form of "the blue sheet"; information completed by each household that the patrol can access in case of an emergency. This is prepared and downloaded into a data base in a combined effort with the administration offices.

As each recruit works their way through the many positions patrol members fill, they find the niche for themselves while meet-

ing other members who are also giving of themselves for their neighbors. The Information Centers that stand at three entrances into Sun City Summerlin are all manned by Security Patrol to answer questions and direct visi-

tors to their destinations. Those colleagues, who enjoy cruising, fill the specified shifts, driving the patrol cars at all hours of the day and night only on the streets of Sun City Summerlin. This a good time

to remind everyone that the patrol looks out for you 24 hours a day, seven days a week, 365 days a year! The Patrol Office is manned by a dispatcher to be a helping hand to residents throughout each day. Of course there are numerous very specific jobs to hold the organization together and working smoothly.

#### What Do Members Get?

Security Patrol is one of the seventy plus chartered clubs of Sun City. It has both the support and assistance of the Master Board of Directors and the folks who work in Administration. No Patrol member is monetarily compensated, but they certainly receive accolades from residents, Las Vegas Fire and Rescue and Las Vegas Metropolitan Police. They are also furnished with the uniform pieces they will need for their new positions. Patrol does not do the job of the professionals but we try to make their calls into our community easier.

Once in a while, Patrol members do have an event that is more social in nature. It could include good food and the chance to visit with other Patrol members in a relaxed setting.



#### WHAT CAN RESIDENTS DO TO HELP?

If somehow you have missed the chance to check out Patrol "jobs", there is a program for you. "Come Look Us Over" is an abbreviated overview of the Patrol Organization. Contact any Patrol member or stop by the office at the very back of the Desert Vista Community Center parking lot near the pickle ball courts. The dispatcher will visit with you and give you the (here it comes again) paperwork so you can ride along in a patrol car and see firsthand what these drivers do every day.

The other things you can do are 'watch out for your neighbors', 'drive carefully in our community' and give a wave to the patrol cars as they pass. That is their "Pay for the Day".

Of course, there were those kids we might run into who simply put on old play clothes and a mask; perhaps, there was no one at home to give them a more creative look. But back then, we just went on our way, hopefully not judging. It was Halloween – that was all that mattered.

'Back in the day', you could dress up as a cowboy and strap on your holster with two six-shooters and not be

### **Donna and Byron Peterson**

Neighbors are more than someone to wave at or say "Hello" to. They can help with safety, security, loneliness and sometimes your health.

In 2010, we lived in a beautiful house in a nice neighborhood. The neighbors were friendly. We waved and knew their names. We did not socialize. Everyone was busy with working or raising children. Everything was fine until Byron had a stroke and developed Wernicke's (Fluent) aphasia. Aphasia is a speech disorder, usually from a stroke or brain injury that affects speech. There are 5 different types of aphasia. The most common is Broca's (non-fluent aphasia) where people have difficulty finding words they want to use. People affected with Wernicke's aphasia have no difficulty speaking, but rarely speak in coherent words or sentences. According to a 2020 survey by the National Aphasia Association, only 7% of respondents knew of aphasia and 41.5% equated speech disorders with intellectual deficiencies. People with aphasia have intelligence. Speech is the problem. Because of Byron's aphasia, our neighbors did not know what to do or say. Suddenly Byron spoke only nonsense. Neighbors stopped waving and rarely said "Hi." They considered him brain damaged instead of speech impaired.

At a regular appointment, our doctor asked me if I was depressed. I said "No." I did detail all the challenges with caring for Byron. The doctor went out of his way to find therapists experienced with Wernicke patients. He found a Speech Therapist who was a perfect fit. Byron slowly improved. At a subsequent visit, I was shocked when the doctor took out his pad and wrote me a prescription. It said, "Move to a retirement community with people in your own age group." I was shocked. He finally convinced me Byron would improve with the move.

Seven years ago, we moved to Sun City Summerlin. Our neighbors not only waved and said "Hi", but they also invited us to their homes. Soon Byron had a walking partner, was invited to parties and even went on "Boy's Nights Out." Our new neighbors fully embraced us. Byron thrived. His confidence grew and speech became clearer. We went on an Alaskan cruise promoted by the Aphasia Recovery Connection (ARC). On the cruise, a speech therapist asked to interview Byron on YouTube. We agreed because it would be used as an awareness and educational tool. The YouTube has received over



2 million views with countless comments of encouragement and thanks. This year, Peter Kennedy, the screenwriter for "The Ice Road" viewed the YouTube and modeled a character "Gurty" after Byron. He also used of one of Byron's sentences, "I hope the world lasts for you." After 2020, he thought it was a moving sentiment.

If you are interested in aphasia, please visit the National Aphasia Association. More importantly, value and be grateful for your neighbors and the wonderful people who call Sun City Summerlin home, especially the neighbors on Maddington Drive. Our neighbors are heroes and simply the best!


Let me share a few of my memorable moments last February and March during the vaccine operation.

When I asked one of our participants which arm he would like the vaccine placed, he promptly pointed to the person across from him and said, "His arm". We all chuckled.

It had been months since many people had been out of their house and into a public setting. I was so impressed with how sharply dressed some of the men and women appeared. I guess this was a day to remember, so they wore their "Sunday best".

Once the age limit was dropped down past age 62, we started to see some younger people. One particular person stood out in my mind. This 35–40-year-old young woman was very nervous about having this COVID-19 vaccine. She told me this was her first vaccine EVER in her life and the reason she was doing this one was because her sister was a hospital nurse and had seen the very sick and dying from unvaccinated COVID-19 infected people and said you must "get the vaccine". I reassured this young woman that the "shot" in the arm would be nearly painless and that she was wise to follow her sister's advice. Once the injection was done, the young woman burst into tears and I said, "Are you okay?" She said "yes" and told me she felt so relieved that she may survive NOT getting C-19 and dying. It touched my heart as I feel many other people may have felt that way too.

Now booster vaccines are being implemented soon. I will be ready to receive mine when it's time and help vaccinate once again. One day, I am hoping we look back on this pandemic and realized we learned some very valuable lessons. Stay safe everyone.

A Sun City Summerlin resident, professional and award-winning Body Builder and now author. ### SB186 - NRS Secure Internet Website

Effective January 1, 2022, NRS 116 is amended by adding a new section as follows:

Each association of a common-interest community that contains 150 or more units shall establish and maintain a secure Internet website or electronic portal that may be accessed by any unit's owner. The association shall make available on the website or within the electronic portal any documents relating to the common-interest community or the association, including, without limitation:

- A. The governing documents;
- B. The most recent copy of the declaration of covenants, conditions and restrictions:
- C. The annual budget of the association and any proposed budgets;

- D. The notices and agendas for any upcoming meetings of the association; and
- E. Any other documents required to be posted by law or regulation

Over the coming weeks, we will begin making SunCitySummerlin.com password protected. This will require you to logon onto the website to access the electronic portal.

- 2. Provide your name, member ID, and the email you want to use to login.

have always been fascinated by the subject of Quantum Theory but found the mathematical explana-

The small paperback, Quantum Theory, A Graphic Guide, by J.P. McEvoy and Oscar Zarate is just what I was looking for. Albert Einstein said "Quantum Theory is non-intuitive and defies common sense", and one of the other all-time great physicists, Richard Feynman said "If you think you understand quantum mechanics (the math supporting Quantum Theory), you


don't understand quantum mechanics." Of course, I will never understand the subject, but I am at least starting to understand why quantum theory is so important.

And as a result, we have Lasers, the atomic bomb, nuclear powerplants, an explanation of the periodic tables of elements, why chemical reactions take place, solar power – the list goes on.

It's a fun book to read. For instance, In Algebra 1, we were taught that A x B = B X A. Quantum Theory says that at the subatomic level that is not always the case!!! Who knew?

## **NOTICE TO OWNERS**

#### **Dear Sun City Summerlin Owners and Residents,**

This is a long email; it is also probably one of the most important emails that I have sent out to the Owners and residents of Sun City Summerlin. The consequences explained in this email will impact every one of you on the email blast list. I hope each of you will read it in its entirety, even more than that I hope you will take the action as requested in this email.

Effective, October 1, 2021, the following law goes into effect.

NRS 116.31068 – Unless any other provision of this chapter specifies the manner in which a notice, communication or other information must be given by an association, and unless a unit's owner opts out of receiving electronic communications or has not designated an email address, an association shall deliver any notice required under this chapter and any communication from or other information provided by the association to the mailing and email addresses a unit's owner designates.

How does this impact you as an Owner or resident? It means that our email communications with you will cease on October 1, 2021, as we are now required to send by US mail to all 7,781 Owners, all information

that we send out by email. Which would mean about a cost of about \$6,000.00 (\$0.77 per Owner) for every blast email we send out, not including the extra administrative staff that would be needed.

We had hoped that before now, the Association industries efforts to educate our governor and legislature on the negative ramifications of NRS 116.31068 would have resulted in some modifications or clear direction on what is meant by "and communications from or other information provided by the association", but that has not happened.

At the end of this email, I have provided the names and email addresses of all the legislatures who voted in favor of this law, as well as the Governor who allowed the bill to pass directly to him without deliberation or an opportunity for opposing views to be heard. I have also included the email for the Ombudsman's office so you can provide your input to them as well. Before that I want to share with you the types of communications that we are talking about, and why this statute does not make sense, in hopes you will call and send emails to each of these people to let them know that NRS 116.31068 has provided a financial burden on all associations and despite the talk to promote better communication between

Associations and their Owners and residents, has created the opposite by shutting down all email communications unless a mailing is also done.

### Following are types of communications that we presently do by email but will now cease.

**Crime** – we have had a rash of break-ins in our community since April. I have been sending emails out alerting people when there has been a new crime and any information the police have provided regarding how the break in occurred and what the person and vehicle looked like. These are time sensitive reports in most cases, but in some cases, it is just a general report for the week.

COVID-19 Positive Cases – Many of our Owners and residents report to us when they have had a Positive COVID-19 test and provide us details of what activities they have participated in. We also do a 14 day check on their Activity card, and then either the same day or within 24 hour send out a blast email stating that a person (we never give names) has tested positive for COVID-19 and report the places and events in our community that they have been at within the previous 14 days. I want to note that this email communication has kept the number of cases we have down, as people who read the email and thought they just had the sniffles or allergies went and got tested, found out they tested positive and stayed home. These are time sensitive and by the time a mass mailing would be organized, printed, and mailed to 7781 Owners, the notice will be moot.

**COVID-19 and Flu Shot Clinics** – We blast emails out to our Owners and residents with announcements of and reminders of vaccination clinics that take place at our community centers. While flu shot clinics are planned well in advance and are advertised in our Link Magazine (mailed to all 7,781 Owner) the COVID-19 shots come to us through Southern Nevada Health District and sometimes we do not know the date until just a few days or weeks before. In many cases the event would be over by the time our Owners and residents receive the information in the mail.

**COVID 19 Mandates** – These are often passed to us by the State of Nevada or Clark County with only a two- or three-day warning. While the whole community does not receive our email blasts, getting the information out as soon as possible to as many as possible is a benefit to all who live here.

**Facility Shutdowns for Emergency or Unplanned Maintenance or Repairs** Typical things that we send out blast emails for are pools closures for a bodily function contamination, pool closed for equipment failure, notice letting Owners or residents know that a heater is down and the pool is cold, notice that an A/C is out and a room will be warm, frost delays on the golf course, restaurant closed for a repair, etc. These are time sensitive and by the time a mass mailing would be organized, printed and mailed to 7781 Owners, the notice will be moot.

Facility Shut Down Reminders – We send out reminders close to the time a facility or parking lot is scheduled to be shut down for routine maintenance, repairs, replacement, or a major project. We do this because we know people forget and we do not want them to show up expecting to play golf, swim, workout, etc. and find the facility closed. These are time sensitive and by the time a mass mailing would be organized, printed and mailed to 7781 Owners, the notice will be moot.

### **Committee Meeting Reminders, Agendas and Back**

**Up** - Prior to a Committee meetings we do a blast email reminding people of the meeting and include the agenda and all back up material as well as the ZOOM and Telecommunication instructions for those who cannot or prefer not to attend in person. We have 10 Committees that usually meet monthly, and Owners and residents will now have to get information about the dates of the meetings from the Link Magazine and come to the Community Centers if they want to have copies of the back up information or check the webpage for it.

**Board of Directors Meeting Reminders, Agendas** and Back Up - Prior to every Board meeting, we do a blast email reminding people of the meeting, the agenda and all back up material for the meeting is attached to the email, as is the ZOOM and Telecommunication instructions for those who cannot or do not want to attend in person. Owners and residents will now have to get information about the dates from the Link Magazine and come to the Community Centers if they want to have copies of the backup information or check the webpage for it.

**Rumor Responses** – Whenever there is a rumor going around the community, I do an email blast called the "Rumor Mills" these are far and few between, but a

necessity from time to time. These are time sensitive and by the time a mass mailing would be organized, printed, and mailed to 7781 Owners, the issue will more than likely escalated because of misinformation.

**Meeting Cancellations** – When a meeting is cancelled, and notice of the meeting has already been published in the Link Magazine to all 7781 Owners we do a Blast Email and post notices in our centers. These are time sensitive and by the time a mass mailing would be organized, printed and mailed to 7781 Owners, the notice will be moot.

Garbage Pick Up by the City Delays - These are time sensitive and by the time a mass mailing would be organized, printed, and mailed to 7781 Owners, the notice will be moot.

Street work, power outages, cable outages, sewer work - These are time sensitive and by the time a mass mailing would be organized, printed, and mailed to 7781 Owners, the notice will be moot.

Requests from the City of Las Vegas to let people know topics of importance - These are time sensitive and by the time a mass mailing was organized, printed, and mailed to 7781 Owners, the notice will be moot.

Lost People and Lost Pets - These are time sensitive and by the time a mass mailing would be organized, printed, and mailed to 7781 Owners, the notice will be moot.

**Changes to Agendas –** If we have a change to any meeting agenda that we think people will want to know about because the topic has been removed, changed or added we do an email blast. These are time sensitive and by the time a mass mailing would be organized, printed and mailed to 7781 Owners, the notice will be moot as the meeting will be over.

Found Items – We report car keys, house keys, garage remotes, wallets, purses and jewelry that our found and turned in so that the Owner can retrieve them. Items like this would now have to wait to be put in the Link Magazine or not shared at all.

Change in Facility Hours – When our facility hours change, we send out an email blast reminder.

**Events** – We send out blast emails when event tickets go on sale, when events are sold out and when we have tickets still for sale. We also send out notices if

an event must be cancelled.

### Coyote Sightings and Information to Keep Safe – When we get a report of coyote sightings, we share the area in order to keep our Owners and residents on

the lookout and safe.

**Holiday Greetings –** E-mail blast to wish our Owners and residents a happy holiday.

**General Information** – Reminders of Children's hours, where to get guest passes, how to vote in the Best of Las Vegas for our community and golf courses. Lunch and Dinner Specials at our restaurants, etc.

### **ACTION REQUESTED:**

Please take the time to reach out to the Governor, Legislatures and Ombudsman and reference SENATE BILL 186 and NRS 116.31068.

Keep in mind this is not a political issue, this is an important communication issue, while the political party of the legislators are listed, please do not let this detour our message and stay focused on the issue, and that is the curtailing of important daily information going out to Owners and residents who live in Associations. This impacts all associations in Nevada not just Sun City Summerlin.

#### RECOMMENDED ACTION: CALL THEM AND EMAIL

**THEM**: I have provided phone numbers to call the governor, ombudsman, and legislators, while emails are great, they can be easily ignored or deleted. When you call, the phone rings in their office, someone either answers the phone and must listen to you or a message is recorded that has to be listened to before it can be deleted. If you want them to know you are serious about your concerns, we want to ring their phones.

# TRENDING FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

#### What Does it Take to Be a Board Member?

On page 11 of this issue of The Link Magazine notification has been issued by the Sun City Summerlin Election Committee that if you are an Owner of a home in Sun City Summerlin Community Association,

Inc. and in good standing you are eligible to submit your name to run for the Board of Directors.

While there are only two qualifications to be a Board member (1) an owner of the home and (2) a member in good standing, as a Professional Community Association Manager (PCAM), I'd like to share with homeowners what they need to know not to just be a Board Member, but to be a good Board Member. I'd also like to share if elected, what they might expect as far as time commitments and meetings.

### How many hats can you wear? A Board member at SCSCAI wears more than one hat!

Owner: As a Board member, you are still a homeowner and have all of the same obligations, responsibilities and opportunities of every other homeowner. Board members pay the same assessment and fees that homeowners pay and do not receive any compensation or perks. As an individual owner, you cannot speak for the Board. While you can share information that is available in open session minutes, publications or on the web, you cannot commit the Association, Board, or staff to provide services, purchases, or maintenance of any kind. You can bring items forward through the committee process and the Board meetings, but until voted on and approved by the Board it is an idea and not a commitment.

**Director:** As a member of the Board of Directors, you are one of nine directors. All decision making is done at a duly called meeting with a properly stated motion that receives a second and is voted on. Majority prevails. There will be times you are happy about the outcome of a motion and there will be times you are not. But, in the end, as a Board member you should support the decision and not speak out negatively about other board members who may not have voted the way you would have liked them to.

The Board as a whole, as well as each individual Board member, is assigned mandatory duties by the SCSCAI governing documents as well as the State of Nevada.

As a Director you are charged with protecting, maintaining, and enhancing all the common elements. This is important to note because it does not say just those you personally think are important, or those with the largest use, or those that you participate in. As a Director on the Board, you must be able to separate your personal interests and the interests of your friends or club members and look at the needs of the entire Association. It is interesting to note the duties do not just say "protect and maintain", it says "enhance". Enhancing a property is a duty well above just keeping it clean and fixing things when

they break. It means evaluating and replacing things that are obsolete and adding new things to keep the property from aging in place. There is also an obligation as a Director to make sure the business affairs of the Association are being managed properly and to ensure the Association is in compliance with the governing documents. One thing all Directors are made aware of is they can delegate action and jobs, but they cannot delegate responsibility. Both the governing documents and Nevada State Law hold the Board responsible for Association business and Association care and Association financial stability now and for the future, whether or not the task itself was delegated to a staff member or contractor.

As a Director, you have a fiduciary responsibility to the Association and will exercise the business judgement rule. As surprising as it might be this may be your biggest challenge on the Board. Not because you are not honest or not a good business person, but because almost every decision you make will impact someone. It could impact you, your spouse, significant other, someone you personally know in the community, one of your neighbors, someone you are in a Club with, or someone who voted for you. Whether it is a decision on the operations of an amenity or on the budget, you cannot let your own personal needs or the needs of someone you know play into your decisions on what is right not only for the community as a whole but the future of the community 30-years from now. This is especially difficult at budget time, as each Board member has a fiduciary duty to evaluate the information presented and make the best financial decision for the Association, not for themselves or their neighbors. Every five years this decision is escalated because of the requirement for a full Reserve Study. The Reserves are a driving force in preserving, maintaining, and enhancing the community and therefore are a driving force in the budget. As a Board Member you must be willing to raise dues when necessary to cover day to day operations, but just as important to cover expenses 10, 20 or 30 years from now.

Officer: Once the election is over and the incoming Board members have been seated, the entire Board will elect officers. If you are elected as an officer you will be obligated to the officer duties set forth in the SCSCAI governing documents as well as Nevada State Law. Again, there are some of those duties that you can delegate but the responsibility remains with you. Officers can make certain decisions, but those decision-making powers have to have been delegated to them by the governing documents, or by a vote of the Board approved by a majority of Board members in a duly called Board meeting.

Committee Chair: Each Board member serves as a Committee Chair. The only member who sometimes does not Chair a committee is the Board President, primarily because of the other duties they perform. As a Committee Chair, in most cases, you will have a Committee of eight to ten people and your committee will meet monthly. Each committee has a designated duty. Your job is to prepare the agenda and work with staff to prepare for the meeting and present items from you Committee Meeting to the Board for decision.

#### **How Much Time Should I Expect to Spend on Board Duties:**

Since each Board member is different this list provides the things that all Board members do to prepare for and attend meetings.

### Monthly minimum hours spent on Association business for the Average Board Member = 68 hours a month

- In preparation for their monthly Board Meeting, Board members attend an average of six of the nine monthly Committee meetings. Each meeting is at least 2.5 hours long. This includes the monthly Committee meeting that they chair. 15 hours
- Review of Financial Statements in preparation for the Finance Committee Meeting and Board of Directors Meeting. 2 hours
- 3. Review of the agenda and back-up material prior to the committee meeting they chair. **1 hour**
- Property Inspections for committees they serve on or Chair where applicable or meeting with staff to review documents for meetings such as finance and legal services. 2 hours
- Review of the Board Agenda and Back-Up material for the Board Meeting. 3 hours
- Attendance of the Open Board of Directors Meeting. 3 to 4 hours
- 7. Attendance of Executive Session Meeting. 1 hour
- The Board members receive an average of ten emails a day regarding Association business. While they are only copied on these and do not need to respond, they do need to read and be aware of them. 5 hours
- Budget Hearings. Four consecutive days minimum late
   March or early April (four hours each).
   16 hours
- 10. Budget Ratification Meeting. 1 hour
- 11. Coffee with the Board. (Monthly). 2 hours
- 12. Each Board member is different on how many times they contact staff or the committee they are responsible for, or how many homeowners call them or email them directly. In talking with Board members over the years most agree that on average they spend at least 4 hours a week on Association business that includes talking to, emailing, or being stopped by homeowners.
  17 hours

In fairness, I have used the minimum of what time commitment is needed. Many of our Board members dedicate many more hours to the Association, but most people that are considering running for the Board want to know what I think the minimum hours for meetings they should attend, are expected to attend, preparation for meetings and interacting with staff and homeowners.

If serving your community as a Board member sounds like something you would like to do, remember the only qualifications you need to have are as follows:

- Be a unit owner in Good Standing
- No unpaid assessments
- Disclose any potential or actual conflicts of interest
- Cannot stand to gain from a matter before the Board
- Cannot reside with or be related to a Board member or candidate
- Cannot be related to the Executive Director

Being a Board member can be a rewarding experience. I have found that the Board members who enjoy their time on the Board are those who went into the election knowing the following:

- (1) Every decision is a decision made by the Board in a Board Meeting.
- (2) The governing documents and State Law have to be adhered to, and while changes can be made to the governing documents it is not only tedious and costly but many times takes an overwhelming vote of the homeowners in order to pass.
- (3) That while caring for the homeowners and their individual wants and needs is important, the fiduciary responsibility assigned to each Board member in the governing document is the Association as a whole.
- (4) There is a time commitment to being a Board member, and it is more than a three to four-hour meeting each month.

I want all of you who think you would like to be a Board Member to be empowered by the knowledge of not only what makes you eligible but what some of the duties and commitments are once you are elected. If you think you might like to run or if your planning to run, start attending Board Meetings, Coffee with the Board and Committee Meetings now, so you are well versed on the issues when you participate in Candidates Night!


